

Parade of Graduates Inspires Lakota's Youngest Learners

Lakota West and East seniors are graduating on May 17 and 18, respectively. But before they say their final goodbyes to Lakota, the Class of 2018 will participate in a new Lakota tradition known as the "Parade of Graduates".

On May 3, all 10 of the Lakota's elementary schools will welcome a group of this year's graduates in fanfare fashion. The graduates, many of them returning to their elementary school, will be welcomed by students, staff, and parents as they walk the halls in their caps and gowns with signs displaying their future plans.

East senior Michael Croy is excited to return to VanGorden Elementary once more before he starts his gap year of full-time employment.

Michael recalls his favorite memory at VanGorden was running different races during field day every year. He is very excited to walk down the halls he once called home. Michael is also excited to see his former teachers and encourage current students.

"I really hope [the graduates] have a positive impact on the younger students," Michael said. "I think it's a great idea to let the students see hard work pay off by letting [the graduates] walk through the school with our caps and gowns."

For Michael, the welcoming crew will also include his mom, Linda Croy, who is currently a teacher at VanGorden.

Derived from Lakota's Champions for Change program, the parade is designed to celebrate the achievements of our graduating students while also demonstrating to every elementary student that others who look like them or have the same goals as them have reached such a milestone.



Lakota Schools is adding another layer to its safety and security protocols. The district has partnered with the Ohio Department of Education and the Ohio Department of Public Safety to bring the SaferOH tip line to the Lakota community.

The 24-hour tip line is another way for concerned students, parents and residents to share information with school officials and authorities. "The safety and security of our schools is always our number one priority at Lakota," said superintendent Matthew Miller. "The tip line is another way we can learn about potential threats to student safety before they happen."

The calls and texts are answered by analysts in the Threat Assessment and Prevention (TAP) Unit of Ohio's Homeland Security department. "Members of our community, adults and students, can remain anonymous when they report a threat to our schools or an individual student," said Chris Passarge, Chief Operations Officer at Lakota. "Information received through a phone call or text is assessed and then forwarded to local law enforcement and school officials," he continued. The TAP Unit will also follow up to ensure that each incident has been investigated.

"Our district safety team meets regularly to review safety protocols at Lakota," Miller noted. "Our safety plans are never done. We are always looking for ways to make them better so our students and staff are safe."

The SaferOH tip line is available to any school district, including both public and private schools, in the state free of charge. The tip line's number, 844-SaferOH is now posted on the district's website and its mobile app. Posters with the phone number will be placed in schools as well. "We teach our students that if they see something that looks suspicious, they should say something to a trusted adult. This is another way to alert the proper authorities," Miller said.

Eight East, West Students Move on to TSA Nationals

Six Lakota East students - Noah Clippinger, Gabe Pascoal, Andrew McCrary, Eli Tivin, Jake Brinck, and Joseph Wiberg - and two West students - Oscar Mussari and Nick Wassan - qualified for the Technology Student Association (TSA) national competition this summer in Atlanta, Georgia. Students from grades 7-12 will be represented at the June 22-26 competition.

The students competed in the annual VEX Robotics Competition hosted by Ohio TSA. where they qualified for nationals. The VEX Robotics competition has a new challenge every year, and the students spent nine weeks building their robots in their Principles of Engineering class. Besides competing in robotics competitions, the students also participate in other events that include 3D computer aided design (CAD), Tech Problem Solving, Flight Endurance, and many more.

East, West Students Qualify for HOSA International

Twenty-five students from Lakota East and 11 students from Lakota West placed in the top three in their respective competitions at the Ohio Health Occupations Students of America (HOSA) State Leadership Conference in Columbus on April 10 and 11. These students will now attend the HOSA International Leadership Conference in Dallas, Texas from June 27-30 to compete in their respective categories.

