One-to-One Chromebook Pilot Expands to High Schools

Lakota Local Schools is excited to announce the district is expanding its one-to-one (1:1) technology pilot to both Lakota East and Lakota West students in January.

Following the successful launch of the WE are Empowered initiative at the junior schools in September, every student in grades 9-11 will receive a district-owned Chromebook as part of Lakota's innovative approach to providing a student-centered education. "We are excited to be moving ahead with the 1:1 initiative at the high schools," said Superintendent **Matthew Miller.** "Information is available at your fingertips in today's world. Our teaching methods must incorporate the use of technology in the classroom to better prepare our students for life beyond high school," he continued.

Twelfth grade students will continue to have access to the same educational experiences as the underclassmen through the use of devices currently available at each high school, as well as having the ability to bring their own device to class. This decision supports the district's commitment to long-term financial sustainability, given the monetary investment needed to purchase devices for seniors who will be graduating in a few months.

The WE are Empowered initiative gives students more access to real world learning through collaboration with peers and online content. "Technology is not going away," Miller notes. "It is our responsibility to make sure that our students have the skills they will need to be successful when they graduate. Incorporating technology in our classrooms through the WE are Empowered initiative is another way we are preparing our kids for the future."

Todd Wesley, chief technology officer at Lakota, is looking forward to including more students in the pilot. "We are excited to expand this initiative to the Lakota West and Lakota East campuses to further empower our high school learners through a more personalized experience." Wesley agrees with Miller that the program is designed to complement Lakota's teachers by providing access to a robust learning tool to enhance student learning.

A group of students from both high schools' main and freshman campuses will test out the devices prior to the January launch. **Josie Godfrey**, a junior at Lakota West, is one them. "I think it's exciting. I think it's going to be a really good way for students to get to connect with their schoolwork," she said.

The district has plans in place to offer professional development to assist high school teachers as the initiative moves forward, just as it has for junior school staff. Expanded teaching opportunities with using technology to enhance lessons and projects, including real world problem solving, are some examples. "We've seen the excitement from the junior school teachers and students," said Miller. "We're looking forward to bringing the same level of excitement to the high schools in January."

Wyandot Students Partner with Canadian Second-Graders

The world is getting a little smaller for Wyandot second-graders in **Melissa Riehle's** class. That's because they are participating in the 9th annual Global Read Aloud (GRA).

The GRA started with the simple goal of using one book to connect the world; this year 1.5 million students in 86 countries will be taking part in this sixweek program with options for kindergartners to college students.

The Global Read Aloud team chooses books and holds a public vote to make the final selections. The books chosen spark connections, spark change and make people feel something. Mrs. Riehle's class is in the Picture Book Study, and each week they read the selected book aloud.

"My partner teacher in Canada and I actually read the book to our class twice each week because we know there is value in rereading the same story and gleaning new reading ideas," said Mrs. Riehle. "Then we respond to the book in different ways and share our responses. Our partner class responds to the same story, sometimes in the same way or in a different way."

At the start of the program, the Wyandot second-graders created introduction videos (using a video discussion platform called Flipgrid) that they shared with their Canadian friends. In Week 1, they read *My Heart Fills with Happiness* by Juliet Flett, and used videos to share what fills their hearts with happiness. During Week 2, they read *Wild Berries* by Julie Flett that included collages and words in the Cree language. Riehle's class created collages, and their partner class shared words in the different languages they speak.

Second-graders **Melida Sieng** and **Paietyn Knox** talked about the Global Read Aloud and what they enjoyed about it. Melida especially liked Week 2 where she shared how to say a few words in Cambodian on the video she created. And, by watching the videos from Canadian students, she said, "I also got to learn about French." Paietyn said she likes the program because she "can listen to other people and learn more about other people."

This week Riehle's class read *You Hold Me Up* by Monique Gray Smith and created their own books about who "holds us up" and how. On Wednesday, the class created videos to share their books, and on Thursday Mrs. Riehle's students viewed videos from their Canadian partner class. In a few weeks the Wyandot students will Skype with their partner class and meet "face to face".

