August 26, 2021

A MESSAGE FROM SUPERINTENDENT CARLTON D. JENKINS

Dear Board Members,

This week marks the last full week before the start of our fall semester. During this week, our district staff have been leaning forward together in preparation for opening schools this fall, focusing on excellence, equity, humanity, and intentionality.

During Monday's Administrative Leadership Kick-off, our principals and district administrators were encouraged to embrace James Baldwin's famous challenge to educators and "go for broke" as they demonstrate their care and concern for students. During this professional development, David O'Connor from the Department of Public Instruction provided key insights from an American Indian perspective on infusing a truly inclusive cultural lens in our work. In addition, our administrators had the opportunity to have an extensive dialogue with the esteemed scholar Dr. Carl Grant about his book James Baldwin and the American Schoolhouse where Baldwin's work was interpreted from a historical and contemporary perspective.

On Tuesday, district leaders had a discussion with our medical advisory panel about refining policies and practices to enhance strategies to mitigate the spread of COVID-19. During this meeting, current research was shared and discussed. In addition, there was vigorous dialogue about emerging policy issues related to the strategy of mandating vaccinations for employees. The participants in the meeting seem supportive of our district being prepared to implement a full 4K-12 virtual option given the rise of the Delta variant. The insights from this discussion will certainly assist our efforts to keep students, staff, and families safe as we open schools this fall.

On Wednesday, our district participated in events which illustrated the promise of "bringing the community into the schools, and the schools into the community." During the Madison Out-of-School Time (MOST) Awards Program, our district partnered with the City of Madison to thank volunteers and employees for their efforts to engage and nurture our students in the midst of tumultuous times where our world is facing a global health pandemic and a pandemic of racial/social injustice. In addition, students, staff, and families throughout our district had the opportunity to engage our larger community and consider the themes of excellence, equity, humanity, and intentionality during the Anana Elementary School renaming celebration.

Thanks for your continued support and partnership. We look forward to providing you with more updates on our district's progress and planning next week.

4K-5th Grade Virtual Elementary Option

The following information was shared with you via email on Thursday, August 26. We are including here for your reference:

Thank you for your continued leadership as we lean forward together in preparation for the 2021-2022 school year. After reviewing feedback from multiple stakeholder groups, including our families, we will be opening up a virtual option for elementary (4K-5th grade) MMSD students. Some expressed concern over the rising incidence of the Delta variant with students in this age group not being eligible for vaccinations, which is compounded by instances of family members who are immunocompromised. As such, there is a need to provide a virtual option for 4K-5th grade students.

This elementary virtual option is rooted in doing what is best for all students while ensuring our young scholars can thrive. The deadline for families to complete an interest form is this Monday, August 30. Below, you'll find the communication we are sharing with elementary families.

Additionally, our local health care experts continue to express confidence in our <u>health</u> <u>and safety plan</u>, and we are excited to welcome students to in-person learning, five days a week. We will be utilizing key universal strategies such as masking when indoors and on buses, physical distancing, frequent hand washing and sanitizing, respiratory etiquette, symptom screening, and contact tracing.

Personal Property Aid Update

The good news is our allocation is much better for 2021-22. The correction from last year was a one-time adjustment, and we are now back up to our "standard" amount to be used each year in this calculation - \$1,191,029.48. In addition, there are two TID adjustments noted on the Department of Revenue (DOR) Estimate that bring our personal property aid estimate up to \$1,327,105.24. This amount is a positive adjustment for MMSD, as under the revenue limit it will help reduce our tax levy for this fall. We will be incorporating this information into the fall budget approval work. Attached is a copy of the DOR estimate letter dated August 18, 2021.



Here are the community metrics for the most recent two-week window (Aug 2-15):

- 1. Average daily case count is 91 and the trend is stable
- 2. Average daily percent positivity is 3.9%
- 3. Percent with at least one vaccine dose is 71.5% 82.6% of the eligible population (12+)

4. Percent fully vaccinated is 68.4% - 79.0% of the eligible population (12+)

We still see disparities in vaccine access and uptake by race/ethnicity, with our rates for one vaccine dose lowest among our Black population at 40.7% for all and 52% for eligible residents (see p. 1 & p. 3). Message to Families regarding 4K-5th Grade Virtual Elementary Option-8.26.2021

Dear MMSD Families,

School begins next week, and I hope you and your child are excited about the new school year. Earlier this summer, we announced our plans for students to begin the school year learning in person, five days per week. Today, I am writing to provide an important update for our **4K-5th grade** families who have been asking about virtual learning options for students.

After reviewing feedback from our families and stakeholder groups, we will now be offering families with 4K-5th grade elementary students a *virtual option* to start the school year. This decision comes after considering concerns over the rising incidence of the Delta variant; children under 12 years-old not eligible for vaccinations, and associated risks with family members who are immunocompromised.

The elementary virtual option is rooted in doing what is best for all students, while ensuring our young scholars can thrive. If you are interested in the 4K-5th grade virtual program, families will need to submit an <u>interest form</u> for consideration -- the deadline to complete a form is noon (12 p.m.) on Monday, August 30. Families will be notified by Tuesday, August 31, if their child will be in the elementary virtual program.

Please note, if you want your child to attend school in person, you do not need to do anything (besides completing the annual <u>enrollment process</u>) - the form should be completed **only** if you are interested in a virtual option for your elementary student.

Additional details:

- Students will need to commit to virtual instruction for one (1) entire semester.
- 4K students will participate in age-appropriate learning for 3.5 hours per day, which will include a mix of synchronous (live) and asynchronous (recorded) instruction.
- Kindergarten through 5th grade students will participate in synchronous (live) instruction for up to 3.5 hours per day (math, science, language arts, social studies) and asynchronous (recorded) instruction for specials (music, art, PE).
- Kindergarten through 5th grade students will have small group instructional time as directed by the teacher.
- Students will receive instruction from an MMSD, DPI-certified teacher.
- Students in the virtual program, and students participating in school/in-person, will follow the same scope and sequence of instruction.
- Teachers will use Zoom for meeting times.
- Seesaw will be the platform students and teachers use for schoolwork and assignments.
- The virtual option will have a limited capacity for the 2021-2022 school year to ensure instructional supports are available for all students.
