First Day of School

The first day of the 2021-2022 school year for ALL

STUDENTS will be **Monday, August 30, 2021.**

LCTI Students - LCTI will be closed on Monday, August 30.

Daily Schedule

School will start at **7:40 AM** and will end at **2:44 PM**.

Students will be able to enter the building at **7:15 AM**.

Morning LCTI students will attend homeroom at Parkland High School (PHS) prior to receiving a bus transfer to LCTI.

Late Activity Bus

The school district provides one late activity bus run each school day. The activity bus will depart from the back of the D-wing at **4:30 PM Monday - Friday** on the days students are in school. Only students engaged in school sponsored and supervised activities are eligible to use the activity bus.

Students staying at PHS for activities beyond 4:30 PM must arrange for transportation home.

From the principal's desk

Dear Parents and Guardians:

I hope you are enjoying a wonderful summer with family and friends. I also hope you and your children had a chance to vacation and spend some quality time together without the stress of school. It has certainly been a challenging stretch of life for adults, let alone high school students. As dim as that may seem, I am also encouraged by how much we learned during last year. As a person who loves interacting with kids, I am thrilled we are back to school five times a week. I am excited to see Parkland students and teachers develop and thrive in our classrooms again – and not so dependent on learning through a laptop. While we certainly do not have all the answers, we know a lot more about Covid than we did last year and now have the added potential for vaccinations of high school students and staff. Call me an optimist, but we are definitely a lot closer to the end of the pandemic than we were last year and that focus helps me get through the muck we have to traverse when situations outside of our control (such as the Delta variant) challenge us.

After some of the lessons learned last year, our goal this year is to do whatever we can to have our students in school five days a week. This is most important to students, teachers, parents and administrators. This belief, combined with the importance of student and staff safety, will require us to be flexible and make sacrifices when needed. [Parkland's face covering matrix](#) is an example of the flexibility and balance we will need to have five days a week of school while still operating safely for students and staff. We realize this is a frustrating situation for some as we start the school year, so we are implementing mask breaks throughout each day. A review of the High School Safety Plan will show that PHS will not be as restrictive as last year, but we still have important mitigation strategies we are implementing. Some of the examples include continuing the one-way hallways in most areas, limiting lunch tables to four students each, allowing (but still limiting) locker usage, and continuing with a heavy focus on hand sanitizing. On the first day of school a video will be shared with students so they can acclimate to these directions. One last item around safety includes monitoring your child's health and the biggest suggestion is to play it safe and keep an ill child home while following the student wellness directions.

One important item which has been a focus of our administrative team all summer is the rebuilding of stronger student/teacher relationships and ensuring students feel welcome and excited in coming to or returning to PHS. The impact of the pandemic has posed many challenges and it is incumbent upon us to rebuild important Parkland traditions for our students.

One way we plan to strengthen teacher-to-student and peer-to-peer relationships is through our adoption of the [Character Counts Program](#). This six-pillar program will be embedded in activities twice a month during homeroom periods, as well as reinforced by teachers through their classroom practice. To reinforce how important the start of school is to our students, the first pillar we are focusing on in September is Caring.



Any additional changes to these schedules will be posted on the school website and communicated via Schoology and School Messenger.



Student Schedules

Student schedules are currently being completed by the counseling staff and will be made available the first day of school.

If a student is considering a schedule change, request forms will be available in the Counseling Office the first day of school. Schedule change policies and procedures can be referenced in the Parkland High School Registration Information and Course Descriptions Book.

Juniors and Seniors ASVAB offered September 22

The ASVAB (Armed Services Vocational Aptitude Battery) will be offered at Parkland High School on Wednesday, September 22. The ASVAB is an excellent opportunity for juniors and seniors to complete a career aptitude test that examines different academic, mechanical and technical areas. Students interested in a military career must take this three-hour exam. The exam is free of charge and administered by military testing personnel at the high school; however, there is no obligation to meet with military recruiters if a student completes the test. Registration for the ASVAB test will take place in the Counseling Office during the first few weeks of school.