"The students can't wait to talk to the other students," said Riehle. "GRA is giving my students the chance to share their voice with not just their classmates, not just at their school, but across the world. They are connecting with second-graders in another country and seeing how we can all learn from each other."

Lakota Offers 'E+R+O' Parent Training Oct. 25 & Nov. 8

Has your son asked you to "press pause?" Have you heard your daughter say that something is "above the line?" Are you wondering what it all means? Lakota Local Schools is offering parents two opportunities to learn what E+R=O is all about and why we are teaching it district-wide.

Event plus **R**esponse equals **O**utcome, also known as the R Factor, teaches students and staff that while a person cannot control an event, they can control their response. This in turn will affect the outcome. The R Factor is taught throughout the district, providing a common language for students as they continue their education.

Lakota will present the one-hour training for parents on two separate evenings:

- Oct. 25, 6:30 p.m. at Lakota West
- Nov. 8, 6:30 p.m. at Lakota East

Assistant Superintendent Robb Vogelmann views the R Factor training opportunities for parents to be similar to curriculum nights. "As we work on establishing our District culture, we want to bring parents along the journey with us," he explains. "We want to allow the parents an opportunity to see the resources we are using." Vogelmann also hopes that parents are noticing pieces of the R Factor around their children's schools. "Hopefully this evening will help explain what parents are seeing and explain why we are using R Factor training for staff and students."

Each session will last one hour.

Endeavor Turns Tradition Upside Down for Future-Ready Experience

When the sixth grade teaching team at Endeavor Elementary was seeking a future-ready experience for their students, they looked no further than one of the school's longest standing traditions - an annual field trip to Camp Kern.

"We owe it to our students to go beyond field trips that build community and emphasize teamwork to experiences that really push them to think about their futures," said Endeavor Principal **Andrea Blevins**.

The team found that combination in a new partnership with Miami University, which replaced Camp Kern this year and hosted the school's 200 sixth-graders on an extended day trip to Oxford's campus on Oct. 5. Activities like the high ropes course allowed students to practice soft skills like collaboration and teamwork, while a campus tour uncovered so many other seemingly menial, but important discoveries.

"I think their biggest takeaway was thinking of life beyond being a student - and the fact that they will get to make their own choices and pave their own way," Blevins said. Simple questions ranging from cars on campus and job options to dorm life and the logistics of changing classes helped students foresee the decisions and responsibility that comes with independence.

Sixth-grader **Saumya Goel** was intimidated by the responsibility factor, but also intrigued by concepts like choosing your own classes and class times and having to be respectful of your roommate's space. "I know I want to be an architect," she added. "And this whole experience made me think about how I was going to do that."

Blevins also noted the value in a panel that combined Miami professors with six current students who were all Lakota graduates. "They talked about what it's like to grow up in West Chester and then come to Oxford. It was a great way for them to see themselves in a current college student," she said.

"I thought about college and where I might want to go," said sixth-grader **Grant Beerman**. "I had never thought about that before."

Blevins stressed that the experience was a valuable one, regardless of how college does or doesn't fit into one's future. Even so, recognizing that college isn't the only track to success, she and her team are considering a continuation of the trip in the form of a career-ready day to help students more clearly see that path as an option, too.

A secondary benefit to the change was the expansion of the chaperone pool from just teachers to parents, too. Blevins said it was a great way to involve parents in the future-ready discussion.



New Junior School Elective Explores Media and Communication

Creativity and communication have Lakota's junior school students thinking about media in a whole new way. Media Design and Communication, a new English elective, gives students the opportunity to explore communication through a wide variety of tools and media. Students are also challenged to apply media and communication to real world learning.

Topics range from social media to podcasts to photography, videography and more. Student feedback has been very positive, many wishing it was a full year. The class encourages creativity and a willingness to learn about many topics students haven't studied before. "I like that it stretches normal learning," said **Meredith Brown**, a seventh-grader at Liberty Junior.

