The Issaquah School District continues to to promote respect, positive relationships, and build on its culture of kindness and strong predictable, proactive learning environments so commitment to supporting our students through that students can lead socially and emotionally a new Positive Behavior and Social-Emotional safe and healthy lives. Our guiding goals for Support (PBSES) framework introduced in our PBSES are the following: elementary and middle schools this year. This framework uses evidence-based practices and offers multiple levels of support to serve all of our students both academically and socially. We have invested in PBSES because research shows that when a school climate is positive and predictable, students feel safer, have better academic performance, and make better behavior choices.

The Issaquah School District has been leading the way in addressing the importance of social emotional learning of students for the past several years. Three years ago we contracted with Swedish Hospital to add mental health counselors in our high schools and in 2015-2016, we added Student Support Coaches at each of our elementary and middle schools. 