Juniors and Sophomores Take the PSAT on October 16

Juniors and sophomores are encouraged to take the PSAT (Preliminary Scholastic Assessment Test) scheduled for Saturday, October 16, 2021 at Parkland High School. The College Board allows this test to be administered only once every school year. Please mark this date on your calendar for future reference. Registration will take place in the Main Rotunda outside of the counseling office in mid-September.

Did you move over the summer?

If a student has moved over the summer to a new residence within the Parkland School District, proof of residency (2 forms) must be presented to the Counseling Office as soon as possible. Please call if you have any questions regarding this procedure.

CHARACTER COUNTS!

Reinforcing our District's commitment to educating the whole child, Parkland High School is implementing the **Character Counts Program**. Character Counts is the nation's most widely used character development framework. It is based on shared beliefs and consensus values and is currently being implemented in schools, youth sports, and civic organizations. Character Counts has no ideological or political agenda other than strengthening the moral fiber of the next generation by promoting consensus ethical values.

The Six Pillars of Character Counts are: **Trustworthiness, Respect, Responsibility, Fairness, Caring, and Citizenship**. By utilizing the TEAM (Teach, Enforce, Advocate, and Model) process we expect to strengthen these values and our students' ability to make good choices. We will be reinforcing one pillar monthly beginning with Caring in September.

College-Bound Seniors

REMEMBER

Submit your transcript release form before sending college applications

Seniors must complete a transcript release form prior to submitting college applications to the Counseling Office. Students and parents (if the student is under 18 years of age) must sign this form giving Parkland High School permission to release official academic records to colleges/universities. Students indicate on the form whether SAT and ACT scores are to be removed from the high school transcript prior to processing college applications.

Complete recommendation profile form if recommendations needed

If a college is requesting a counselor recommendation, **the student must complete a recommendation profile form highlighting individual achievements during the past four years.** Seniors need to remember to contact teachers early in the school year if they wish to request a teacher recommendation. A copy of the recommendation profile can be helpful to teachers when preparing student recommendations.

Ten school days are required to process college applications

Seniors need to remember **ten school days are required to process college applications.** Please pay close attention to application deadline dates. Submit your materials as early as possible to the Counseling Office. Seniors need to inform their counselor if they are processing an application online. Applications processed through online delivery systems (common app or coalition app) require official transcripts and secondary school information. In order to ensure timely processing of your online applications, communication with your counselor is vitally important.

Athletes applying to Division I or II schools should complete NCAA Initial-Eligibility Clearinghouse form

Senior athletes who have not completed the NCAA Initial-Eligibility Clearinghouse form should do so as soon as possible if they are interested in participating in collegiate sports at the Division I or II levels. NCAA procedures for the college-bound student athlete are available online at www.eligibilitycenter.org. Transcript requests should be made through the Parchment system.

Register to take the SAT

Registration procedures for the 2021-2022 SAT Reasoning Test are posted online at the College Board website, www.sat.org/register. The College Board requires a student photo as part of the registration process and late registration options have changed. The above changes are all part of enhanced security regulations put in place by the College Board.


Fall Play

Information from the Health Room

The 2021 – 2022 school year is upon us. As some aspects of the return to school will look more normal, others will continue to be similar to last school year. The goal of our nurses and Health Room staff remains to maintain the health, safety and wellness of every student to ensure success in the classroom.

Reminders from the Health Room staff

- * If your child has any health condition updates, please contact the school nurse to inform her of this information.

- * All students or persons entering the Health Room suite will be **required to wear a mask** during their visit (see the District Health and Safety Plan [here](#).)

- * **All medication prescription and nonprescription, must be brought to the school by a parent and/or guardian** along with the accompanying forms from the physician at the start of each school year or as your child requires medication to be administered during school hours. All medications, prescription and nonprescription, will continue to require a doctor's order and the completion of the Medication Administration Consent and Licensed Prescriber form to be administered during school hours.

