These values include, but are not limited to, graduation rates, dropout rates, college preparation, workforce endorsements, attendance rates, reading readiness, community involvement, financial efficiency, student discipline, digital learning, participation in extracurricular activities and much more.

We are proud of all of our students who have excelled in robotics, college preparation, workforce readiness, fine arts, athletics, as well as those who are going into the military and those who display our Core Values of trustworthiness, respect, responsibility, fairness, caring and citizenship. Indeed, CCISD is not just a place to learn but it is a place to develop character.

We believe in a community-based accountability report that inspires our students and staff to pursue excellence rather than creating students who become expert multiple choice test takers. Ultimately, we are responsible and accountable to our students and their future, not an agency or a legislature.

In this report you will undoubtedly

discern that the state assessment is neither valued nor the focus of our attention. The rationale for this decision is based on the fact that this assessment is not a predictor for college success or workforce readiness. Nor does it give us real-time information to share with our students, parents and staff for continuous improvement. Assessment and accountability is important to all of us but the State of Texas Assessment of Academic Readiness (STAAR) is an assessment that cannot guide educational decisions about children or professional learning. Furthermore, STAAR can only be used for rank ordering students and your children are much more important to us-and so are their futures.

I hope you enjoy this report which outlines our values, strengths, and opportunities for improvement.

QUALITY OF TEACHING STAFF

The Clear Creek Independent School District (CCISD) employs more than 4,800 staff members to provide varied educational and support services across the 100 square miles of the district. The district has 26 elementary schools, ten intermediate schools, five comprehensive high schools, an early college high school, an alternative high school, an evening school, a virtual high school and a disciplinary placement center. The school district has six support facilities.



On average, 12% of district employees resign annually. The reasons for resignations are ranked as the highest reason (1) to the lowest reason (4).

For the past four years, the school district has been ranked among the top workplaces in Houston as determined by Workplace Dynamics, LLP and the Houston Chronicle. Both third party entities compare employee results against equally sized corporations and organizations across the Houston metropolitan region. In comparison to similar-sized school districts surveyed by these third parties, CCISD's highest rated factor was leadership direction and the lowest was pay and benefits in 2012. In 2015, the highest was execution and the lowest was pay and benefits.

One's heartfelt passion creates limitless possibilities CURRICULUM AND COURSES OFFERED The Clear Creek Independent School District offers 2,221 courses at the intermediate and high school levels. The district's 26 elementary schools offer traditional core and electives such as English, Math, Science, Social Studies, Physical Education and Health, Music and Art.

The school district employs curriculum coordinators for each core and general elective area. The curriculum coordinators, in conjunction with campus teachers and technology specialists, develop and revise curriculum based on the Texas Essential Knowledge and Skills. Teachers are provided professional learning throughout the school year to support them in developing lesson plans based on the district curriculum.

When asked how satisfied you are with the job the Clear Creek Independent School District is doing at educating children, 85% of respondents of the 2016 Baselice and Associates LLP phone survey said they were pleased. Compared to students nationwide, survey respondents believe CCISD students' achievements are 67% better than average.


ADVANCED PLACEMENT COURSEWORK

The District offers Pre-Advanced Placement (Pre-AP) and Advanced Placement (AP) courses at the intermediate and high school levels. The coursework is developed by the College Board. These classes and subsequent AP exams are accepted by universities around the world. At the high school level, CCISD students enrolled in 30 different AP courses in 2015. Out of a total 7,555 AP course enrollments in those 30 AP courses, 5,010 optional AP exams were taken at a rate of 66%.

DUAL CREDIT COURSEWORK

Students in CCISD can simultaneously earn college hours and high school credit. Courses offered for dual credit stem from agreements with San Jacinto Community College and College of the Mainland. The courses are either taught by college professors on a college campus or by credentialed instructors. Students must meet certain qualifications to enroll in a dual credit course. The numbers reflected in the chart include the college hours earned through Clear Horizons Early College High School (CHECHS) where students can simultaneously earn a high school diploma and a college associate's degree by the time they graduate high

CCISD students score higher on the AP exams than their state and global peers. A score of 3 is the standard which many colleges accept for college credit.



school. Of the students who earned college credit hours in 2015-16, 447 were enrolled at CHECHS, while the remaining 728 students were enrolled at another CCISD high school.


CAREER AND TECHNICAL EDUCATION (CTE) COURSEWORK AND CERTIFICATIONS

CCISD utilizes federally defined career clusters and the Achieve Texas Initiative to prepare students for career preparation. CCISD offers 14 career pathways that are aligned with Texas' graduation requirements and the newly implemented graduation endorsements. Each pathway combines academic and career related courses. Eighty-seven percent of 12th grade students are enrolled in one or more career-related courses.

