




EARLY DAYS AND BIG BIRD

In the very early days of ISB, before the first proper campus, students attended school in a diplomatic apartment compound, with classes split between homes, hallways, and garages. Ann Holder Preston was one of the teachers at that time and wrote an article about her experience for a magazine published for ISB's 25th anniversary.

"We arrived... in 1979, just after relations were resumed between the U.S. and China," Ann's article begins.

Ann herself doesn't feature in this photo taken during that period, but her daughter, Elissa Holder, does.

"It really was quite an exciting time to be in Beijing. [U.S. comedian] Bob Hope brought a whole troupe of people to put on a show," Ann said.

Among this group of TV stars, which set off for merrymaking in the Chinese capital amid goodwill exchanges between China and the U.S., was the beloved children's character, Big Bird. The giant yellow canary from *Sesame Street* "put on a special little show for the foreign children at the Beijing Hotel. The kids got up close, touched him, and got him to sign autographs."

The ISB campus and community have grown exponentially since the first official class in 1980. Although current students might not know who Big Bird and Bob Hope are, the two remain colorful characters attached to the school's rich history.

FIRST OF MANY

The decade of 1980-1990 saw a number of firsts in the history of ISB. From the get-go, even with a small student body, ISB established and functioned with a framework primed for a long future to come. Many beloved traditions and programs today have their roots in the 1980s. The first Board of Trustees and Parent Teacher Association were founded in the year 1980.



Following the growth of diplomatic communities, the U.S. Embassy merged with the British and Australian Embassy schools and, together with the Canadian and New Zealand embassies, founded the International School of Beijing in 1980. Its original mission: to provide education to the children of the five founding embassies and eventually other embassies, as space allowed.

FIRST COMPUTER LAB

"This is a picture of the first computer lab at ISB. For Thanksgiving, in 1983, my wife, Linda, and I were headed for Hong Kong. We told our head of school, John Ritter, we were going to buy a computer for ourselves. He said, 'While you're down there, why don't you buy two computers for the school, and I'll make you the computer coordinator?' He also had me stay a week longer to observe how Hong Kong International School was using technology. By the spring of next year, John and I had written the first 'tech plan' for ISB. We presented the plan to the board and it included a lab of Apple II computers. The board was excited and adopted the plan. The first lab was up and running for the 1984-1985 school year and I became the first computer teacher."

In 1988, ISB was registered as a School for Diplomatic Children, under the auspices of China's Ministry of Foreign Affairs. The school began to accept applications from all expatriate residents and relocated to the Lido complex. Due to space limitations, preference was given to the diplomatic community and citizens of the founding embassies, but the first non-embassy children soon began to enroll.







The costumes for the workhouse children were made of raw silk soaked in ink as that was the cheapest and most readily available material at the time.






FAST GROWING

ISB became the first school in Beijing to offer the IB Diploma program, in 1991, and had the first graduating class, fondly known as the "Great Wall Grads," in 1993. The combination of a favorable business environment and an ever-expanding expatriate population propeled growth. The student body grew from 310 in 1990 to 1,130 in the 1999-2000 school year. Ten modular buildings were added in 1994, and a satellite campus was created in 1996 to accommodate the steady increase in enrollment. In December 1994, after much discussion, ISB's Board decided to move forward on securing land in the suburbs for a "purpose-built facility."

"The Satellite School was a magical place for children and my youngest son, Lewis, began his schooling there. Right of passage from the Satellite School to the main campus was after Grade 2, but more importantly for the children, it was marked by participation in the Grade 2 circus. This event was held every year by the 'graduating' class, and all the younger children would look on with stars in their eyes, knowing that their turn was coming.

"As expatriates, many of us live with uncertainty regarding our tenure in country and our family was no exception. Lewis was made very aware of this fact in year one when several of his good buddies left Beijing. He missed his friends, but his greatest concern was the possibility that this could happen to him prior to year two and that circus. Lewis graduated from the Satellite School, loved the circus, and was able to remain at ISB until Grade 4. He has many memories of this wonderful school, but that magical place and its circus will forever be a part of him."