- * **Emergency medications** (epinephrine auto injectors and asthma inhalers) may be carried by the student during the school day if the physician indicates this on the Medication form. Carrying emergency medications at the high school level is encouraged because of the many activities in which the students are involved.



Seniors Immunization requirement

The required immunization deadline for 12th grade students for their second dose of meningococcal vaccine (MCV) at age 16 or older is **September 8, 2021**. Students need to show proof of this immunization to the school nurse on or before this date or risk exclusion. COVID-19 vaccines are available to those age 12 years of age or older. Speak with your physician and consider getting vaccinated.

Required physical examination


All 11th grade students, as mandated by the State, need to have a physical examination. A sport physical for a PIAA high school sport may be used to complete this requirement.



The form for the school physical you receive in the mail is the preferable paperwork to be completed. However, copies of the physical forms used for the driver's permit are accepted for the student's school physical.

Please notify the Health Room as to how you plan on completing this requirement.

Completed forms should be placed in an envelope marked "Health Room" and given to the Main Office to place in the Health Room mailbox.



Latex Reminder

Several students at PHS have severe airborne Latex allergies. To protect these students, PHS is a "Latex Free" Environment. Please do not send items containing Latex (especially balloons) to the school.



Symptom Guidelines for sending your child to school

The Health Room staff would like to remind you of some guidelines to stay healthy and decrease the spread of illness during this school year. If your child, in the morning prior to school, is experiencing the following symptoms, **please do not send him/her to school**, even if they have a test or sporting event:

- ⇒ Fever of 100 degrees or more
- ⇒ Vomiting
- ⇒ Diarrhea
- ⇒ Severe head cold, Persistent cough or severe sore throat

It is advised that a student should be fever free for twenty-four hours without the use of fever reducing medications before returning to school.

All Students

All students are eligible to take the Behind-the-Wheel program offered by the CLIU-21. Students must complete either the in-class or online theory AND possess their Pennsylvania Learner's Permit. Why is Driver's Education so important even though it does not affect GPA?

Unfortunately, car crashes are the primary cause of fatalities among drivers and their passengers between the ages of 16 and 21. In fact, in Pennsylvania, about 20 percent of the auto accidents in the state in 2015 were directly caused by a young adult between these ages.

Teens and young adults tend to have a feeling of invincibility -- a car accident will never happen to them. In reality, about 33 percent of teens have texted or e-mailed while driving and drivers under the age of 20 make up the largest percentage of distracted drivers nationwide. A teenager who is talking on a cell phone while driving, not only doubles his or her risk of an auto accident, but also has a slowed reaction time comparable to a 70-year old driver.

If you have any library materials, or class novels from previous years, you can return them to the Library without penalty.



Student Assistance Program (SAP)

Tips for a successful school year



The Student Assistance Program (SAP) team has been busy over the summer updating existing programs and creating new ones to better serve your children. We are excited to work with you and your child in the 2021-2022 school year. Please take some time to review our information on the PHS website [here](#). As we approach the new school year, please see the tips below to help your child start his/her school year successfully:

Encourage your child to get plenty of rest.

Having an adequate amount of sleep is imperative to a successful high school career. Students who tend to sleep less than eight hours a night may not be as awake or alert during the day. In addition to school work, if your child plans to participate in after-school activities or sports, he/she will need to rest up to do his/her best.



Encourage your child to eat a healthy breakfast and lunch.

If your child is not a big breakfast eater, then speak to your child about eating a protein bar or smoothie.

Encourage your child to get involved with activities.

Sit with your child and review the list of after school sports, clubs, and activities. Have your child select at least one item to join.

Encourage your child to keep his/her locker organized.

There are several types of locker organization systems available. Choose a shelving system that allows him or her to store his/her books and folders in an upright position. In addition, encourage your child to hang a magnetic, dry erase board on the inside door to help him/her keep track of the day's to-do list.

Discuss expectations for the school year that you have for your child.

