

**Lakota Gives Back: East Senior Publishes, Gifts Inspirational Book to Other Lakota Students**

Lakota East senior **Erinn Aulfinger** is combining her passion for writing with her compassion for helping an up-and-coming generation of Lakota girls.

“When I went to middle school and high school, I noticed many of my friends struggling with the consequences of low self-esteem,” Erinn said. “I wanted to do more than just help them, but help stop the problem before it started for other girls.”

This revelation shaped the whole premise of her Girl Scout GOLD Award project: a book of inspirational stories she would publish and make available to the parents of Lakota’s 1,300+ sixth-grade girls. Why girls? Through her research, Erinn discovered that girls experience the biggest drop in self-esteem between 9 and 11 years old, that is both deeper and longer-lasting than that of boys.

For more than a year, Erinn consulted with hundreds of organizations, expert sources and successful women of all ages who had overcome their own adolescent struggles. She even collaborated with Always’s “Like a Girl” campaign to gain funding for her project. Her efforts culminated in over 600 hours of research and service, well above and beyond the 100 hours required of a GOLD Award recipient.

“Erinn’s project and her intentional decision to connect it back to the Lakota community is the definition of service,” said Lakota East Principal Suzanna Davis. “It’s a soft skill that’s taught at so many points during a Lakota student’s educational experience and it’s great to see it put into action in such a thoughtful and productive way.”

The finished product, "Rewriting Your Story," is 83 pages of inspirational stories written from the perspective of older girls and women who have overcome their own challenges with self-esteem. It also includes expert-driven exercises to help girls better understand and appreciate themselves and others, and tips to avoid the common pitfalls girls begin to face in during adolescence, like bullying, body image and stress management.

“I am so grateful that Erinn has provided such an inspiring resource for girls and their parents to open doors to communicate about very

challenging issues in our current day society,” said Independence Elementary Counselor Kelly Carstens, who has received feedback that the book is a great conversation starter and a good way to test a parent’s perception versus reality.

It was Erinn’s discovery in junior high of Lakota East’s co-curricular journalism program, a nationally-recognized monthly magazine called “Spark,” that helped her find her own footing and direct her post-graduation plans.

Like the work she’s done through Spark, this project was another big learning experience for her.

“I actually learned what I hope the girls reading the book will learn,” Erinn said. “It opened my eyes to the fact that girls and women alike struggle with self-esteem. It helped me realize that no one is alone, and that’s really the whole purpose behind the book.”

The books are being distributed to interested parents of any Lakota sixth grade girl at two optional evening parent meetings. The final meeting is scheduled for Wednesday, Nov. 9 at 6:30 p.m. in the auditorium at Lakota West Freshman Campus.

Parents are also invited to contact their elementary school counselor to request a copy of the book.

## Union Elementary's Standing Desk Pilot Looks to Support Learning

It's a strange view – instead of the traditional neat rows of students seated at their desks, at Union Elementary students have the option to stand to do their work.

For some students, the standing desk option can lead to improved learning and better focus. The approach aligns with Lakota's commitment to personalizing the educational experience for all students.

“We were eager to see the impact on student learning, allowing for non-traditional, yet appropriate, movement in the classroom,” explains Charlotte Elia, intervention specialist at Union Elementary. Thanks to the school's PTSSO, a standing desk was recently purchased for each classroom.

Research conducted by the Mayo Clinic and the University of Minnesota indicates that standing desks may help students move and channel their energy during class, leading to them being more alert, reducing behavior problems and boosting learning levels.

Union Elementary Principal Ben Brown adds, “We wanted to pilot this as a way to adapt to the needs of our students. By offering the standing desks as an alternative for our students, we're allowing them to control their energy levels. When they begin to feel fidgety or off-task, they have the option to use the standing desk. We don't expect adults to be seated and still for hours at a time, why should we expect our students to do so?”

Erin Owens, director of Lakota's Curriculum & Instruction for K-6 grades, agrees. “We recognize that in order for students to be successful we must teach them how to learn as much as what to learn. The idea is that having the option to stand or sit puts the focus on learning by allowing students to decide what they need in order to do and be their best.”

Elia adds, “We have already seen great success with students using the standing desks in ways that allow them to remain actively engaged in instruction and independent work for longer periods of time.”

## Cherokee Elementary Students Team Up "To Help a Friend"

“We’re doing this because we want to help,” says Cherokee Elementary fifth-grader **Jessica Reder**. And that’s why a group of students at Cherokee are holding a baked goods booth at Cheetahfest, the school’s fall festival.

Their motivation is Charley, a three-year-old family friend who was born with a chromosomal disorder called Gorlins Syndrome. Charley spent the first year of her life living at Children’s Hospital of Philadelphia where she underwent stem cell and chemotherapy treatments and is currently again in the hospital, fighting lung issues.

“The girls’ kindness and determination to help are a real inspiration,” states Cherokee Elementary Principal Valerie Montgomery. “Not only have they thought through the best way to raise the money, but they have incorporated several ways to ensure Charley and her family know that people here care. I’m proud of them and this great work they’re doing. Their spirit is part of what Cheetah P.R.I.D.E. is all about.”

P.R.I.D.E. is the school's Positive Behavior Support (PBS) program for developing character qualities in students and is a model used throughout Lakota.

Knowing the high medical expenses the family faces, Jessica wanted to help – and, through her enthusiasm, recruited several other students to help. So the group of four – Jessica, her younger sister **Lucy Reder**, a third-grader at Cherokee; and **Kaitlyn Johnson** and **Ellie Tito**, also fifth-graders – approached Montgomery with their proposal to sell baked goods and bracelets at the event.

In addition to the booth at Cheetahfest, the school is able to accept cash and check donations on behalf of Charley's family.

“At first we thought of holding a running race, but then decided selling stuff at Cheetahfest might raise more money,” says Kaitlyn. The girls have been planning their event for about three months and have a goal of raising \$1,000, with all proceeds going to Charley’s family.

"We even decided we should have something for people who won't want to buy a cookie," adds Ellie, explaining the addition of the bracelets. And the bracelets serve another purpose – to remind the wearer to think of Charley and send good wishes her way.

"Charley's colors are grey and purple, so that's our theme," says Jessica. "We wanted her to know what we're doing even though she's in the hospital, so we put together a package that her family will open. She can wear her bracelet and read the cards and know that all of this is to support her."