"Beijing changed so much during the six years I was there. The foreign community had just about exploded the year I left. The incremental growth of the school was fascinating. The school cannot have been more than 250 people when I joined and when I left it, there were 1,000 students. I miss the fun that was felt throughout the school and the safeness and security. There were few worries going to ISB.

"The analytical skills and creativity that I have were formed at ISB. The multicultural nature of international schools is also fantastic. It creates open-minded individuals. When one arrives at university, one realizes how closed-minded the majority of educated individuals in the world are. This closed-mindedness is never allowed to appear when you are constantly surrounded by people of different cultures.

"There are only a handful of young people today that can say that they lived in China as expats in 1988 to 1994. These kids were in very similar situations, not being able to watch as much TV, not being able to go out as easily as other kids in other countries, making and losing friends every year. This joined us. Then when the teachers create fantastic learning experiences for us because they were handpicked as the best, it means that you get an education and experience that is unlike any you could get anywhere else. We were, and always will be, one big family."

David Eaton, Head of School 1991-1996

When David Eaton was named director in 1991, ISB had 320 students and offered classes only up to Grade 11. When he began, Mr. Eaton simultaneously held the positions of business manager, high school principal, and guidance counselor (in addition to director). By the time he left, at the end of school year 1995-1996, ISB had added enrollment and new programs, among them a variety of sport teams, an instrumental band, the International Baccalaureate (IB) program, the Model United Nations (MUN) program and the Middle School.



FIRST BEIMUN IN SCHOOL YEAR 1993-1994

ISB was still a small school in the early 1990s when the first Model United Nations (MUN) program began. It has grown steadily since then. "For anyone interested in international politics, world issues, and debate, MUN has it all," said Dennis Boyle-Woods, ISB's MUN coordinator. Today, ISB annually sends scores of student delegates to THIMUN in the Hague, one of the premier Model United Nations, hosts BEIMUN at ISB each spring, and is helping organize the first THUMUN-Singapore session in November, 2005. 



THE ORIGIN OF APAC

In 1995, along with four other international schools in the region, ISB founded the Asia Pacific Activities Conference (APAC).

What started out as a grouping of the founders to compete in basketball, soccer, and volleyball has grown to now encompass 12 schools, 12 sports, and festivals for five performing arts. Over a quarter of a century, countless students have experienced the thrill of match day and the buzz of concert time thanks to APAC.

The first ISB APAC honors came courtesy of the 1997 boys volleyball team, followed by the ISB girls winning the APAC volleyball tournament the year after. ISB's girls basketball champs from the year 2000 are pictured.

While all students involved in occasions like APAC benefit hugely from their experiences in sports and performing arts, a number of ISB athletes and artists have also risen to the very top level of these fields. Joe Alexander, who attended ISB from 1996 to 2002, went on to play in the National Basketball Association, and Camille Cheng (Class of 2011) swam in the 2016 Rio Summer Olympics.

When we asked Camille Cheng about her fondest memories of ISB, she said they were "all the competitions like China Cup and APAC with my teammates."

Our student athletes today share the same great opportunity of traveling throughout the region to compete in Asia Pacific Activities Conference (APAC) tournaments, meets, and invitationals. ISB was one of the founding members of APAC in 1995 and volleyball was one of the first APAC sports students were invited to participate in.

Ron recalled that his first year making the Varsity volleyball team was also Mr. Bujar Kumi's first year of coaching. He was thrilled to see that Mr. Kumi (far left in the photo), one of ISB's most loved and long-standing teachers, is still at ISB coaching the latest generation of student athletes. Ron added how impressed he was to see Mr. Kumi has not aged a day since 1996!









ISB's PTA strives to enrich the education of the students through co-operation of parents and staff in providing support services to teachers and supplemental learning opportunities to the children.

The mission of the ISB PTA is to encourage a happy, healthy school environment for the well-being of our children through communication and cooperation among the administors, staffs, parents, and students.

Spring Fair 2005 was, as it has been since the event began in the mid 1990s, an occasion for the ISB community to exalt – in the coming of spring, in having fun together. It's also an occasion for the PTA to raise funds, most used "to supply teachers with those little extra things they would like but are not included in the school budget," wrote PTA President Peggy Murphy in the Bulletin (April 2005). Funds raised at the Spring Fair have also been used to support visiting authors, purchase a DVD player, and digital cameras.

