

Stability and Technology for our Kids

South Washington County Schools (SoWashCo Schools) faces inadequate state funding, increasing educational costs, continued budget cuts and the need for enhanced technology as a tool for learning. To help, SoWashCo Schools is asking voters to consider a school funding increase on the Nov. 2, 2021 ballot.

Why now?

- Our savings account is below board policy at 4.7%
- Cuts of \$9.4 million for the 2021-22 school year
- Federal, state and local funding is not keeping pace with inflation or the educational needs of our students
- Expanded dependence on educational technology for personalized learning
- Devices for every student require modern and reliable technology infrastructure

What's on the Ballot?



QUESTION 1 – STABILITY

Operating Levy

Operating levies are voter-approved and provide funding for classrooms, instruction and other school operating costs.

- SoWashCo Schools is asking voters to consider revoking the 2015 and 2017 operating levies to create a new levy that increases funds from \$1,536.60 to \$1,886.60 per student.
- The operating levy would generate an additional \$6.9 million per year.
- The funds would include an annual increase at the rate of inflation for 10 years.



QUESTION 2 - TECHNOLOGY

Capital Projects Levy

A capital projects levy provides funds for improved instructional technology, tech support, maintenance for student devices and enhanced technology infrastructure.

- SoWashCo Schools is asking voters to consider revoking the current capital project levy to create a new levy that increases funds from \$112 to \$270 per student.
- The capital projects levy would generate an additional \$3 million per year.
- The increase would be in place for 10 years.



What's on the Ballot?






State Basic General Education Funding per Student







If state funding had kept pace with inflation over the past 18 years, we would have received nearly \$561 more per student last school year – or a total of \$10.4 million.

When compared to every school district in the state of Minnesota with a capital projects levy, SoWashCo Schools has the lowest levy at only \$112 per student.

Shown: School districts with a capital projects levy among the top 10 districts by student population.

- Provide stability in operations to address facility and enrollment needs
- Limit additional budget cuts to programs and staffing
- Expand digital access to curriculum and learning tools
- Maintain and update the devices distributed to students and staff during the pandemic
