

This week's medley

Choose one (or more) activity per day. Please complete 5 different activities in a week and we would like them emailed to the class email address.

The activities below are linked to this week's key text 'Owl Babies' by Martin Waddell.

<p>Play a listening and attention game with the children. Place a number of woodland-themed objects on a tray (or anything to hand) and cover with a blanket. Ask the children to guess how many are there, then double-check by counting. Remove one of the objects - can they say which one has been removed?</p>	<p>Create your own story map, this could be the Owl Babies or your favourite story.</p> 	<p>Write a note from the owls' mum telling them not to worry while she has gone.</p>
<p>Talk about the differences between the woods during the day and the woods at night-time. Can you sequence some activities that they do in the day and at night?</p>	<p>Explore 2D shapes... cut out a variety of 2D/flat shapes and then use them to create pictures of an owl, for example, a large oval for the body, 2 circles for the eyes, a triangle for the beak and 6 small rectangles for the toes. Can you make 3 owls, a big one for Sarah, medium for Bill and a small one as Percy?</p>	<p>Collect a selection of woodland objects such as conkers or small twigs. These could then be used for a variety of counting, addition and subtraction activities.</p>
<p>Create an owl family. You could create a collage, painting or drawing.</p>	<p>Act out the story and discuss the feelings of the babies and their mum at different points in the story?</p>	<p>Research owls using the internet or books you have at home. You could then write some simple fact cards with the children using the information they have learnt. Ask simple questions to see how many facts they can remember.</p>
