## **Mock Interviews Prepare CRA Students for Next Step**

Sitting down for your very first interview can be a nerve-wracking experience, especially with questions like these:

- "Tell me about yourself."
- "What are three words you would use to describe yourself and why?"
- "What is one of your greatest weaknesses?"

They are tough questions to tackle, but students at Lakota's Career Readiness Academy (CRA) are prepared to answer them.

Last week, 140 CRA students got to take part in a mock interview session with a community volunteer. The interviewers used a rubric to grade and give feedback to the students.

"These mock interviews provide real-world learning opportunities to make sure our students are ready for their next step, whether it is employment, enrollment in higher ed, enlistment in the military or venturing into entrepreneurship," said CRA Principal **Nicole Isaacs**.

During advisory period over the last few weeks, students worked with staff members to prepare for the interviews.

"The interviews gave students the opportunity to work on their soft skills – everything from handshakes to making good eye contact," said Isaacs. "They also learned how to articulate their responses, such as how to frame weaknesses in a positive way."

Students emerging from the interview room were overwhelmingly positive about the whole experience.

Senior **Mikal Anthony Smith** emphasized how important it was to prepare for the interviews. He said the answers to questions came easily to him because he had mentally practiced how he would respond.

After his interview, junior **Isaiah Walker** said, "I believe this is a great opportunity to help us think about what we want to do for a career and how to be prepared for it."

Interviewers also valued the experience. Lakota's Purchasing Manager **Veronica Gayotin** was able to interview eight students. "I would definitely do it again. It was a very insightful experience and I was very impressed by the CRA students. You could see a boost in the confidence level of the students as they went through the interview."

That confidence was evident when students completed the interviews. Although most of the students were admittedly nervous before their interviews, when they were finished they told others still waiting to go in, "It's not as hard as you think it is going to be."

"This is often the very first interviewing experience for students," Isaacs said. "But preparing them and giving them this practice can really make a difference."

## **Union Celebrates Black History Month through Music**

Students at Union Elementary taught a valuable history lesson through music this week.

"In the classroom, it's easy to get caught up in the more technical side of music like rhythms and instruments," said first year Union music teacher **Delaney Roberts**. "But students aren't always exposed to the historical side of music."

In honor of Black History Month, Roberts noted that nearly all popular, modern-day music can be traced back to genres that originated in African American culture. With that in mind, she developed a unit that had every grade level at Union studying a different musical era of African American history. Their work came to life in the form of an all-school musical performance that chronologically presented the history of traditional African American music. Students representing their grade level shared with their peers some of the facts they'd learned about their genre, as it related to African American history.

From blues, jazz and hip hop to genres inspired by slavery and the Civil Rights movement, selections took students, staff and visitors through African American history. Songs like "Swing Low, Sweet Chariot," for example, gave students the opportunity to "code" music, or interpret the hidden messages within their lyrics.

The program also gave two sixth-graders, **Scott Nicolai** and **Caden Powels**, the opportunity to pursue their passion for rap music. They were inspired by Principal **Kyle Lichey** to put their talent to work by first writing and then performing a song at the all-school assembly.

"I hope my classmates took away that coming together as a community is one of the most important things in life," said Nicolai, who said the duo's lyrics were inspired by the words of Martin Luther King, Jr.

"The message we were trying to get across was that you shouldn't treat any race different from another," Powels said.

Lichey closed the program with a challenge to every Union student: "The most important thing you can do is greet someone and make them feel like they belong. Think about how you can spread love and positivity throughout your whole school community," he said.

A month-long trivia program further compounded the lessons students took away from music class. Assistant Principal **Michele Plummer** has been the driving force behind a daily fact and question shared on morning announcements. Sharing non-traditional facts like, "Wonder Woman had a black twin" has helped catch students' attention. She follows up each fact with a question that challenges students to explore a topic on their own and then turn in their responses for a daily drawing.

Union incorporated similar activities when celebrating Hispanic Heritage Month back in the fall.

"It's all about coming together and building community," Lichey said. "And you do that by understanding one another's backgrounds and appreciating them."







## **Student-Created Mural Captures Spirit of Community at Wyandot**

You can't help but notice the beautiful mural in the cafeteria at Wyandot Early Childhood School. After all, it is 20' high by 80' long – and includes a paper doll representation of each student and staff member, nearly 700 in all.

The mural is based on the best-selling picture book "All are Welcome" that celebrates diversity and gives encouragement and support to all kids.

Wyandot Principal Liz Gruber discovered the book last summer and immediately knew that it would be perfect to build community at the school.

"With Wyandot bringing in new preschoolers, adding second grade and bringing on new staff members this year, 'All are Welcome' is the perfect mantra for us," said Gruber.

Gruber started the new school year by reading the book to students in each of the school's neighborhoods (aka hallways). She also brought the book to the school's art teacher, **Sherry Federle** and asked if she could help with a new mural that represented everyone at Wyandot.