Classmate **Maddie Henderson** agrees. "I like all of the opportunities it gives us. It gives us a chance to explore things we've never tried before." Students have also had the opportunity to hear from guest speakers about different professions.

Mike Murray from SpotOn Productions spoke to **Moriah Walker's** classes at Liberty Junior. He was a big hit with seventh-grader **Emily Fuller**. "When professionals come and talk to us, it gives us inspiration about what we might want to do," she said. "(Mr. Murray) had a dream as a kid and followed it. It inspired me that if there's something I'm interested in, I could follow it and turn it into a career."

Members of Walker's class recently did something no other Lakota junior school student has done before: they hosted a #LakotaEdChat. The ed chats have become a staple for Lakota staff members on Wednesday evenings. What started as an opportunity for staff to come together and discuss different topics each week has grown to include participation from parents, community members and even students. While students hosting is not new, until now it has only been high school students facilitating the online discussions.

Walker had encouraged the students to follow along on ed chats during their social media unit. She offered the opportunity to her students to actually host one and several jumped at the chance. The group of about 11 students met over a three week period during their advisory time to create the topic and questions. "I asked them what they would like to talk to the Lakota community about, either to get their point of view across, or find out what teachers and parents think," Walker explained. "They felt that we would be able to connect more with 'Reducing Stress' as an overall topic because this relates to both students and teachers."

Maddie was excited to lead the chat. "I liked the thought of being the first kids (at Liberty Junior) to do it. Actually doing it gave me a whole new perspective." She also enjoyed being able to talk to a wide-range of teachers. "I like it that teachers were able to see what we're struggling with and what we need help with."

Meredith agrees. "It gave me a sense of leadership. You're stepping up and doing it."

The group was shocked to see how many people participated in their chat, including **Kate Law**. "I was surprised to see some of my former teachers participating," she noted. The group was especially excited to see Ohio's Superintendent of Public Instruction, Paolo DeMaria, tweet to the ed chat that he had been following along.

The district as a whole has been encouraging student and teacher voice. Over the past year, ed chats have been noticed at a local, state and even national level. Emily is happy that the adults are listening. "I like it that I actually have a voice and that the teachers and administrators are actually listening to us," she said. "We're talking about things that will make our school day better."

Welding Engineer Helps Connect the Dots on Industrial Revolutions

Which invention had a bigger impact on our world - the steam boat or the light bulb, the telephone or the elevator, the 3D printer or the smartphone?

As part of their unit on the four Industrial Revolutions, these were just some of the questions posed to students in **Jennifer Parrett**'s history class at Lakota West Freshman. But for Parrett, the futuristic aspect of the project was just as important as the reflective piece.

"I believe it is important to make the connection for students that history is happening around them today," Parrett said. "That's why a big part of this project was to evaluate the 4th Industrial Revolution. I wanted them to think about what inventions are happening around us right now that will change their lives and their futures."

Helping students to make those connections was the expert voice of **William Roth**, whose career in welding and engineering has spanned the U.S. Navy and many corporate roles for companies like Copeland Corporation and Procter & Gamble. Roth, who did the same exercise as Parrett's students, joined the class for an afternoon to compare his results to a panel of students. According to Roth, his contribution was about "connecting the dots for how all these things fit together" and impact our progress socially and economically.

"Part of the process of a true project based learning exercise involves having an outside expert come in to evaluate the students' work," Parrett said. "I was looking for someone in the engineering or research and development field that would have a wide scope of knowledge about inventions and their impact on society."

Parrett turned to Katie Bauer for help on this piece of the project. Bauer joined Lakota's team this year as the strategic partnerships coordinator. Her role is to help teachers like Parrett connect with professionals who can help make a connection between what students are learning in class and how it might apply to the world around us or a future career. This might take the form of classroom visitors like Roth, internships or even field trips.

"My students really enjoyed the outside perspective," Parrett said. "They were very interested in Mr. Roth's feedback on their decisions and it made the whole project more authentic."