Review the progress on these expectations weekly or biweekly.

Encourage and remind your child to prepare for the next day.

Have your child plan his/her outfit and have books, instruments, sporting equipment, and other items in one spot so nothing is forgotten.



Create a homework area in your home.

Choose an area that is free of distractions, such as a desk in your child's room or at the dining room table, so he/she can concentrate on school work.



Watch for symptoms of anxiety in your child.

Anxiety is also accompanied by what we call thinking distortions or negative thinking patterns such as all or nothing thinking, jumping to negative conclusions, mind reading or catastrophizing. Many of the beliefs that go along with these thoughts are, "I can never do anything right! I have no friends. Nothing is ever going to turn out right. I know that they (my parents, my friends) are upset with me. Or I know that they don't like me." Discuss coping strategies with your child.

Dear Parkland Parents/Guardians,

Parkland School District's top priority is to ensure that all students learn in a safe and secure school environment. The District has emergency operation plans that are updated annually and reviewed by our District's crisis management team and emergency first responders to ensure our readiness to respond to an emergency or crisis. Parkland School District will continue to work collaboratively with emergency first responders to implement the regulations enacted by the School Safety Act (House Bill 1142) of 2018. The District has implemented an in-house risk and vulnerability program through collaboration with local law enforcement that focuses on physical site security, policy enhancement, and behavioral health programming.

Act 18 of 2019 requires schools to implement threat assessment standards and practices in all public schools for the start of the 2021-22 school term. The purpose of this legislation is to create multi-disciplinary teams that will assess and resolve threats of violence towards the school community.

Annually, our staff and students will regularly practice monthly fire drills, biannual bus evacuation drills, a weather emergency drill, and biannual security-based lockdown drills.

In spring 2018, the school district's administration met with representatives from our community's police, fire, and ambulance departments to review our monthly fire drill procedures. As a team, we decided to change our fire drill response to allow the staff in each building to "evaluate" before we "evacuate" when the fire alarm sounds. Since childhood, most of us have been conditioned to immediately leave the school building when the fire alarm is heard. The unfortunate reality today is that we need to take proactive steps to ensure our school's population are not evacuating into a potentially dangerous setting. Of course, if any staff observes any signs of an active fire (fire, smoke, odor), the staff and students will immediately evacuate the building.

The goal of any protocol is to familiarize students and staff with procedures, so they will feel comfortable, safe, and secure in the event of a real emergency. We recognize that participating in such drills may heighten anxiety for some students, especially those new to the district or even new to a building. To lessen that concern, our staff will discuss the school security drills with students in an age-appropriate context.

Please talk to your child about the importance of being prepared in the event of an emergency. Our aim is to help the students feel comfortable throughout the drill. Please refer to the information at the district website under Safety and Security to learn more about the procedures in the event of an emergency.

Keeping our students safe and secure is a community effort. We appreciate parent support in working with the school to this end. If you have any specific questions about safety and security, please feel free to contact your child's principal.





Dear Parents and Guardians,

Parkland School District is committed to improving its programs to increase the safety and security for our school community. It will implement the mandates recommended by the Pennsylvania Commission on Crime and Delinquency as promulgated in Act 18 of 2019.

The purpose of threat assessment is to proactively mitigate violence and resolve conflict that underlie threatening behavior. This research-based approach is considered best practice and therefore endorsed by the Department of Homeland Security and U.S. Secret Service. Threat assessment is considered a vital component to any comprehensive school district safety program.

The law requires each school entity to establish at least one threat assessment team for the assessment of and intervention with students whose behavior may indicate a threat to the safety of the student, other students, school employees, school facilities, the community, or others. The District has elected to create a threat assessment team at each building. It also establishes notification and referral requirements and procedures for when a team makes a preliminary determination that a student's behavior may indicate a threat to the safety of the student, other students, school employees, school facilities, the community or others. In order to carry out its duties, the threat assessment team must be given access to certain student data that is usually kept confidential, to the extent such access is permissible under federal law. County agencies and departments are required to consult with the threat assessment team in order to help the team carry out its duties, to the extent such agencies can do so in compliance with various state and federal laws.

