

Lakota Releases Quality Profile

Lakota Local Schools is proud to share with the community its 2017-2018 Quality Profile. This annual publication, mailed to every household and business in both West Chester and Liberty townships, is designed to give every Lakota resident a quick look at the major priorities and areas of focus driving our daily work.

Released in conjunction with the Ohio Department of Education's annual report card, the second annual Quality Profile highlights areas of education not assessed by the State. The report dives into six areas the district views as high priorities, including: academics, the student experience, parent and community engagement, safety and security, finances and the future of our schools.

"Academics should be at the core of a school district, just like it is at Lakota," said Superintendent Matthew Miller. "We are proud to offer a high-quality, student-centered education that is focused on preparing our students for life after graduation."

Miller is proud that Lakota received a 'B' as an overall grade, but wants the community to look deeper than the overview provided by the State. "The report card is just one tool for measuring our progress toward meeting state-directed benchmarks," he said. "We want to go beyond the state minimums. The Quality Profile is designed to fill that gap by showcasing our performance in areas we value most."

2018 COLOR RUN



Hopewell Junior Community Profits from Inaugural "Color Run"

Who knew that combining colored corn starch, community and competition could result in more than \$18,000?

The final fundraising figure was a welcome surprise for the school and PTSO leaders behind Hopewell Junior School's inaugural "Color Run" on Sept. 28. But more difficult to calculate was the exponential impact it had on strengthening the school community.

"Balancing professional, efficient fundraising with events that bring our families and community together is so important," said PTSO fundraising co-chair **Susanne Page**, who helped lead the charge in creating the one-mile, after-school running event behind Hopewell. The course was divided up by five different color stations manned by school and district-level staff armed with bottles of colored powder.

While students' white shirts at the starting line passed through the finish line as a rainbow of colors, no amount of color could cover up their smiles and laughter. Students and staff continued the festivities with live music, food and even a dunk booth.

"What set this event apart is that the reward to students for raising funds for the school was all experiences versus the traditional tangible rewards," said **Amy Macenski**, who leads Hopewell's PTSO fundraising alongside Page. "One of our goals was for the kids to learn that supporting your community and being together is the reward."

The fundraising component aside, Hopewell Principal **Jeff Rouff** agreed that an event combining friendly competition, community building, responsibility and even health and wellness is one that deserves to live on as a new Thunderhawk tradition.

"The greatest part of this event was that we were able to have over 220 students get involved with an after-school activity where almost all of their teachers joined in with them to make it a great event," Rouff said. "With the hard work of our PTSO, we were able to create an event that promoted personal wellness, connected students, community members, and staff, and raised money for our PTSO."

Eighth-grader **Dylan Jackson** enjoyed the experience and even pointed out the fact that along the way, he met and talked to some classmates he didn't know previously. "It doesn't get much better than running around with all your friends and getting messy," he said.

Page and Macenski are proud of the fact that 100 percent of the event donations will support future PTSO-sponsored events and programs at Hopewell. In fact, they leaned on local businesses for some of the monetary and in-kind donations, noting that "by staying within our community, our community profits too."

Rather than taking his post at a color station, Lakota Superintendent Matthew Miller participated among the students as a runner. <u>Click here</u> to watch a short video and relive the Color Run through Miller, who wore a Go Pro camera for the race.

"It was definitely one of the more creative and fun ways I've seen a school community come together to raise money," Miller said.

West's Fourth Annual Cultural Fair Has New Twist

Students in the English Language Learners (ELL) program at Lakota West had an opportunity to share about their cultures and home countries at the school's annual Cultural Fair. Guests were able to hear about what life is like in many different countries from 35 student presenters.

This is the fourth year for the event, which **Miranda Cockrell**, an ELL teacher at West, started in 2014. "The idea behind having the fair is so that teachers can see students in a different light," she said. It allows teachers to "get to know (the students) on a personal level."

A twist this year partnered creative writing students from **Eileen Washburn**'s class with students who would be presenting at the fair. After getting to know one another, students in Washburn's class created a project about the presenter, such as poetry, short stories, photo montages and even a song. **Amy**, a senior in Washburn's class, enjoyed the project immensely. "It was a great opportunity to write about someone else's perspective." She also enjoyed getting to know, and become friends with, fellow students who she most likely would not have met otherwise.

Dallane, a student presenter, enjoyed the project because it gave her a chance to talk about her family. "I like to study and I like all of my classes," she said. One of the things she likes about Lakota West is the teachers. "They show me well, like in Algebra," she added. Originally from Guatemala, Dallane has only been in the United States for six months. Her favorite subject is biology because "they teach me about cells."

The fair gives students in the ELL program the opportunity to practice their English in front of an audience. "The students love being able to show their teachers how much English they know and love being able to brag about their cultures," Cockrell added.

Students Become Archaeologists in Indy's Innovation Lab

Fourth grade archaeologists in **Susan Smith**'s class took over the new Innovation Lab at Independence Elementary this week. They rotated between four hands-on stations using ingredients like cookie dough, bread and gummy candies to learn about trace fossils, molds and casts, and fossil creation.

"When you can make the learning experience meaningful, memorable -- and interesting, student understanding and learning soars," said Smith. "The Innovation Lab helps a teacher create those types of learning experiences. This is exactly what happened with the fossil learning stations today."

At the fossil creation station, students placed gummy candies between layers of bread to simulate organisms in between layers of sedimentary rock. A stack of books was then pressed down on the bread to simulate 10,000 years of time. When the young archaeologists carefully peeled apart the layers of bread, exclamations of "that's so cool" could be heard as detailed molds of the candies appeared.

"The Innovation Lab is a very exciting and inviting place," continued Smith. "I think it sparks students' interest and inspires teachers to look at new possibilities for experiences to enhance learning. We have plans to use it for water table experiments with erosion, weathering and deposition. And I can already imagine engaging stations for our electricity and circuit building unit later in the year."

That's exactly what Principal **Dr. Greg Finke** had in mind when he envisioned the Indy Innovation Lab. He toured schools that had spaces dedicated to studies like cooking or video production. He and a team of teachers took the best elements of all these learning labs and combined it into one versatile learning space. Indy's Innovation Lab includes a culinary corner, grow tower, video station and green screens, an erosion table, 3D printers and more. The lab is still evolving; in fact, plans are underway to add a greenhouse area later in the school year.

"The Innovation Lab gives teachers the space to experiment and try things – and a place for the students to experiment and try things as well," said Dr. Finke.

MLK Day Writing, Art Contest Encourages Students to 'Find a Common Ground'

In preparation for our community's 20th annual celebration of Martin Luther King, Jr. Day, all Lakota students are invited to participate in a contest that promotes self-reflection about diversity and inclusion in our community and nationwide.

This year's "Common Ground" theme challenges students to address how we unite in a world that is divided and polarized in so many way. The contest is part of the community-wide observance of MLK Day, known as the "Live the Dream: Our Declaration of Unity" celebration.

Students in grades 7-12 are to submit in writing the equivalent to a two-minute speech. Elementary students may respond through the artistic medium of their choice or through writing.

In addition to an individual's entry, classes, troops, or youth organizations for students in grades K-12 who would like to enter the contest as a group project are invited to be as creative as possible, with skits, songs, artwork or videos that can be presented within a two-minute time limit.

Entries should be submitted to the student's building principal or to the West Chester or Liberty Township Administration offices. The deadline for entering is Monday, November 26, 2018, at 4:00 p.m.

All contest entries will be displayed at the community commemoration on January 14 at Lakota West High School, where winners will share their entries with the public.
