# LETTER

## FROM IVAN

### Between Street and Sky

My brother and I, we spent sleepless Spanish Harlem nights amongst the city's poor. And our days - we spent our school days restless alongside the children of the city's wealthy. Little beyond narrow streets for some. Nothing but blue skies for others. So, somewhere between street and sky, our school was founded. And our father, The Preacher, the way he walked down these mean streets, he gave us little room to choose. So we chose the streets, and that has made all the difference.

25 years ago my brother said "Let's start a school." I am so glad he did. We began with the patriot's principle that all children are created equal. And we put the pursuit of happiness, grounded in Aristotelian virtue, at the center of our life together. And in this Age of Anxiety, we have found true serenity in Spanish Harlem. Meanwhile, so much joy is lost in this city. Children strain under the weight of hostile homework, testing, and tutoring regimes, and find their souls fading away in the glow of spectral friendships, framed in an iPhone rectangle — or tremble in the fear that the one who knocks will tear their mother away.

But on 103rd Street we have built an enduring, defiant love among the ruins. The State of the School is strong. It is a school where we create and share lives of deep meaning, dynamic virtue, and transcendent joy. It is a school where the education is separate - but more than equal to the best schools in our city and beyond. And this strength of our school is in no small part due to you, beloved supporter! I am so fortunate to share so many smiles and victories with you through the years.

25 years ago my brother said, "Let's start a school." I am so glad he did. If only just for this. This place of serenity and dynamic virtue - a home where every body, soul, and mind grows stronger and in harmony. If only just for these moments with these Warrior Poets. These children who come from people who still honor the teacher, the moment, and the dignity of labor. Who hold family and Holy Bible - or the Holy Koran - so close. Along with, you dear friends, I know of no finer group of Americans. These people with the low incomes and the highest of values. Our families have survived servitude, crossed deserts and seas, and endure a mad Pharaoh raging in his dotage. Quite biblical and classical has been their passage. They are not the chosen people, but we who support them are the chosen, because these beautiful people have chosen us. On 103rd Street, they reawaken us all to the American Dream.

Yes, Gluck+, our architects, have built the walls - built the walls and a roof right over our heads, and we share the shelter of our home of the free and the brave. A place for us, where daily we restore some balance to a nation that has been sent reeling.

But right now is time to move beyond a sleepless childhood, past patriot's dreams and nightmares. Our students, these poets, our happy warriors - with body, spirit, and mind forged by the austerities of sport and stillness, the rigors of a true liberal arts education, and our loving fellowship, have become the ones for whom we have been waiting.

