

Our initiatives, service learning classes, and investment in our student leaders during 2020-21, in spite of a global pandemic and a socially distanced campus, have had far reaching impacts on our campus and community!

"Because of my service learning I am thinking about new ways that I can have an impact on the world. I used to think that for any work that I do to be meaningful it had to have loads of production behind it. While working on this project I have learned that a project does not need to have bells and whistles for it to perform well. Initiatives and Student Involvement:

Our many projects and initiatives this year have not only directly impacted our students and community members, but have allowed students the opportunity for leadership and civic engagement that they would otherwise not have had access to during a pandemic year. Students involved with the CCG are able to organize and lead projects that they are passionate about, giving them a greater sense of self efficacy and independence as they work with mentors to achieve their goals.

Winter break feeding program - Provided homecooked meals, grocery store gift cards, and snack boxes to students who couldn't go home for winter break.

Community garden - Partnering with the Union County Cooperative Extension and the CCG, our HungerCorps Vista has established the Wingate community garden, developed nutrition programming, rented out raised beds to students and staff, and donate harvested produce to our local preschool.

Donations and Doughnuts - A "One Day, One Dog" fundraiser, where students from the Rel 330 SL class partnered with CCG affiliated student Isabella Walle to raise money, feminine hygiene products, clothes, and school supplies for local community partner Heart for Monroe. Together, they raised \$3,112 in donations!

Dorm dump - Diverted landfill waste on WU move-out day by collecting clothing, bedding, and other gently-used items to donate to our local community members. **CLI projects** - Our 4 cultural leadership interns created, planned, and carried out projects with the support of the CCG. They all presented at this year's Wellspring Symposium on their work, which included banners that celebrate on-campus diversity, Courageous Conversations Lyceums that gave students a platform to discuss difficult topics, putting up Student Stories boxes on campus, and creating pathways for easier bias reporting for Wingate students and faculty.

ALIEN Program - Our Adventure Leadership Immersion Experience in Nature is a leadership retreat designed and run by Dr. Nick DeLangie and CCG Leadership Intern Adden Howard. It provided an opportunity for Wingate Students in leadership positions on campus to develop their skills while participating in activities such as canoeing, archery, and article reflection.



Service Learning and Community Engagement:

Preliminary data found significantly higher end of course grades for psychology SLCE students than in non-SLCE students (Fig. 1) and data from the other courses are being compiled for public scholarship in the summer of 2021. The first cohort of fellows completed their first year long program Spring 2021 and preliminary data collected from all SLCE courses offered in 2020-2021 suggest that civic skills, civic engagement and civic efficacy are significantly higher and for some classes 21st century skills also trended higher after the course. A future goal of the fellowship is to track institutional data (GPAs, retention, and persistence to graduation) to show the impact of SLCE pedagogy on student success.