TRANSFORMATION

"The carp has leaped through the dragon's gate. In Chinese mythology, the carp is the embodiment of change and a symbol of strength. Only through consistent patience, perseverance, and endurance can it manage to swim upstream and leap over the top of the waterfall, through the Dragon's Gate, where it becomes a dragon. Although our mascot, the dragon, is the essence of our hopes and dreams, it is the carp that we strive to emulate, for it is through the carp's hard work and sacrifice that it is able to transform into a shimmering dragon."

The words mirrored the changes that ISB undertook in its third decade. The school physically moved to a world-class 33-acre campus in Shunyi in 2002. Enrollment grew from 1,370 in 2001 to almost 1,900 at the end of the decade. ISB received accreditation by the NCCT (China's National Center for School Curriculum and Textbook) in 2003, the NEASC (U.S.-based New England Association of Schools and Colleges) in 2004, and the CIS (Council of International Schools) in in 2007. ISB is endorsed by these organizations as a school providing an excellent program, maintaining a superb physical plan, and sustaining a solid financial position. THE NEW CAMPUS IN SHUNYI WAS SEVERAL YEARS IN THE PLANNING

Historians will remember that planning for the new ISB campus facility began several years ago. And the ride from those early days of discussion and planning to the campus now occupying some 133,500 square meters of land in the Shunyi District of Beijing was not always a smooth one.

"When no more facts, figures, or opinions could possibly add any more insight, and in the face of a waiting list about the size of our present enrolled student body, we found ourselves still unsure and feeling tentative about moving ahead. We needed something more, something to help us take the courageous decision that would move us forward," remembers former ISB Board member Elyse Silverberg. That is when a single Board member suddenly shouted out the then-popular phrase from a movie playing widely at the time, *Field of Dreams*. "Build it, and they will come." That was it. "The decision we took that night set ISB on the course we continued," Ms. Silverberg said.

"Most importantly, we did not just add a few buildings, the ISB Board affirmed that we would expand our mandate. From a school originally set up to accomodate only the needs of the children of the five founding embassies – United States, United Kingdom, Canada, Australia, and New Zealand, we were taking on the responsibility of meeting the educational needs of our wider expatriate community for whom there were no other options. We embarked upon an aggressive and forward-looking program to take control of our growth and meet the present and future needs of our constituents. The Building and Grounds Committee of the School Board took on an expanded mandate and became the Project Control Group, or as this overworked powerhouse of a workhorse committee came to be known, the PCG," said former ISB Board member Elyse Silverberg.

The rest is history.





JEDI JUGGLERS

The creator of the Jedi Jugglers program, Tim Callahan, is undoubtedly an ISB icon. Successful Jugglers learn not just to toss things artfully and catch them cleverly, but also to persist in a seemingly impossible task, to challenge gravity (if only briefly), and to astonish parents, friends, and teachers.

THE TIM CALLAHAN GREAT WALL SHOOTOUT

In 2004, ISB PE teacher and coach Tim Callahan brought to life his vision for a world-class invitational basketball tournament on campus. The Great Wall Shootout was born.

The Shootout, created as a community event sharing ISB's top sports facilities with other schools, remains a highlight of the year for everyone at ISB and the visitors. Always held within a few days of the American Thanksgiving Weekend, it's a fun and competitive tournament with a crackling atmosphere as basketball fans pack the bleachers.

In 2014, the year after Mr. Callahan's retirement following 17 years at ISB, the event was renamed the Tim Callahan Great Wall Shootout, recognizing its founder's contribution to the school and local sporting scene. Mr. Callahan worked with basketballers from the littlest Elementary School dribblers to the mightiest Varsity athletes in nearly two decades at ISB. He led teams to win the Shootout, China Cup, and APAC championships, and is still fondly remembered in 2021.

The Tim Callahan Great Wall Shootout is more than just a basketball tournament, combining sportsmanship with meaningful cultural connections. While there is a core group of local schools that regularly attend, the rotating list of participants has included the American International School of Johannesburg and big names from many other countries. Students from visiting schools get to take in sites like the Great Wall and Forbidden City during their time off court, while many friendships have been formed across school communities.