# SCHOOL YEAR HIGHLIGHTS

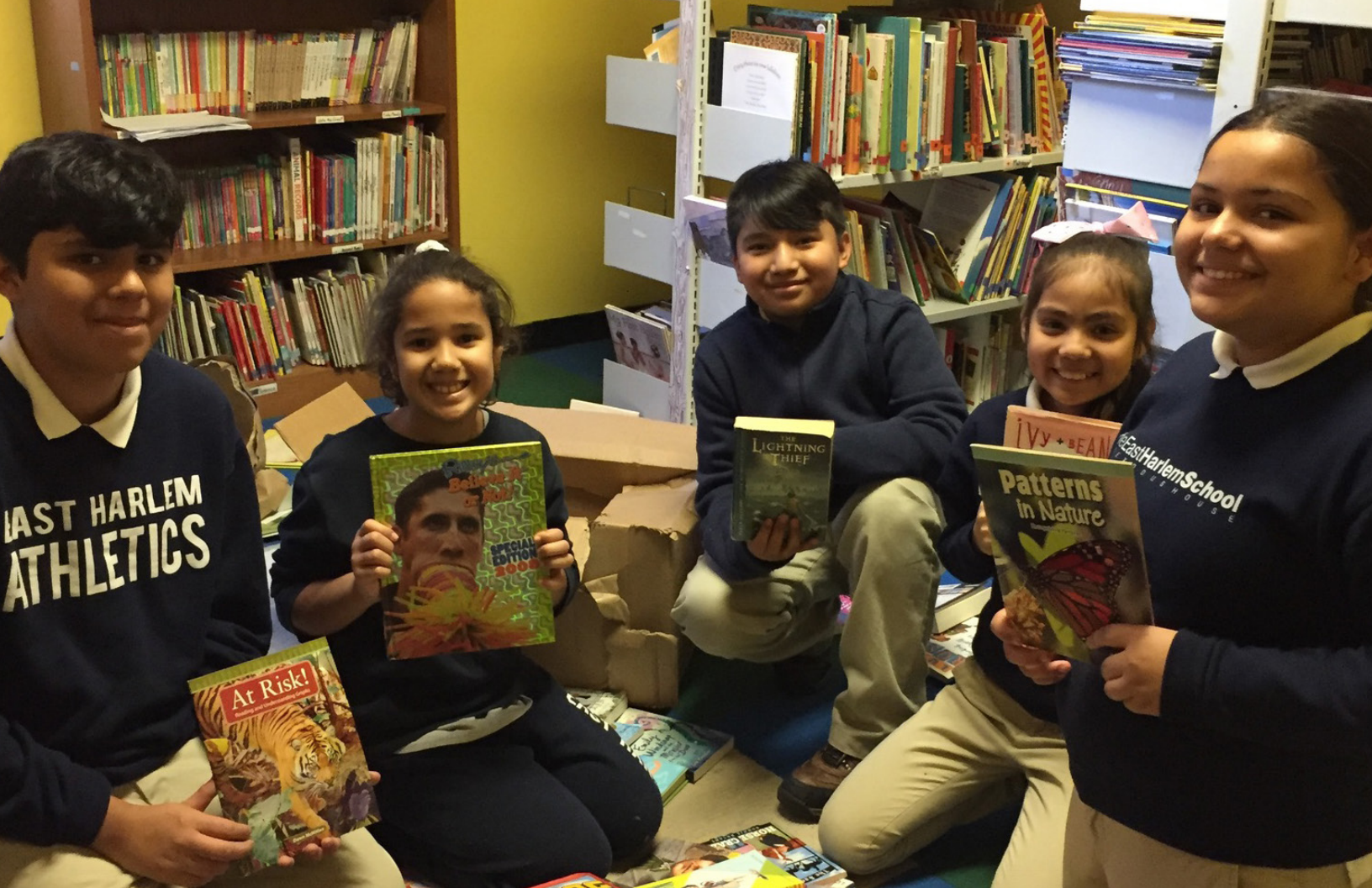


## Academics

In the 2017-18 school year, our Humanities curriculum focused on the development of dynamic reading, lapidary and compelling writing, active and compassionate listening, and mindful and compelling speech. Our Math curriculum developed our students' ability to see and engage with symmetries, proportionality, and patterns, both symbolically and in application. Our Science curriculum taught inquiry and experimentation through scientific reading and writing, graphing, and active experimentation in our exploration of the physical and biological world. Finally, our Spanish curriculum explored culture, history, and current events of Latin American countries in their national language.







## Day of Service

EHS hosted a school-wide day of service to coincide with the 2017 Thanksgiving holiday!

Contributing to one's community is a daily point of emphasis for EHS students and this inaugural day of service emphasized The East Harlem School's commitment to helping those in need. After a meditative walk through Central Park, groups of students volunteered at various community service programs throughout the city including:





### **Carter Burden Center for the Aging**

Students crafted holiday decorations and played bingo with a group of residents.

### **Citymeals on Wheels**

Students hand-delivered meals throughout Manhattan.



### **Randall's Island**

Students helped clean up the fields where they practice and play, and planted balls of seeds, clay, and soil which will sprout in the spring!

### **UES Rehabilitation and Nursing Center**

The EHS student choir spread holiday cheer with a medley of songs for the residents at the Center.



### **Union Settlement**

Students created bags of food for Thanksgiving dinners and handed them out to members of the community.

### **West End InterGen Residence**

Students organized the children's library on site and served lunch to residents.





## Frick Club

This spring, 7th and 8th Graders continued to participate in an ongoing partnership with The Frick Collection, visiting the museum monthly to closely examine and discuss various works of art. Students cultivated a deeper appreciation for art through group dialogue, as well as participating in drawing and writing projects. This year's partnership culminated in three poetry-writing workshops at which students wrote poems inspired by works of art in the Collection. In May, a small group of poets were filmed performing their poems in the Frick's galleries.