Dear Parents and Guardians,

Parkland School District will conduct the annual *Safe2Say Something* training for 6th-12th grade students on Monday, September 20, 2021. The purpose of this annual training is to create basic awareness of the program.

In 2018, the Pennsylvania General Assembly passed Act 44 mandating the establishment and use of the "*Safe2Say Something*", an anonymous reporting system starting in every Pennsylvania school on January 14, 2019. The Office of the Attorney General (OAG) has established *Safe2Say Something* and will manage and maintain the program. The OAG, in partnership with Sandy Hook Promise hosts the *Safe2Say Something* App, website and PA-based 24/7 Crisis Center Hotline at 1-844-SAF2SAY.

Safe2Say Something is a school safety program that teaches students, educators, and administrators how: to recognize the signs and signals of individuals who may be at risk of hurting themselves or others; and to anonymously report this information through the *Safe2Say Something* App, website, or 24/7 Crisis Center Hotline.

The following provides an overview of how the program works in schools through 5 easy steps:

1. A tip can be submitted via mobile app, website, or by calling the PA based 24/7 Crisis Center.
2. The tip is then triaged by the Crisis Center to gather enough information to act on it.
3. The tip is delivered to the impacted school and as needed, local law enforcement via 911 County Dispatch.
4. The school will assess any at-risk individuals, and if needed, law enforcement will be included.
5. The school then closes out the tip and reports actions taken as a record for their school.

The Parkland School District Safety and Security Department webpage will host this information as well as the links to make a *Safe2Say Something* Student Report. Feel free to contact your building principal or myself with any questions or concerns.

Parkland High School will offer an SAT Prep Course this fall to help students prepare for the SAT Exam that will be administered on **Saturday, November 6, 2021**.

Students who participate in this course will receive preparation for both the verbal and math portions of the SAT exam. The **verbal** classes will help students prepare for the verbal section of the SAT by providing practice, test taking strategies, and test simulation in the areas of critical reading, evidence-based writing, and contextual vocabulary. The **math** classes will help students prepare for the math section of the SAT by providing practice, test taking strategies, and simulated test taking in the areas of algebra, geometry and trigonometry including problem solving, data analysis, and practice in ratios, rates and proportional relationships.

The course will consist of 10 two-hour sessions, five for each of the verbal and math components of the SAT exam. Students may register for one SAT prep session: either an after-school session (3 - 5 PM) at PHS or a virtual evening session (6:30 - 8:30 PM).

Important information about the course:

- ◊ The 10-class session course will begin on Wednesday, September 29, 2021 and continue through Wednesday, November 3, 2021.
- ◊ Classes will be held Mondays and Wednesdays.
- ◊ Students will have a choice of an after-school session from 3 - 5 PM or a virtual evening session from 6:30 - 8:30 PM as seen in the schedule on the right. In the interest of scheduling, students may **only** select one session, after-school or evening, and may not combine after-school and evening sessions.
- ◊ **The cost for the 10-class session is \$90** to cover class materials. Checks should be made payable to Parkland School District. Please mail the check to Parkland High School, attention Mrs. McLeod or drop off your payment in the designated drop box at the front desk of the Main Office.
- ◊ **Register for the class using the Fall 2021 SAT Prep Course Registration form on the [school website](#).** Course registration opens **Tuesday, September 7, 2021**. Registration closes on **Friday, September 24, 2021 at 3PM**. Registration is on a first-to-sign-up, first-to-pay basis only, so register early as space is limited.
- ◊ The course textbook will be available for students who have completed the online registration AND whose payment has been received. The book is theirs to keep. Fully registered students will receive confirmation of their registration and information about textbook distribution via e-mail.
- ◊ Once a student receives their SAT Prep Book, the \$90 fee is non-refundable.
