# Anonymous in QSIB



Recently, secondary 1 student Daria Munzhurova was convicted of violation of the school's Acceptable Use Policy for hacking into a teacher's computer to modify the grades of both herself and classmates. The school board are still reviewing her case, however due to credible witness testimony, the guilt of Ms. Munzhurova appears incontrovertible.

Her sordid tale begins when she attempted an upgrade for her EO4 "Literary Analysis" writing unit. Her teacher, Christopher Hilgeman, is infamous for his uncompromising standards and unachievable upgrades. She, a brilliant and diligent student, courageously strived to break the tradition and earn a grade that was higher than a B. At first, Daria was enthusiastic and determined, which astonished Hilgeman, but then Hilgeman's secret weapon depleted her positive attitude.He pulled out the big guns: the annotation assignment. I have been living on the streets, scavenging through restaurant dumpsters, and eating stray kittens.' I could not comprehend the situation at hand." She then promptly burst into tears and waved away the reporters.

After calming down, she called them back over saying she had more information, "You know, maybe I should have known he was here.