## Washington DC Girls Leadership Trip

For the sixth year, a select group of EHS 7th grade girls traveled to Washington D.C. where they explored the nation's capital and learn about our national government. # ATHLETICS



## Wrestling

For the third year, Joe Favia, Head Wrestling Coach at Steven's Institute of Technology, put on a seven session wrestling clinic for the 7th and 8th grade. Joe, sometimes joined by a group of his college wrestlers, worked with 8th grade students to sharpen their fundamentals and add new techniques to their grappling repertoire. As the EHS wrestling program continues to grow, we can't thank Joe enough for his tutelage!

EHS 7th grader, Ken Pardo, won the city wrestling championship for his weight class, setting the tone for an undefeated season of dual meets for our team. Several students also participated outside of school in weekend meets in New Jersey and Long Island. Eleven students, girls and boys, competed in state qualifiers, and 8th graders Eduardo Cantero and Matthew Romano participated in the state tournament.

## Beat the Streets

This year, EHS continued its partnership with the Beat the Streets, a NYC based non-profit dedicated to empowering disadvantaged youth through wrestling. Over the course of several weeks, EHS partnered with Beat the Streets to launch and deliver a wrestling program for our 7th and 8th graders to focus on their physical, mental, and emotional development.



## Girls Soccer Season

The EHS girls soccer team had an incredible fall season, finishing with a 6-1-1 record! Despite coming up short in a tough playoff loss to Hunter, the season was one to build on for many more successful years to come. Several players represented EHS in an Uptown vs. Downtown All-Star Game after the playoffs.

## Boys Soccer Season

The EHS boys soccer team had one of its best seasons finishing undefeated in league play. Despite a heartbreaking playoff loss, the team enjoyed a wonderful season and established itself as a premier contender in the league. With a returning crop of talented 7th graders, the team appears poised to build on its 2017 success next year!







## Track

EHS had another successful season of track this spring. After several competitive meets, many doused by rain, nine students qualified for the Gotham Games placing in the top 16 runners. The boys 4x400 relay was especially successful and they were the epitome of a strong relay team: they worked together, pushed and supported each other, and over time, they all learned from each other's strategies. The competitive race was a joy to behold and the boys relay team brought a medal back to 103rd Street!



## Lacrosse

The 2018 lacrosse season was another resounding success for The East Harlem School! For the last three years, the girls team has won or played in the league championship final game, and this year they again competed in the finals, taking second place. The boys came into the season once again as league champions, but after a strong season, they did not make it into championship play.

As lacrosse grows in popularity and as we continue to take the field against schools with much larger talent pools, the strength of our school culture and the excellence of our coaching staff allow us to compete at a high level. Support from the Andrew K. Dwyer Foundation and the leadership of EHS Trustee John Hyland have enabled us to rise to a consistently high level of play through the years. We are also grateful to The Hotchkiss School, which hosts an annual lacrosse clinic for our students that is run by their coaches and athletes.

