
A MESSAGE FROM MR. JOHNSON:

In the Stoughton Area School District and at Sandhill, we use Wit & Wisdom (Our ELA curriculum) to engage students with significant works of art, including paintings, illustrations, prints, sculpture, architecture, and photographs, that provide diverse access points to a topic so learners at all levels can build strong literary skills.






EXTRA CLOTHES







