OUR VISION AND MISSION

Tulsa Public Schools is the destination for extraordinary educators who work with our community and families to ignite the joy of learning and prepare every student for the greatest success in college, careers and life. WHOLE CHILD PROMISE

Educating the whole child means supporting not only academic growth, but also ensuring that students have strong social emotional skills, participate in the fine arts, and explore diverse experiences and viewpoints.

Our students learn to be responsible decision-makers who know how to manage their emotions, build relationships, and set and achieve goals.



COLLEGE AND CAREER READINESS

Our schools offer 70+ career and technology education programs in which students can earn industry certifications. Through our partnership with Tulsa Community College, high school students can graduate with college credits. Our 12 high schools provide 100+ Advanced Placement courses with rigorous college-level content.



EARLY CHILDHOOD EDUCATION

Our early childhood classrooms provide joyful, purposeful play environments that engage students through exploration, inquiry and conversation to build language, literacy, and math skills.


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Overview of Programs

Tulsa Public Schools receives several grants from the federal government. Each grant is for a specific purpose and has its own set of rules a district must follow.

Title I, Part A - Improving Basic Programs

- The largest federal program aiding elementary and secondary education
- Goal is to supplement, or add to, state and local funding to ensure students from low-income families succeed academically

Title II, Part A - Teacher and Principal Training and Recruiting

 Aims to improve teacher and principal quality through recruitment and professional development

Title III - English Learner & Immigrant Students

 Aims to improve and enhance the education of English learners (ELs) and immigrant students by helping them attain English proficiency and meet state academic achievement standards



Overview of Programs, cont.

Title IV, Part A - Student Support and Academic Enrichment aims to improve students' academic achievement by helping districts

- provide all students with access to a well-rounded education;
- improve school conditions for student learning, supporting safe and healthy schools; and
- improve the use of technology in order to improve the academic achievement and digital literacy of all students

Title VI - Indian Education Program

 provide educational services and supplemental programs to students with Native American heritage







Overview of the 2021-2022 Programs



Title I, Part A: Improving Basic Programs \$17,521,870.08

- Primarily funds are allocated directly to Title I sites to meet identified needs.
- District level supports include:
 - Supplemental staff: Instructional mentors, school support partners, and a data analyst
 - Near-peer mentoring
 - Behavior and classroom culture support and coaching
 - Professional development stipends, materials and registration
 - Family and community engagement support and materials
 - Homeless support



Title II, Part A: Teacher and Principal Training and Recruiting \$2,123,862.32

- This is a district-level grant and sites do not receive funds directly
- Budgeted items include:
 - Professional development for educational staff and principals
 - Teacher coaches
 - Curriculum coaches
 - Recruitment



Title III: Language Instruction for English Learners & Immigrant Students

\$ 673,142.65(EL); \$0 (immigrant)

- This is a district-level grant and sites <u>do not</u> receive funds directly
- Budgeted items include:
 - English language development staff
 - Newcomer centers
 - Supplemental materials
 - Professional learning and training
 - o Parental classes and engagement



Title IV, Part A: Student Support and Academic Enrichment \$1,131,375.63

- This is a district-level grant and sites <u>do not</u> receive funds directly, though the district must prioritize the use of funds for high needs schools
- Budgeted items included:
 - Professional development for teachers and principals
 - technology
 - supporting the whole child
 - trauma and mental health training
 - core content area support, including world languages
 - Staff to support safe and healthy school climates and cultures
 - Supplemental materials



Title VI: Indian Education \$618,428

- This is a district-level grant and sites <u>do not</u> receive funds directly. Funds must support Native American students.
- Budgeted items included:
 - (1) Program coordinator
 - (1) Customer care associate
 - o (6) Resource advisors
 - (3) Teacher assistants

Title I, Part A: Improving Basic Programs

\$17,605,236.02 (+\$83,365.94)

- Continue to fund sites at the same level as 21-22 to continue to meet the growing needs of students.
- Proposed district level supports include:
 - Supplemental staff: Instructional mentors and a data analyst
 - Near-peer mentoring
 - Behavior and classroom culture support and coaching
 - Family and community engagement support and materials
 - Homeless support



Title II, Part A: Teacher and Principal Training and Recruiting \$2,123,862.32 (assumed flat funding)

- This is a district-level grant and sites do not receive funds directly
- Proposed budgeted items include:
 - Instructional mentors
 - Stipends for new teacher professional development
 - Curriculum coaches
 - Principal coaching and professional development.
 - Recruitment
 - Coaching services for behavior and classroom management



Title III: Language Instruction for English Learners & Immigrant Students

English learner grant \$660,816 (FY23 estimate) Immigrant grant \$200,000 (FY23 estimate)

- This is a district-level grant and sites <u>do not</u> receive funds directly.
- Proposed budgeted items include:
 - English language development teacher coaches
 - Newcomer centers
 - Supplemental materials
 - Professional learning and training
 - Parental classes and engagement



Title IV, Part A: Student Support and Academic Enrichment \$1,131,375 (assumed flat funding)

- This is a district-level grant and sites <u>do not</u> receive funds directly, though the district must prioritize the use of funds for high needs schools
- Proposed budgeted items include:
 - Professional development for teachers and principals
 - technology
 - supporting the whole child
 - trauma and mental health training
 - core content area support, including world languages
 - Staff to support safe and healthy school climates and cultures
 - Flipped classroom implementation
 - Concurrent enrollment partnership



Title VI: Indian Education \$633,522

- This is a district-level grant and sites <u>do not</u> receive funds directly. Funds must support Native American students.
- Proposed budgeted items include:
 - (1) Program coordinator
 - (1) Customer care associate
 - (1) Native American studies teacher
 - (6) Resource advisors
 - (1) Teacher assistant





Interested in Stimulus Spending?

Tulsa Public Schools is planning to invest the majority of these funds to maintain the operations of the district, and in the following areas related to COVID-19 recovery:

- Addressing learning loss
- Meeting the social and emotional needs of students and staff
- Building and facility improvements to improve and maintain the health and safety of staff and students.