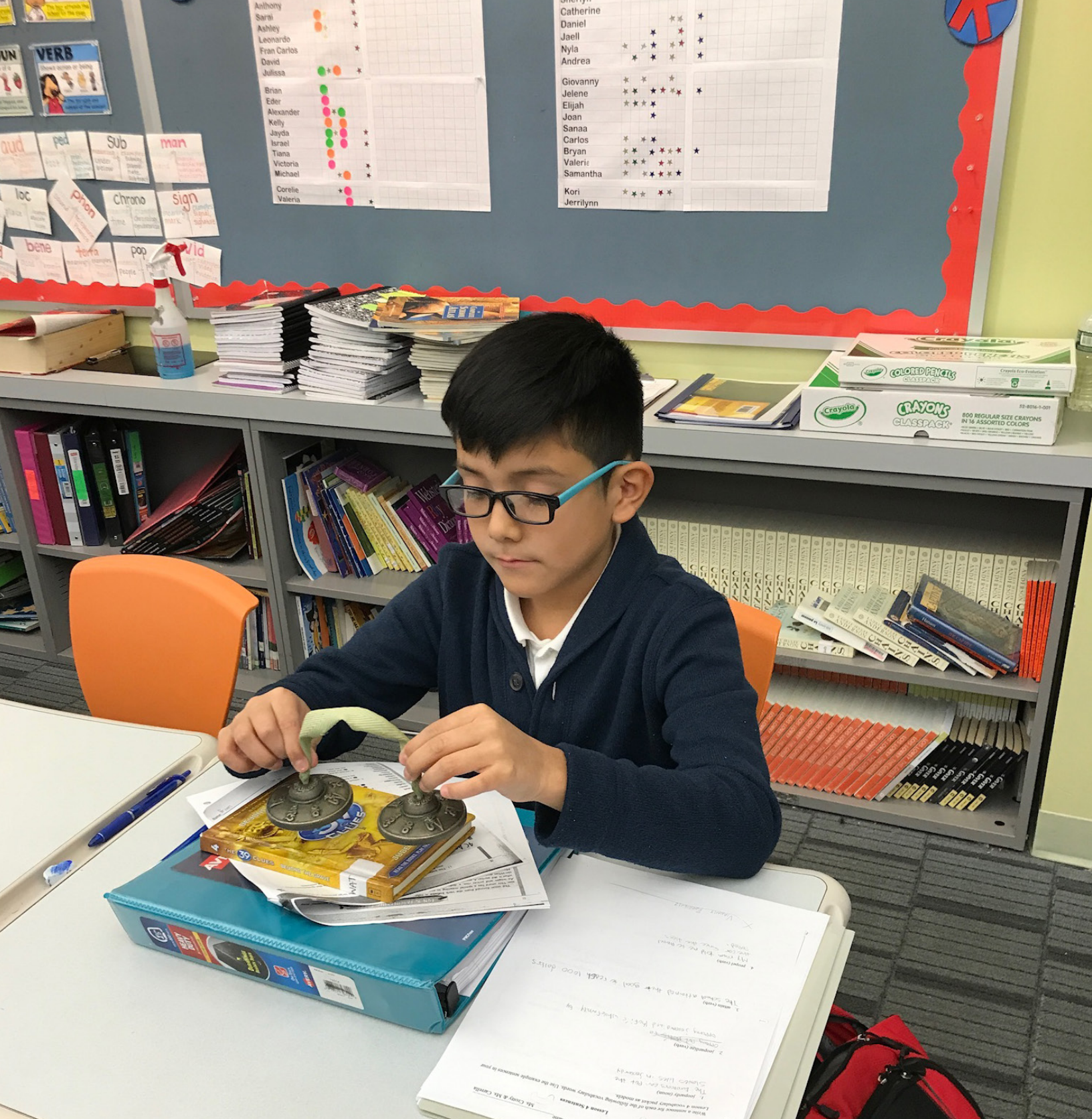
## Food Program

At EHS, we offer a 100% vegetarian food program, sourcing local and organic ingredients.

## Fitness

EHS features a comprehensive kinesthetic awareness and fitness curriculum in which EHS students receive 6 hours of fitness training per week.





## Meditation

Meditation and silence have been incorporated into the School's curriculum since its founding in 1993. Recent research shows clear evidence that daily meditation positively affects academic performance, decreases instances of bullying, and physically enhances the health of both the brain and body. EHS students meditate every day and begin each class with a moment of silence.



## Self Defense

The East Harlem School held a series of Self Defense classes for our 8th grade girls to develop physical integration, dynamic movement, and coordinated strength - all which amplify the power of an individual, regardless of her physical build.

## Swimming

EHS partners with Asphalt Green to give weekly swimming lessons to our 4th, 5th, and 6th graders.

## Yoga

Namaste Yoga: Michael and Julie Wald of Namaste New York continued their partnership with EHS by offering a free yoga series to students, parents and faculty. Now in its fifth year, this ten-week program builds balance, flexibility, relaxation, and strength.

