Below, some slides from our lessons on 'Consent'.

Consequences

Emotional:

- lower self-esteem and sense of worth
- humiliation
- fear
- hurt
- embarrassment
- · problems trusting future partners
- problems forming new relationships

Physical:

- sexually transmitted infections for both people and any other future partners
- · physical injury
- · internal injury
- mental health problems including depression
- unwanted pregnancy

Legal:

- possible custodial sentence if found guilty of rape
- sexual assault could lead to a community order, fine or prison sentence
- having sex without consent and sexual assault could result in the perpetrator being added to the Sex Offenders' Register
- having a criminal record, and/or being put on the Sex Offender's Register will have major impact on future life events such as getting work

- · pregnancy and maternity
- race
- · religion or belief
- <u>sex</u>

You are protected under the Equality Act 2010 from these types of discrimination.



This week, Miss Feeley, shared a very well presented assembly to all students on the theme of Mental Health. It is World Mental Health Day on Sunday, 10th October.



Miss Feeley shared with the children that if they do not feel too great, at times, that there are always people that they can talk to, to share their concerns and to help them.




Spotlight on... Maths



Year 7 – Mr Grant


The students of 7A2/Math are very enthused about mathematics and are eager to get on with their learning. They are able to do tasks independently and they are vibrant and excited about learning their new content which are sequentially pitched at a level to stimulate and extend their progress in mathematics. Additionally, we provide workbooks with a wide range differentiated problems to complement the concepts that is being delivered to them. This ensured that their minds are always active in each lesson. Here are examples of their current work.






Year 8 - Mr Tyson


8A2 is one of two top-set maths classes in Y8 (both are in the A-Band). We have just finished studying a unit on multiplicative change, cover a wide range of topics including scale factors, scale drawings, and interpreting maps. We have now moved on to a unit on multiplying and dividing fractions. This class rise to the challenge every lesson, often covering the work of two lessons in a single lesson! We managed this today, covering multiplying unit fractions as well as multiplying any two fractions. This is crucial, as we expect these top-set students to go on and complete a Higher Maths GCSE, and so often have extra topics to cover in each unit. Completing the foundational skills faster allows class time on the more challenging higher topics, in this case focussing on algebraic fractions towards the end of the unit. Here is some of their work.



Year 9 - Mr Benson

Year 9 this autumn have been working on strengthening their algebra skills. Having worked on graphing equations of a line earlier, right now they are using a step by step method to take equations apart to find missing numbers. As with every new method, it feels difficult at first, but with practice they are gaining confidence and building success. Here is some of their excellent work.






Year 10 - Mr Morris


10A1 started this term building on their knowledge of similar shapes, including triangles. This was the base for the current topic on Trigonometry, which has many real-life uses. For example, how can you find the height of a tree without climbing to the top? Or, as 10A1 illustrated in class, find out the height of a student without touching her head? As a top set, they have done really well mastering Sine, Cosine and Tangent, or 'SOHCAHTOA', as you may remember. This lesson was how to find the missing angle in a right-angle triangle when only given two sides. Due to the proportional relationship of the sides, they can deduce the angle using an inverse function (see photograph). Over the next two weeks, they will be covering higher parts of Trigonometry in preparation for their GCSEs in 2023. Well done 10A1!






Year 11 - Mrs King

11A2 and 11H2 are currently working through the topic Shape and Space. They have completed work on Angle facts and the notation of two dimensional shapes, calculating Interior and Exterior angles of regular and irregular polygons and finally drawing and calculating Bearings. Many students from these classes are attending after school revision on a Wednesday. Here are some examples of their excellent work.


COVID-19 Vaccinations























