From the principal's desk

Dear Parents/Guardians:

Our school year certainly had a memorable start as we persevered through Mother Nature and social media difficulties within the first two weeks. The students have done an amazing job assimilating back to the school routine plus all the varied COVID protocols as well. Students are thrilled to be back with their peers and our staff is ecstatic to return to face-to-face instruction. Congratulations to the parents of our semifinalists as well.

We recently concluded fall Keystone exams for students who did not take their exam at the conclusion of last year. The state did send student Keystone results to Parkland from last spring's test takers. We are taking student data from spreadsheets and sending letters home to spring test taking families so each student can have record of their performance on last spring's exams. The state is also sending Parkland Official Keystone performance letters for each student but those documents will not come to us until later in the year. We are also having "Winter Keystones" in January. For any student preparing to retake a Keystone Exam this year, PHS will be holding Keystone "Boot Camps" to review important test content in Algebra and Biology. Supervisor of Instruction, Mr. John Monahan, will advertise these tutoring sessions later in the year so just keep an eye out for them.

For any parent looking to learn more about the college admissions process, I highly suggest attending our virtual parent workshop, "Post-secondary Planning Workshop," scheduled for Wednesday, October 20 at 7 PM. This program is very informative and includes COVID updates which impact our Junior and Senior students. I hope you enjoy the program.

Financial Aid Night

Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) Update

The FAFSA is the most important form to complete in order to qualify for most types of financial aid including federal, state, local and private grants and scholarships.

The FAFSA becomes available to current seniors on **October 1, 2021**. Families will use "prior-prior" year tax information (2020) to complete the FAFSA. The form can be accessed online at <u>www.FAFSA.gov</u>.



PSAT/NMSQT[®]

Preliminary SAT/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test

College-bound sophomores and juniors

On **Saturday**, **October 16**, the PSAT/NMSQT (Preliminary SAT/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test) will be administered at Parkland High School. We strongly encourage all college-bound sophomores and juniors to take the PSAT, which is designed to prepare students for the SAT. Please remember October 16 is the only date the PSAT/NMSQT can be administered to students at Parkland High School for the 2021-22 school year. PSAT registration information, including cost, was announced throughout the month of September.

Juniors

All juniors planning to take the SAT I: Reasoning Test should register for the PSAT/NMSQT, since it will provide an excellent review of the writing, reading and mathematical reasoning skills needed for later testing. The PSAT/NMSQT score is not posted on the high school transcript and therefore is an excellent opportunity to practice for future SAT Reasoning and SAT Subject tests. As a junior, students taking the PSAT may also qualify for National Merit Scholarships.

Sophomores

Sophomores are encouraged to take the PSAT as an opportunity to practice critical reading, writing and math problem solving skills. However, sophomores are not eligible for any merit scholarships. Please contact your child's guidance counselor if you have any questions regarding the PSAT and/or SAT offered by the College Board. CHARACTER COUNTS



The October theme of our Character Counts program is **Responsibility**. Throughout the month we will discuss the Pillar of Responsibility and how it impacts the high school student environment and beyond. From a parent's perspective, the development of a student's personal responsibility and accountability is a tremendous development in watching a child mature into young adulthood. In the high school environment, we will focus on how understanding responsibility gives students purpose, value, and a sense of direction. We knew returning to school after an 18-month layoff would be a challenge and this month's pillar of responsibility was chosen for this purpose as we further help to hone our students' skills.

Advanced Placement Testing

There are some changes to College Board's AP program. Students will now need to register for Advanced Placement exams using an online portal system through College Board's website. **Registration began on Monday, September 13 and will run through Wednesday, November 3.** Teachers have distributed the link and access code to all AP students. Students will need to know their College Board username and password. If they do not have an account, one will need to be created. Once logged in, students will use the access code to join their AP class(es). On the portal they will have access to many beneficial resources to assist them in the course. Additionally, they will have to indicate if they are taking the AP exam. All AP students will need to indicate their



exam status before November 3. For the students taking the exam, a fee of \$96, per exam, must be paid. Please make checks payable to Parkland High School. You cannot pay using the portal. No test will be ordered for a student indicating 'yes' to the exam without paying the fee. Information regarding fee waivers is available to those students and families experiencing financial hardship. A processing fee will be charged for each exam ordered from the College Board but cancelled by the student. Parchment Exchange - Electronic Transcript System

Parkland High School partners with Parchment Exchange, a service offering new technology to deliver electronic transcripts (eTranscripts) to many colleges, scholarship organizations, the military, NCAA Clearinghouse, and employers worldwide. Current students should never be charged a fee for transcript requests through Parchment Exchange. If Parchment asks for your credit card information, please log out of the system and bring your request directly to the Counseling Office. Seniors can open their Parchment accounts by logging into <u>www.parchment.com</u>.

RE: Parkland High School Attendance Procedures- 2021-2022

Dear Parents & Guardians,

If your son/daughter must be <u>absent from school OR must leave school early</u>, please follow the procedures outlined below:

- 1. Secure a Student Leave of Absence Form, which is available online:
 - In your web browser, go to the Parkland High School website, <u>http://phs.parklandsd.org</u>.
 - b. Click on the "ABOUT" tab at the top.
 - c. Scroll and click on "FORMS/PUBLICATIONS" from drop down list.
 - d. Look under "FORMS" list and click on Student Leave of Absence Form
- The form should be completed prior to any scheduled absence and/or appointment to leave early.
- 3. Send your completed form to the correct attendance office as follows:
 - a. Students in grades 9 and 10- <u>PHSLOA9&10@parklandsd.org</u> (Ms. Tracy, Secretary)
 - b. Students in grades 11 and 12- <u>PHSLOA11&12@parklandsd.org</u> (Mrs. Rosa, Secretary)
- 4. If leaving for an appointment, this form must be sent to the appropriate grade level attendance email so that the student can leave for the allotted time/remainder of day. It is recommended that the form be provided at least 24 hours in advance to allow time for processing. Upon receipt of the form, the appropriate Attendance Office will issue an E-Hall Pass to your child so he/she may leave class, sign out in the main office, and then meet the parent/guardian at the vehicle.
- 5. If you need to call your son/daughter off from school due to an unplanned absence (exillness), a parent/guardian must contact the PHS Attendance Office at 610-551-5655 (then click on the number for your child's grade level as prompted) to report a student's absence. This attendance hotline is available 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. If a call is not received, then a Student Leave of Absence Form must be presented upon student's return from school.