Students who are successful in their coursework have the opportunity to take a test within a respective industry and

earn a certification which are often reserved for college or technical education schools. This coursework helps students understand the relationship between education and careers and engages students in their own learning so they make informed decisions, graduate from high school, and complete college.

Based on the current certifications offered in CCISD, the district has experienced a 5% drop in the number of students who have successfully earned their respective workforce certifications.



STUDENT ATTENDANCE

Certificates earned

Student attendance is integral to high levels of instruction and learning. The attendance rate for CCISD students was 95.9% in 2013-14. The 2014-15 attendance rate slightly decreased to 95.8%. The Texas Education Agency reports lag a year behind.



COLLEGE ENTRANCE EXAM SCORES

In general, CCISD students perform at a higher level than their statewide and national peers on the PSAT, SAT, and ACT exams. Approximately two-thirds of CCISD students who took either PSAT, SAT, or ACT met or exceeded the Texas uniform admissions requirements for the respective college readiness/entrance exams. The assessment data include all students who have taken the PSAT, SAT, and ACT. PSAT scores include freshmen, sophomores, and juniors who took the assessment. The College Board provides comparison data for college-bound seniors.



COLLEGE-BOUND SENIORS SAT PERFORMANCE

College-bound seniors are determined by which students request a copy of their test score to be sent to a college in consideration for admission. CCISD students exceeded the state and global scores in 2014 and 2015.

GRADUATION RATES AND POST-SECONDARY DECISIONS

The graduation rate as reported by Texas for CCISD slightly increased from 96.9% in 2014 to 97.1% in 2015. The CCISD graduation rate for 2015 is higher than the state by 8.1%.

POST-SECONDARY DECISIONS

While the Clear Creek Independent School District educates students up to grade 12, it also considers what those graduates do after high school as an indicator of post-secondary readiness. Every year, CCISD has seen an increase in the percentage of students completing high school as well as a steady increase of high school graduates attending a two or four year college. On the national level and as of October 2015, 69.2% of 2015 high school graduates enrolled in a college or university, according to the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics whereas 87.6% of 2015 CCISD graduates enrolled in either a four year or two year college. The 2,937 graduates of CCISD in 2015 attended one of more than 289 accepting universities and colleges.

ANALYSIS

The College preparatory program in CCISD is strong. College entrance exam scores, including PSAT, SAT, and ACT, as well as the percentage of students scoring a 3 or higher on Advanced Placement Exams, exceed state and global averages. Since 2012-13, the number of students earning one or more college credit hours per year has increased, as has the number of students taking an Advanced Placement exam. Since 2013, the graduation rate has remained at nearly 97% (with the dropout rate declining) and nearly 90% of CCISD graduates are enrolled in college in the fall semester following high school graduation.

MAINTAINING STUDENT DISCIPLINE

KEEPING CAMPUSES SAFE

The Clear Creek Independent School District is committed to ensuring safe and nurturing learning environments for students and staff.

Clear Creek ISD has a fully staffed Safe and Secure Schools Department which is led by a veteran security advisor for the North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO). Staff is trained in the Federal Emergency Management Agency's National Incident Management system and also partners with the Texas School Safety Center. CCISD hired a third-party safety company to audit elementary schools immediately following the tragic events in 2012 at Sandy Hook Elementary in Newtown, Connecticut. The year-long audit and campus assessments were presented to the Board of Trustees during the February 2014 general meeting. The Board approved \$1.8 million in capital improvements to further enhance the physical security inside and around elementary schools. Of the committed funds, CCISD has expended \$1,442,378 to date on upgrades described in this report, leaving a balance of \$392,164 for future safety improvements.

DISCIPLINE

Maintaining student discipline is instrumental in ensuring a safe and nurturing learning environment. The school district has established a set of core values of how students and adults should conduct themselves at all times. The district believes over time this intentional focus on

CAMPUS SAFETY AND SECURITY ENHANCEMENTS

Secure Vestibule/Electronic Access Control – Over the past year, all 26 elementary schools were renovated and equipped with new security vestibules which are electronically locked and controlled from the main office. Additionally, Clear Brook High School was the only CCISD high school without a secure entrance. The 2013 bond package funded a new school entry, secure vestibule and enclosed front courtyard, as well as administrative space.

Video Surveillance – All campus common areas, access points and school perimeters are monitored and footage recorded via video surveillance.

New Visitor Management System – In 2015, CCISD began using the Hall Pass Visitor Management System which conducts an enhanced National criminalbased search on all volunteers as well as an automatic sex offender registry check on all visitors to a campus.

