Investing in our future



There is nothing quite like the excitement and energy of students reconnecting with their friends and favorite teachers during the first days of school. Helping kindergarteners learn how to open their milk cartons, navigating opening lockers for the first

time with our middle schoolers, all of these interactions fill my bucket. I cannot begin to express how proud I am of our students, staff, families, and broader community for the ways in which we continue to come together to support each other.

While we had all hoped to start the school year with the pandemic behind us, our students' resilience, courage, and character continue to shine through. Our staff is focused on the important work of providing our students with a quality education while supporting them through whatever else this year brings. After last year's challenges, I know there is nothing we cannot achieve when we work together.

OUR STAFF IS FOCUSED ON THE IMPORTANT WORK OF PROVIDING OUR STUDENTS WITH A QUALITY EDUCATION WHILE SUPPORTING THEM THROUGH WHATEVER ELSE THIS YEAR BRINGS.

That does not mean there aren't still challenges ahead. This fall is an important one for our district. On November 2, district voters will be asked to decide on a critical operating levy that will make a huge impact on our district's future. After years of budget cuts, \$9 million in the last two years, we are asking our community to make an investment in our most precious resource: our children.

The failure of the referendum in 2019 had a significant impact on every part of our district. Elementary class sizes increased, our secondary schools shifted from a 7-period to a 6-period day, we lost amazing staff, and more. The referendum ask detailed in the pages of this school report will not restore all that we lost. It will, however, help us bring elementary class sizes back to where they were, provide more opportunities for our students, and prevent future budget cuts.

November Referendum addresses critical need for operating revenue

he School Board has approved one question to be placed on a Nov. 2nd Referendum Ballot to address the need for operating revenue for Eastern Carver County Schools. The Operating Levy would provide an increase in operating revenue of \$550 per pupil, which equates to approximately \$5.2 million of additional revenue in the first year. The estimated tax impact on the average homeowner would be \$20/month, based on a \$375,000 home, or \$242/year.

The 2021 operating referendum would provide resources the district needs to continue to deliver the excellent educational experience the community deserves and expects, ensuring a strong future for our schools and our community.

If the Nov. 2nd referendum is not approved, the district's fund balance will fall below 5% within three years and future budget cuts would be necessary. A successful referendum will help prevent future cuts to programs and services our community values such as 5th grade band, gifted and talented services, and athletics and activities.

The Eastern Carver County School Board unanimously approved putting an operating referendum in front of voters in the November 2, 2021 election.

The operating levy is a strategic investment in sustaining and building the district's high quality educational and programming activities into the future.

BALLOT QUESTION:

10-year operating levy to increase the general education revenue by \$550 per pupil, subject to an annual increase at the rate of inflation.

IF THE REFERENDUM IS APPROVED EASTERN CARVER COUNTY SCHOOLS CAN:

RESTORE

lower class size at the elementary schools, opportunities for choice through electives at the middle and high schools, lower fees for high school athletics and activities

PROTECT

the student experience in the classroom and beyond by preventing future cuts to programs and services our community values like 5th grade band, gifted and talented services, athletics and activities

SUSTAIN

academic support for all learners through strong classroom instruction, targeted resources, and meaningful enrichment

INVEST

in stable funding for a strong future and priorities identified in the district's strategic plan

If the referendum is not approved:

- > The fund balance would fall below 5% within three years
- > Future budget cuts would be necessary, possible impacts include: eliminating 5th grade band, reducing gifted and talented services, increasing class sizes at the elementary and secondary levels, and expanding bus walk zones.
- > Another operating levy would need to be pursued

If voters approve the referendum request, the average homeowner* would see a tax increase of about \$20/month.

An Early Childhood Screening is required before entering Kindergarten in a Minnesota public school. The screening is free and offers a simple check of how your child is growing and developing.