The 11 West students moving onto international competition include: Julieta Ramirez and Saliha Watley who placed on the healthcare issues exam; Courtney Powless who placed second in Human Growth and Development; Jacob Bitonte who placed first in Human Growth and Development; Farha Watley who placed second in Nutrition; Grace McCaughey who placed second in Pathophysiology; Abby Rockenhaus who placed second in Epidemiology; Elena Tunis who placed first in Medical Law and Ethic; Max Murdock and Khalil Saleh who placed third in Medical Innovation; and Alexis Lam who placed second in Behavioral Health.

Woodland Tech Squad Puts Student Voice into Action

Woodland Elementary School's Tech Squad made its debut appearance at the school's April staff professional development session, sharing their plan for classroom support with teachers. The Squad consists of fourth, fifth and sixth grade students. Their primary mission is to help support their peers with digital learning in the classroom.

"The Tech Squad is such a wonderful asset to the classroom," said Instructional Coach Kristina Linberg, who advises the group. "It's the perfect example of how Lakota continues to grow opportunities for student voice and empower our students to take ownership of their learning experiences."

While the students are charged with working together to keep the laptop and iPad carts organized and charged, their primary role is to support their classmates with how to access and use district-provided digital tools and resources, while also encouraging good digital citizenship practices.

Tech Squad members are currently collaborating to create an FAQ poster for teachers to hang in their classroom to assist peers with accessing Onelogin and Canvas. The Squad will be responsible for updating this resource moving forward.

After the staff PD session, fifth grade teacher Chris Butler said, "It has been so helpful to have Rachel from the Tech Squad as my technology point person for my class when we are working on digital projects. Her support has been invaluable and I love how her talent shines."



Over 40 Countries Represented at Hopewell Community's 'Celebration of Nations'

Hopewell Junior and Hopewell Elementary came together for its 3rd annual Celebrations of Nations on April 17, honoring the diverse backgrounds found in their community. Families, staff, students and community members gathered for food, fun and sharing.

This year, 42 different countries were represented in some way – music, dress, artwork, performances, or family and student-hosted tables displaying artifacts, information, food and drink.

Karen Berndt, a tutor at Hopewell, entered a contest through College Advantage through which she won second prize, a visit to the school of her choice by a member of the Cincinnati Bengals football team. Although the group would normally visit the school her young son attends, they were happy to accommodate the request to visit Hopewell instead once they learned that her son, Silas, is only one. The 25 students who Berndt works with regularly were invited to meet Erickson.

The students spent a good portion of the time asking Erickson about a wide range of topics. He told the group that while playing in the NFL was his goal, he made sure that he did well in college so that he had a backup plan. When asked about his insecurities, Erickson thought back to when he played football in college and doubting whether he was good enough to achieve his goal of playing professional football. He spoke about the importance of having a good mentor and people you rely on to help you believe in yourself and build your self-confidence.

Berndt's favorite part of the visit was that Erickson "shared some of his struggles as a student and an athlete, which allowed the students to see that professionals have to struggle and work hard to succeed just like they do." She told her students, "What can pay off when you do the things that are hard...sometimes those things that you don't want to do lead to good things and better things."

Lakota Hosts National Thought Leader for Future Ready Schools

Over 100 instructional leaders around Lakota - and some from neighboring districts - gathered to learn from a national icon in classroom innovation and leadership last week.

Lakota hosted the special visit from Thomas Murray, the digital learning and advocacy director for the Alliance for Excellent Education. Murray represents "Future Ready Schools," a national effort to maximize digital learning opportunities for a more personalized learning experience for all students.

He presented the research-based framework - created by educators, for educators - that help school districts transform their approach to preparing students for success in college, career and citizenship. By defining the framework's seven "gears", Murray challenged his audience to consider their individual role in executing each aspect of the process.

The message around using technology as the accelerator to more engaged learning comes at a critical time for Lakota as it prepares to launch 1:1 technology in all four junior high schools next year.

"Doing the best for our students means empowering teachers, administrators and even students to be leaders in building what our schools look like ten years from now," said Lakota Superintendent Matthew Miller, one of the 3,200 district superintendents nationally to pledge his commitment to Future Ready.

"Future Ready Schools is a powerful resource to help us continue moving forward and we were fortunate to hear such an inspiring message from a thought leader like Tom," Miller said.
