A Look Around Lakota - E-News Edition

Students at all four of Lakota's junior schools are discovering that their media centers have been reinvented. Innovation Hubs, previously know as media centers, provide a flexible space for teachers and students to collaborate, innovate and learn.

The spaces have been designed to foster creativity among students. "Innovation Hubs are a reimagining of media centers to continue to meet changing (educational) needs and provide a first class learning experience for all of our students," said **Krista Heidenreich**, director of digital learning for the district. "The Innovation Hubs encourage face-to-face interactions along with the integration of digital tools into learning."

Cesia Guerrero and **Samira Guseinova**, eighth-graders at Liberty Junior, are enjoying the new space. "The new furniture is really comfortable and it inspires you when you're working," said Cesia. "There's a lot of new technology and this is a new way to learn." The girls are using the green screen technology to complete a science project.

"We're filming a news report talking about different eras in history," said Samira. "We had different options for the project, but we liked the idea of a news report. You can choose different backgrounds for the green screens."

Books and access to online resources for reading and classwork are still available in the new spaces. Recent additions allow teachers to use the Innovation Hubs for both whole class and small group learning, and take advantage of exciting technologies that students can use to further their learning. Examples of these include: virtual reality stations, video filming and editing, including green screen technology and 3D printing.

With the 1:1 technology rollout happening this month, the Innovation Hubs will also serve as a support area for teachers and students. Following a successful targeted pilot last year, all junior school students will receive a district-owned Chromebook in September. As part of the #WEareEmpowerED initiative, junior school students will have expanded access to innovative instructional content, activities to increase collaboration and communication, guidance on digital organization, and new opportunities both inside and outside of the classroom and school day. Chief Technology Officer **Todd Wesley**, notes, "This new initiative supports the development of key student skills and responsibilities necessary to navigate the digital transformation of today and the highly-skilled technology driven global world of tomorrow."

Along with staff providing instructional support, students with an interest will be encouraged to become experts in technology resources and tools in order to help their fellow students. Innovation specialists have been assigned to each of the junior schools to support teachers through professional development and modeling practices as the integration of digital tools and resources continues.

Adena Resource Pantry Expanding to All Lakota Schools

"Only when students' most basic needs are met can we expect for them to learn and thrive at school," said **Angie Brown**, Lakota's parent and family engagement coordinator.

It's a simple concept that set <u>a big idea into motion at Adena Elementary last school year</u>. With the support of its community liaison and PTO, the school established a resource pantry that has since been stockpiled with hundreds of snacks, school supplies and personal hygiene items for students who need them throughout the day.

Now, with the support of the District Parent Council (DPC) ambassadors and their PTO/PTA partners, Lakota is preparing to expand the idea to every Lakota school.

"There is some level of need in every single building," Brown said. "True equality means equity and so, we're going to ask the community to come together and make this a reality at all 23 Lakota schools."

IKEA West Chester is one community partner helping Lakota achieve that equity across buildings. The retailer is providing a shelving unit and other organizational tools like boxes, baskets and shelf liners to help each building start their pantry.

"We're very proud to once again partner with Lakota Schools," said IKEA Store Manager Alison Zeng. "Providing these products is the right thing to do and how we're helping create a better everyday experience for Lakota's students."

DPC President **Lisa Phair** was energized by the ambassadors' ideas and enthusiasm for the new project at the group's first meeting of the year.

"Parents are excited about the opportunity to help in a different and truly meaningful way," Phair said. "We're acknowledging the fact that there is an unfulfilled need in our schools and we're doing something about it."

Each pantry will require individually wrapped non-perishable snacks like granola bars, chips, crackers and applesauce. Other requested items include personal and feminine hygiene items, school supplies and clothing. Please contact your school's DPC ambassador or PTO/PTA president to inquire about donations.

East's Aubert Li Earns Perfect ACT Score

Just one-tenth of 1 percent of students who take the the ACT test earn the top composite score of 36, and you can add Lakota East's **Aubert Li** to that group!

"Aubert is a shining example of the East way," said East Principal Suzanna Davis. "He is a quiet leader in our school who demonstrates time and time again what is possible through lots of hard work and academic focus. I'm very proud of him and excited to see where the rest of senior year takes him."

The ACT consists of tests in English, mathematics, reading and science. Each test is scored on a scale of 1-36, and a student's composite score is the average of the four test scores. All major U.S. colleges accept ACT test scores and scores provide colleges with evidence of student readiness for the academic rigors of college coursework.

Once the WE are EMPOWERED initiative is established at our junior schools, it will move to our high schools.

Student Voice Transforms East Locker Bay

It all began during a Lakota East Student Advisory Council meeting last school year. The 20-plus members of the group and East administration started discussing the idea of flexible classrooms as learning spaces and how to incorporate them at Lakota East.

Some students then visited schools that had recently redesigned a learning space. At the next Council meeting they shared out their findings and Principal **Suzanna Davis** tasked the group with picking a space in the building and redesigning it. The group landed on transforming one of the locker bay areas on the first floor.

"We had no idea that the administration had planned to get started on implementing our designs so quickly," said senior **Grace Phair**. "Until we received a text with pictures of the torn down lockers and a text from Mrs. Davis saying, 'Your voices matter... look what we started on this week!' I couldn't help but smile when I saw her text. Not only was it amazing to see our design come to life, but to know our administrators and teachers care about our student voice meant a lot."

The students got to pick the furniture, paint colors, messaging on the walls – everything to make it a more inclusive, engaging and flexible space.

"Seeing the administration follow through on such a big project that was mainly based on what we said and what we wanted was crazy to watch," said Student Advisory Council member **Caleb Hoch**. "I think I learned a lot more about the new way the district is moving. The follow-through shows that the district isn't just all talk about doing new and innovative things."

Principal Davis says that the new learning space at East is a perfect example of embracing student voice. "From the design to meeting with furniture vendors, the entire process was driven by student voice. We have been thrilled watching the space 'come to life' at the start of this school year providing a wonderful space for students to collaborate at all times of the day."








Lakota West High School hosted its football season opener on Aug. 24 at Paul Brown Stadium, where the team faced off against St. Xavier High School.
