Personalized Learning in Action: Station Rotation

Walking into **Heather Blaylock**'s seventh grade science class at Plains Junior School, you might see a group of students wiggling a piece of string. Or stretching out a Slinky. Or watching a video on their Chromebooks. Why? They're expanding their knowledge and putting what they've learned about wavelengths into action as part of a personalized learning technique called station rotations.

Just as the name suggests, students rotate in small groups among several stations, completing different activities at each one. "The students have different goals or objectives they have to meet at each station," Blaylock explained. One of the benefits of station rotation is that it gives the teacher more time to work one-on-one with individuals or small groups of students. "I'm either helping at a particular station or I'm walking from station to station, jumping in where I know they'll have questions," she said.

Jordan Otabil sees the benefit of more time with her teacher. "When we're just regular sitting in class, (Mrs. Blaylock) has to go one-byone-by-one. But when we're in station rotations, she can work will small groups of us." That's definitely an added benefit that Blaylock sees as well.

Lakota Board Votes to Reinstate Freshman Transportation

Busing for Freshman Students Will Go Into Effect During 2020-2021 School Year

At its Nov. 18 meeting, the Lakota Board of Education voted unanimously to reinstate transportation services for freshman students, effective for the 2020-21 school year for students living outside of neighborhoods with walking paths or sidewalks that lead to schools.

"This topic has been a major point of discussion in our community for several years," said Board President Julie Shaffer. "Since high school busing was eliminated in 2011, the board has had to weigh the financial implications of fully reinstating transportation with the requests of our community. Through the district's diligent fiscal responsibility over the years, we are now in a better position to offer busing to our freshman students beginning in the fall."

The decision comes after several weeks of deliberation by the board. In addition to the updated five-year forecast that was presented at the meeting, the board's analysis has included everything from enrollment projections to forecasted costs from Lakota's contracted transportation provider to a recent community survey initiated by the board. Those results reinforced an overwhelming message the board has heard for several years from parents.

"The subject of high school busing has been brought up time and time again through Community Conversations, coffee chats, board meetings and other stakeholder interactions," Shaffer said. "The majority of the decisions the school board makes stem from these types of discussions and what we believe is in the best interest of our students while balancing our financial objectives."

Latino Family Literacy Project

Over the last 10 weeks, the Latino Family Literacy program has taken off at Creekside. Organizers are gearing up for another round at Heritage Early Childhood School after the start of the new year.

Latino Family Literacy Project Takes Off at Creekside

As the saying goes, "Children are made readers on the laps of their parents." Such was the inspiration behind a new family literacy program designed specifically for Spanish-speaking families at Creekside Early Childhood School this year.

"Knowing how important the home connection is to reading development, I was looking for something to help support my English Learner families with reading to their children at home," said Creekside Principal **Linda Pavlinac**, noting how much more difficult that can be in households where the dominant language is not English.

What she landed on was the Latino Family Literacy Project, a national research-based program that facilitates side-by-side reading in bilingual households. It was funded at Creekside this year mostly through federal funds designated for parent engagement among English Learners.

Every Wednesday night since early October, Creekside parents and their children have been gathering in the school's media center to read together. The are joined by an interpreter, **Cesar Vanegas**, who also serves as an instructional aide at Lakota West High School, as well as his co-leader for the new program, Creekside ESL teacher **Sara Kennedy**.

Woodland Team Transforms Thanksgiving Turkeys into Real World Math

Some fifth-graders at Woodland Elementary made it easier for local shoppers to calculate just how much turkey they needed to buy for Thanksgiving this year. And they did it all by adding, subtracting, multiplying and dividing decimals.

It's a little bit of project-based learning, real world learning and personalized learning all rolled into one lesson that Woodland teachers **Christina Butler** and **Jakeb Knight** dreamt up this year for the 130-plus math students they share. The final products live on in the storefront of a longtime local favorite, Steve's Meats & Deli off Cincinnati-Dayton Road.

"The extra time it took to get everything up and running was worth it in the end," Butler said. "The kids absolutely loved it and even realized the importance of math in the real world. That's what you want."

"For real world learning to work, you have to make that connection that what they are doing is going to help their community," Knight added. "You really have to have that buy-in and authenticity for it to work."

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French Club a Big Hit at Independence Elementary

"Répétez, s'il vous plait" greets you when you walk into the Innovation Hub at Independence Elementary School on Mondays. Why? Twentynine students are participating in a new after-school club led by Lakota East French teacher **Tiffany Ashley**.

Wanting to expose younger students to a new language, Ashley reached out to the Independence PTA to see if they would be interested - and they whole-heartedly agreed.

The hour-long sessions will run for eight weeks this semester. It's been so popular that Ashley, with the help of some of her Lakota East advanced placement (AP) students, will start a second session next semester. Principal **Greg Finke** is looking forward to extending the opportunity. The club "provides an enrichment opportunity that we have not been able to offer previously," he explained. "Anytime we can offer a club or activity to engage students in learning something new, I feel it is a tremendous benefit to them academically, socially and emotionally."

After mentioning the club to her AP students, senior **Elena Cittadino** asked Ashley if she could help. Now the club has three "high school buddies" who run small group activities each week. "It has been beneficial in so many ways," said Ashley. "I think the younger students enjoy working with the high school kids, and the little ones really respond to them. I have even heard that one of the AP girls has achieved 'princess status' with one of the third-graders," she joked.

"Real World 101" Offered 27 Sessions to West Freshmen

Last week, West Freshman students took part in the school's first ever "Real World 101". It was a day of learning, self-discovery and preparation for the future. Students were able to choose from 27 different sessions, everything from finance basics to mock interviews to college applications/scholarships.

Teachers Jen Parrett and Jason French began organizing the massive undertaking back in July, enlisting the help of many others.

"Real World 101 is a combination of several activities we have offered in the past, like the I.D. (inclusion and diversity) Conference, Life Skills, Future Ready Learning, and the Holiday Party -- all in one big day," explained Parrett. "We wanted to cover self-care, job readiness, community involvement, values, all kinds of things."

Students attended eight self-selected sessions, plus one session with the counselor and one with the principal.