Your attention to this procedure will assist us in ensuring that your child's absence and/or requests to leave early are properly and efficiently processed and documented.

All Parkland athletes must get an ImPACT test once during their four years at PHS and before participation.

Information from the Health Room

Now that the school year is in full swing, the Health Room would like to remind you of some important information. For information regarding the Coronavirus (COVID-19), please see the <u>district website</u>. Contact the Health Room with questions.



The Flu Season occurs from October through April. With the COVID-19 pandemic, it is more imperative to get the flu vaccine. Check with your doctor about getting the flu vaccine for your student.

To help stay healthy and decrease the spread of illness in the school, we are encouraging all families to adhere to the following guidelines for sending your child to school.

If your student is experiencing any of the following symptoms, please keep them home from school:

- Fever of 100 degrees or more
- Vomiting
- Diarrhea
- Severe head cold, persistent cough or severe sore throat

It is advised that a student should be fever free for twenty-four hours without the use of fever reducing medications before returning to school.

Colds and Allergies

Please be advised that the Health Room **does not** have cold or allergy medications. If your student has cold symptoms or allergies, please medicate as needed before or after school.

Juniors

Return Completed Physicals to the Health Room

All eleventh grade students should return their physicals to the Health Room as soon as possible. Forms are available on the PHS website.

New Immunization Requirement

The meningitis vaccine is required on or after your student's 16th birthday. Students in grade 11 will be required to have this immunization on the first day of their senior year. The eleventh grade physical is a good time to be sure this immunization is completed.



Reminders about medication during the school day

Students who need medication during the school day will need to submit a parent authorization and a physician's order for prescription or over-the-counter medications.

All medication, prescription and nonprescription, must be brought to the school by a parent and/or guardian. Forms are available on the PHS website.





Driver's Education

Autumn Driving Risks and Tips

Each year, the transition from summer to autumn brings with it the much-anticipated return of colorful foliage, sweater weather, football season and all things pumpkin. However, the beginning of fall also comes with potential driving risks, including slippery roads, decreased daylight, fog and sun glare. Autumn weather can be unpredictable and conditions can change drastically within a matter of minutes. Prepare yourself and your vehicle for the changing of the seasons with the following tips to help you drive safely in the fall.



Fall weather can change rapidly from warm to cold, causing roads to ice over overnight.

- Drive slowly and brake gently when driving across overpasses and bridges, as these surfaces tend to frost over before others.
- Be aware of spots where black ice forms on the roadway and drive carefully through these areas.

Extreme changes in temperature will cause your tires to expand and contract, which may lead to a loss of tire pressure.

- Check your tire pressure daily.
- Before starting your vehicle, clear away any frost on your windows and check that your tires are properly inflated and have plenty of tread.

CLIU-21 Behind the Wheel (BTW) Course Information

Parkland students are eligible to complete the BTW driving course if they are age 16 or older, have a valid permit and have completed the in-class or online theory course. Students who complete the 6-hour course are able to take their PA Driver's License test at PHS (which saves you another trip to the DMV). Parent Alert: New Drug called Khat

Please read the information on a new drug called Khat that is making its way to our area.

What is it? It is a stimulant drug made from the leaves and twigs of the evergreen shrub. This drug's active ingredients are cathine and cathinone.

Street names to be aware of include: Abyssinian Tea, African Salad, Catha, Chat, Kat, Miraa, Oat, Qat, and Quaadka.

How it is taken: Chewed dried khat is used as a tea or chewable paste, smoked, or sprinkled on food.

How does it affect the body? Users can experience manic behavior with grandiose delusions. Chronic use can cause depression and suicide, hallucinations, paranoia, nightmares, euphoria, increased alertness and energy, hyperactivity, increase in blood pressure and heart rate, cardiac complications, insomnia, and gastric disorders.

Dear Parents/Guardians,

We are proud to serve the students of the Parkland School District. We continually strive to provide a safe and secure learning environment for all students and staff in our school buildings.

In order to maintain a safe environment for your children to study and learn, it is necessary that we practice our emergency and crisis response plans by conducting drills that exercise our procedures to better prepare staff and students. There are a few basic response drills as stipulated by the Pennsylvania Department of Education that we practice throughout the school year – *Lockdown, Shelter-In-Place*, and *Evacuation*. Parkland School District adopted the active assailant protocol endorsed by the Department of Homeland Security called *Run, Hide, Fight* as of August 2018.

Act 44 of 2018 stipulated that commonwealth schools conduct one security-based drill within the first 90 school days in lieu of a monthly *Evacuation Drill*. The law also allows commonwealth schools to replace an additional monthly *Evacuation Drill* with a security-based drill after the first 90 days of school. Parkland School District conducts annual *Lockdown Drills* to meet this requirement during the months of October and February.

In accordance with Act 44 of 2018, we will be conducting a security-based drill by practicing a *Lockdown Drill* with all students and staff members. As part of the legislation, Parkland School District will invite local law enforcement and first responders to help evaluate and improve our emergency protocols and practices. Feel free to contact your building principal or myself with any questions or concerns.