Perimeter Fencing – New fencing was erected over the past year at all elemen-

tary campuses to create a separation of space where students are engaged in outdoor activities. This measure also controls access to the public during the school day, except through the intended secure access point at the front office.

Intercom Systems – Substandard intercom systems were replaced at 17 campuses providing for a more reliable system for general paging, bell operations and emergency communications.

Fire Alarm Systems – During the past year, fire alarm systems were standardized across the district replacing detectors exceeding 10 years of age. The upgrade included conforming to current ADA standards requiring a strobe or horn/ strobe in every classroom.

Intermediate Campus Safety Risk & Vulnerability Assessment – A comprehensive audit was completed during the 2015-2016 school year and an implementation plan is in progress.

individual and positive behavior will decrease student discipline. Overall, CCISD's student discipline rates are less than the state and regional averages. The data presented below is based on 2014-2015 information as the updated state report has not been released for 2015-2016. Safety is a top priority at CCISD and parents, students, and staff indicate that students are feeling safe at school, as evidenced from survey feedback: parents (95%), students (81%), and instructional staff (96%) reported students feeling safe at school.

YOUTH MENTAL HEALTH

Training - All CCISD counselors, nurses and Sheriff Liaison Officers have been trained in Youth Mental Health First Aid (YMHFA), an intensive 8-hour course which trains staff how to identify, understand and respond to signs of mental illness. An additional 600 district staff and community members took advantage of the YMHFA course. All certified district staff take online suicide awareness training, in addition to face-to-face training received at the start of every school year.

Bullying Prevention – CCISD Prevention Services developed a fourth and fifth grade half-day program called BoB, or Being our Best. By 2017, all elementary campuses will have implemented BoB on their campuses for fourth and fifth grade students. Also during the 2015-2016 school year, a sixth grade half-day bullying prevention program was developed, Stepping Up, and will be implemented at all intermediate schools in 2016-2017. The seventh grade program will be implemented during the 2017-2018 school year. These programs are supplemented by guidance lessons and other campus based programming.

COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT, EDUCATION & COMMUNICATION

Emergency Communications – CCISD uses the SchoolMessenger system to communicate with parents/guardians in the event of an emergency. The system provides immediate email, phone and text communication capabilities. The District also utilizes a community hotline, 281-284-0027, for the public to call and receive a recorded message with the latest information on an emergency.

Emergency Management Protocol Guide

 All staff are provided with an Emergency Management Protocol Guide to serve as a reference and training tool on roles and responsibilities during emergency situations. Staff and students are annually trained on the procedures during homeroom and advisory periods.

Community Safety Presentations – During the 2015-2016 school year, town hall-style safety presentations were conducted at each PK-12 Community lead campus. Administrators from the campus and Safe & Secure Schools department led the meetings to inform their community on PK-12 emergency management procedures, the protocol guide and reviewed emergency communications to ensure parents and guardians were educated on the tools used, such as emergency texting.

During times of severe weather, District administrators work in partnership with the National Weather Service and local affiliates to make decisions in the best interest of students and staff.

CRIME PREVENTION, REPORTING & TOOLS

Galveston County Sheriff Liaison Officers - CCISD's partnership with the Galveston County Sheriff Liaison Officers (SLOs) includes a K9 Drug Narcotics Detective that rotates to all campuses. SLO officers are on each campus during the school day and also provide on-site security for after-school events.

TRANSPORTATION

Traffic Analysis – The district employs various methods, including drone technology, to monitor traffic flow at campuses to mitigate potential traffic hazards during arrival and dismissal.

School Bus Monitoring – Video surveillance cameras and GPS tracking systems are utilized for school bus speed and location monitoring. Crime Stoppers – An internationally-recognized program, Crime Stoppers allows students, staff and the community to provide anonymous tips to school administration and local law enforcement. Staff Training – All school bus drivers and aides are required to conduct monthly safety training modules using Safe Pupil, an online video-based training program.

ANALYSIS

Enrollment growth continues to be one of the biggest challenges facing Clear Creek ISD. While this accountability report is based on actions and data from the 2014-2015 school year, enrollment trends between 2014-2015 and 2015-2016 yielded a net growth of more than 670 students, bringing several elementary schools and intermediate schools above capacity. This growth has created overcrowded schools and classrooms.

