Public local & state funded, usually offer lower tuition rates

Private

Tuition & fees are the primary source of funding

2-year Colleges

Offer 2-year associates degree or certificate program, includes community colleges, vocational-technical, and career colleges 4-Year Colleges Offer 4-year degrees, bachelor's degree & beyond

Categories of Schools

Likely Schools	 Very likely you'll get into Your GPA > Average student's GPA at this college Perks: You can get academic merit scholarships!
Level Schools	 Your GPA and/or test scores "match" with the college's Pro Tip: Spend time finding one that's a good fit for you Perks: Can get academic merit scholarships!
Reach Schools	 Your GPA and/or test scores fall in the lower 25% of their typical incoming class' Pro Tip: Take the stress off— apply to reach schools with an open, whatever-happens-happens mindset!

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COLLEGE APPLICATION DEADLINES

EARLY ACTION

- apply early, find out early
- can apply elsewhere
- not binding: can still choose another school
- indicates strong interest

EARLY DECISION

- apply early, find out early
- apply ED to only one school
- binding: obligated to go if admitted & withdraw other applications
- indicates strong interest
- no chance to compare financial aid offers

REGULAR DECISION

- apply by deadline & find out in spring
- deadlines vary
- commit by May 1

ROLLING ADMISSION

- application open until college meets capacity
- apply when you wish, though there may be priority deadlines
- find out in a few weeks

Test Optional - College Admissions

Test optional offers students the choice to apply with or without their standardized test scores

Considerations:

- 1. Merit based scholarship
- 2. Specialized program entry requirements
- 3. The weight of supplemental application materials



Financial Aid

FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid)

- **Opens Oct. 1st** of Senior Year
- Will provide financial aid based on need

FAFSA offers three types of financial aid:



- 1. Grants: Financial aid that generally doesn't have to be repaid.
- 2. Loans: Borrowed money for college or career school; your loans must be repaid with interest.
- **3.** Work-Study: A federal work program through which undergraduates and graduate students at participating schools earn money to help pay for school.
