Nicolas was born in the year 1245 in Sant' Angelo in Pontano, Italy. Many of his early years were dedicated to preaching in local houses within the Friars. Nicolas was prominent for being a man filled with compassion, love, and service to all. He embodied what it means to be a true brother, and a servant of Christ. Nicolas' life, filled with service, earned him the recognition of being the Patron Saint of the Souls in Purgatory.