LAPTOPS ARE HERE!

With their shiny new MacBooks, they are the lucky and excited guinea pigs of our program. At the introductory session led by Mr. Stadham, things were running smoothly. He was supported by ICT staff ready to help out with missing links and password settings on the students' individual computers.

Next in line for these fabulous machines are the Grade 8 students, who were receiving theirs just as the Bulletin was going to press. Before the end of this semester, the whole of MS will have received their laptops, concluding this first phase of the one-to-one rollout. The rest of ISB will have to be patient. Next year, High School and Grades 3 and 4 will have their turn. But in any event, by freeing up the laptops previously used in the MS laptop carts, we already have our one-to-one student-to-computer ratio.

FUTURES ACADEMY (2014-2020)

The Futures Academy (FA) was launched in Middle School in August 2014. It used forms of project-based learning to integrate subject matter and facilitate an integrated approach to learning where projects were based around an "essential question" focused on real-world issues. The differences between the FA and the rest of the Middle School shrank over time as we applied innovations across the ISB secondary grades. The FA concluded in 2019-2020.

DUAL LANGUAGE PROGRAM ROLLOUT (2016-2017)

ISB launched the Dual Language Program in Elementary School in academic year 2016-2017. The program reflects the Mission, Vision, and Core Values of ISB by providing students with the opportunity to become bilingual, bi-literate, and bicultural. The Dual Language Program will expand by one grade level each year to include Grade 5 by August 2022. Students in the program are taught the ISB curriculum in English and Chinese based on an immersion model that promotes 50 percent of instruction in English and 50 percent of instruction in Chinese.








ONCE A DRAGON, ALWAYS A DRAGON





HOPE AND THE FUTURE

On the 40th day of ISB's 40th anniversary year – December 10, 2020, students reached out to future generations at the school as they buried a time capsule – a historic cache of goods and information to be opened on the 50th day of the 50th anniversary year.

During the Time Capsule Ceremony, representatives of the Elementary, Middle, and High Schools, alumni, the ISB Board of Trustees, faculty and staff, and the Parent Teacher Association deposited items ranging from ISB-branded clothing to academic schedules to campus maps in the 40th anniversary time capsule. The items were chosen to encapsulate ISB's present excellence and four decades of education services dedicated to Beijing's inspiring international community. APPENDIX 1

ISB lives its Mission, Vision, and Core Values statements. They make clear the school's principles and purpose and provide an important guide for governance and operation. Among the responsibilities of the ISB Board of Trustees is periodically assessing the statements and making adjustments to them as needed.

1980-1990

In the 1980s, it was standard practice of many international schools to adopt the mission statement (formerly referred to as purpose statement) of the Office of Overseas Schools. ISB followed suit in the early 1980s and adopted the standard mission statement along with the basic premise that "the culture and language of China be worked as much as possible into the curriculum."

1990-2000

In the early 1990s, mission and vision statements were referred to as purpose and philosophy statements.

1993-1994

It shall be the purpose of the Association of ISB to provide a Pre-Kindergarten through Grade 12 education with facilities and staff to:

- Offer an educational program based primarily upon American curricula and drawing upon the philosophy and objectives guiding the better schools in the five founding countries.
- Offer assurance of enrollment to the children of employees of the governments of Australia, Canada, New Zealand, the United Kingdom, and the United States.
- Make every effort to assure the enrollment of children of the nationals of the five founding countries.
- Open enrollment as space becomes available to the children of other nationalities capable of participating in an educational program conducted in the English language.
- Provide for the particular educational requirements of the countries noted above, including college/university preparation to ensure to the best extent possible that the students progress in their studies at a rate equal to or above that which they might have achieved in the school of their country of origin.
- Offer an education program designed to take advantage of the intercultural experiences of the students as well as the intercultural opportunities offered by the People's Republic of China.

Approved by the ISB Assocation at its AGM, October 28, 1992

The International School of Beijing (ISB) is the largest international school in China. We have grown from our humble beginnings on the U.S. Embassy compound in 1980 to a mature educational institution today. Our 1995-1996 enrollment is in excess of 1,000 students from nearly 40 countries. As an international school, we play a key role in Beijing's expatriate community.

2020-