"I was honored when asked to take on this project," said Federle. "But I can't take credit for the mural. I just took the concept to the kids and let them create."

As with most art projects, the mural was not just a lesson in art. Federle's students learned about planning, diversity, working together, problem-solving and more.

Art workshops with the students included sessions on planning what the overall mural would look like and on things you could do with paper (like curling or twisting that could be used to create the paper figure of themselves). In another lesson, classes read "The Colors Us" to learn about diversity and that everyone is really just a different shade of brown. Classes even learned about careers as they talked about designing the clothes the dolls would wear.

After four or five rotations in art, the students' paper figures were ready for hanging. Sherry and her husband spent 60 hours over Christmas break to install the mural.

And when the school building portion of the mural fell down from the cafeteria wall, Federle challenged her students to brainstorm ideas to come up with a solution. The students rose to the challenge, coming up with the idea of using magnets to help the school building stick to the metal wall.

"One of the coolest parts of the whole project was when I took the classes on an 'I Spy' field trip to the cafeteria," said Federle. "It was so neat to see the excitement when they saw the finished project – and to see themselves and their classmates as part of the Wyandot community." The field trip had students work together to try to identify items on the 'I Spy' clue list, and then take photos on IPads as documentation.

There are still a few finishing touches that need to be made to the mural. Yesterday, staff members created their paper dolls to hang on the wall. Federle also plans to add a description that tells the story of creating the mural, as well as key to help find each classroom of students on the wall.

Finally, to capture the true meaning of "All are Welcome," the phrase will be translated in all of the languages represented at Wyandot and added to the mural.

"We shared the mural project with the author and illustrator of "All is Welcome" and they loved it as much as we do," said Gruber.



## East, West ASL Programs Make Strong Statement at Center Court

The scene at center court before the East vs. West boys basketball game on Feb. 8 was something American Sign Language teachers **Katie Nicol** and **Jessica Frye** had only imagined. But it wasn't until West junior **Lauren Petersen** approached them with the same vision that it actually became a reality.

Accompanying three West choir students who sang the National Anthem was 50-plus East and West ASL students - of all different levels - signing the song lyrics. Besides being a direct representation of the cross-district unity wrapped up in "WE are Lakota", it also made quite a statement to everyone present in the stands that night.

"There was a huge applause at the end," recalled Petersen. "I had no idea that it wasn't something many people have probably witnessed."

Frye mentioned that the idea was inspired by the tradition of the ASL III students signing the National Anthem each year at West's Volley for the Cure event. The ASL teachers at both high school campuses all jumped at the opportunity to make such an experience available to their students at all levels of the ASL program.

Petersen took the lead on organizing the many practices that happened both during extra help bell and after school leading up to the center court performance. "There's not a sign for every single word, so some of it is left up to interpretation," said Petersen, who also took it upon herself to create videos and study guides to help her peers learn consistent signs.

"She worked really hard to make this happen and I am so proud of the passion with which she brought other students along," Frye said.

## **Chemistry Project Finds East a Place on International Art Piece**

An historical international fixture hanging in the Science Teaching Complex at the University of Waterloo Canada will forever be stamped with the artwork of a Lakota East student.

East was one of just 118 schools, from 26 different countries, invited to collaborate on an art piece to commemorate the 150th anniversary of Dmitri Mendeleev's creation of the periodic table of elements. Each school was tasked with developing a design that embodied their assigned element. The designs from all over the world will be transferred to ceramic tiles and arranged as a timeline, based on their discovery dates.

"It's one of the first pieces of art I've created that is going to be shown to so many people," said East junior **Hailey Holtman**, whose design for the sulfur was selected to represent East. The challenge tapped into her shared passion for both chemistry and art. "It was a really non-traditional art project."

East Chemistry teacher **Liz Gosky** first heard about the opportunity at the biennial Conference on Chemical Education that she attended last summer at Notre Dame. She submitted the application, thinking it would be a great project to spark conversation about science.

"I think it is amazing to celebrate something that is 150 years old and still is probably our most used resource in chemistry classes," Gosky said. "I think the kids gained an appreciation for what an amazing discovery the periodic table really is."

The international art project actually sparked an idea between Gosky and physics teacher **John Severns** that would involve an even deeper study of the entire periodic table and establish a fixture for Lakota East's own walls.

Students worked in pairs to research and then depict the spirit of their assigned element. Similar to the University of Waterloo project, the designs were combined to form an oversized depiction of the periodic table just outside of both teachers' classrooms.

"The periodic table is something that everyone is familiar with, as it hangs in every science classroom," Gosky said. "I think this helped bring it to life and gave it some more meaning. Kids could see that the elements really are parts of everyday objects and 'stuff' that they work with and use everyday. I think it definitely helped spark some conversations about practical uses of elements and chemistry in our world."