TECHNOLOGY IN THE CLASSROOM

At the heart of CCISD's Long Range Technology Plan is the recognition and resources, both financial and human, required for students to learn any time, any place and at any pace. This is achieved through providing each student a tablet or laptop computer, also known as the Latitude to Learn (L2L) initiative. The L2L benefits include:

- Access to online reference materials
 and research
- Ability to use interactive, online textbooks and not have to carry 20-30 pounds of textbooks from

class to class or home (which often become obsolete as they are published)

- Access to scientific and graphing calculators
- Access to a personal organizer and calendar that can include tasks and dates of assignments or tests, and updated by student, parent, or teacher
- Assistive technology, including: speech-to-text and text-to-speech recognition; visual and text communication, life skills, numeracy skills, literacy and language development,

and behavior tracking applications

 Globalized communication and collaboration with students in other classes, schools, states, or countries

Students in grades 4-12 were provided with a district-issued device and students in grades 6-12 were able to take the devices home. According to a 2016 phone survey, 98% of the CCISD community has wireless internet access at home. The school district has been monitoring the L2L implementation through various methods including student use of itsLearning, online textbooks, and Skyward.

Eighty-two percent of elementary and secondary students surveyed say they understand what digital citizenship means. Survey data reveals a strong affinity to the 1:1 initiative by elementary students, but less at the secondary level in which students, staff, and parents strongly rely on consistently working devices and internet connectivity or else revert to traditional instruction and learning practices. CCISD must strive to bridge the digital divide, not only between adults and students, but also among various grade level bands of students. Despite the hardware and connectivity challenges in 2014-15, with substantial increases to the bandwidth, the availability of a digital

learning platform (itsLearning), and additional technology integration coaching /support, the Latitude to Learn (L2L) initiative had a more promising outlook in 2015-16.

Digital Citizenship

A majority of staff and students believe students know what digital citizenship means. In 2015-16, the understanding of digital citizenship has increased by 7% for staff and decreased 2% for students. Parents had the option to select "Unsure" as their answer choice in 2015-16 (39% of whom did so) while 51% agreed that their child understood the meaning of digital citizenship.





HOUSE BILL 5 COMMUNITY AND STUDENT ENGAGEMENT

The 83rd Texas Legislature passed House Bill 5 (HB 5) in 2012 and as part of the legislation, all Texas public school districts are required to evaluate the district's performance and the performance of each campus in regard to community and student engagement. Districts must assign one of four performance ratings Exemplary, Recognized, Acceptable, or Unacceptable for each of the following categories:

The Texas Education Agency nor the Legislature provided guidance to districts regarding the criteria for determining the community and student engagement

performance ratings. Ratings were determined by staff, students, and community input, which was conducted through a survey in the spring of 2016. The HB 5 report shows the many opportunities students and community members have to be engaged in Clear Creek ISD schools. The ratings in the back of this report are also supported by the 2016 Baselice and Associates, LLP community survey and from the 2016 Office of Assessment and Evaluation parent climate survey.

Shared responsibility is essential to community success community involvement The Clear Creek Independent School District's success is in large part due to the invaluable school-to-home partnership and overall community support for public education. The Community-Based Accountability Report measures community involvement based on parent surveys, volunteer hours, and civic and business partnerships.

Bi-annually the school district conducts a random phone survey which measures the community's perceptions of Clear Creek ISD on varying topics from fiscal management to academic achievement.

The survey sample is balanced geographically and demographically across CCISD's 100 square miles.

Based on the 2014 Baselice and Associates, LLP random sample phone survey, the community ranked parental involvement (36%) as the biggest challenge facing the Clear Creek Independent School District, tied with school funding (36%). Also, 85% of parents surveyed in 2014, through the District's annual climate survey, gave an A or B when asked, "What grade would you give your child's school for community and parental involvement?"

DECISION MAKING AND VOLUNTEERING

ANALYSIS OF COMMUNITY INVOLVEMENT

Strengths - CCISD has a high level of community involvement as demonstrated by survey results and donations received. Parent satisfaction with district communications have increased steadily since 2009 and 88% claim to be involved in decisions that affect their child's education. PTA membership continued to be over 11,000 for the second consecutive year. Donations from booster clubs, PTA, businesses, and community members totaled nearly \$4 million since 2014-15 with over \$1.8 million donated to high schools, over \$438,000 to intermediate schools, and over \$915,000 to elementary schools. In addition, the Clear Creek Education Foundation raised over \$950,000 to award 64 teacher grants since 2014-15 and provide funding for Clear Horizons Early College High School, technology labs, National Board Teacher Certification reimbursements, and technology integration videos. Survey results in 2014 revealed 63% of parents were satisfied with teacher feedback to help their children at school, yet this percent increased to 80% in the 2016 survey.

DISTRICT FINANCIAL SNAPSHOT

The tax rate remained constant between 2014-15 and 2015-16 at \$1.40 per \$100 valuation. Between both years, the annual operating budget increased by \$13.3M

and the instructional budget increased by \$7.3M. Average expenditures per student increased \$246 per student.