### **Sponsor a Saturday School**

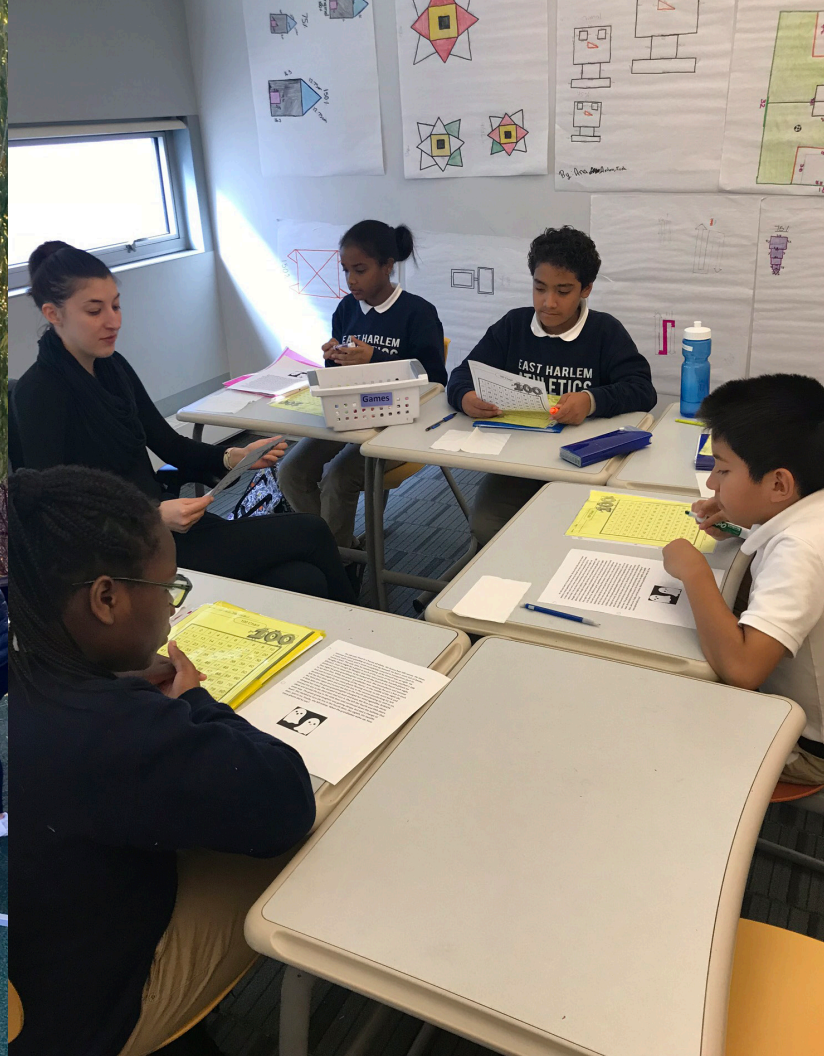

### **Corporate Volunteerism**

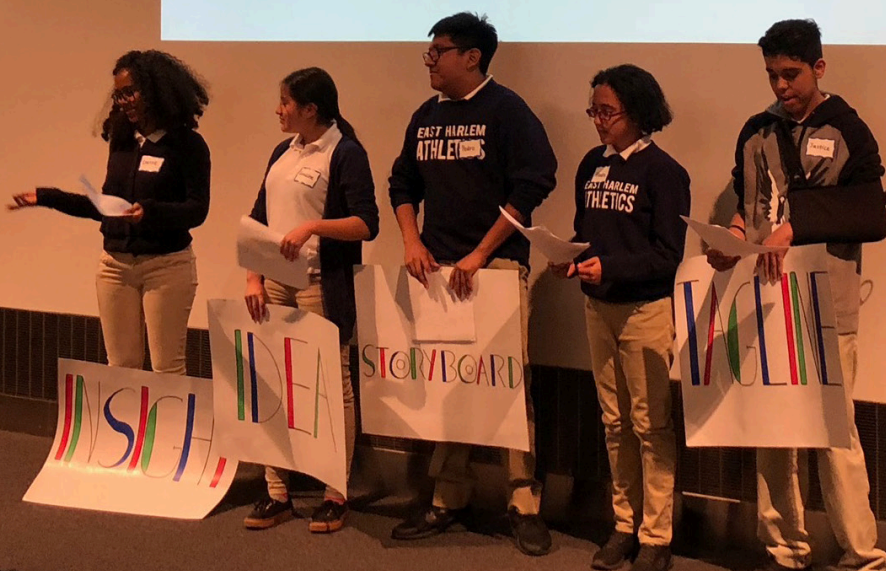

# SUMMER

The Summer Semester is a critical component of The East Harlem School's year-round educational program. In order to provide even more skill-building and enrichment opportunities, EHS students participated in a mandatory 5-week summer session in addition to the regular 10-month school year.

Summer Session classes were taught by professional teachers and high school and college interns. The interns joined us from top colleges and universities throughout the country including Amherst College, Duke, George Washington University, Harvard, and the University of Michigan. This past summer, the curriculum focused on Mexico, the native country for many EHS families. In advance of the semester, EHS faculty conducted scholarly research and also consulted with EHS parents on topics related to Mexico that they might want their children to explore.

In the afternoons, our students participated in soccer, lacrosse, and yoga, and then in elective classes, designed by our college teachers. Some of our electives this summer were Arabic, Chess, Classic Mystery, Public Speaking, and Sustainability.

## West Virginia
