Schedule change

Charles County Public Schools (CCPS) is moving all in-county high school varsity <u>football games</u> scheduled for tonight, to 10 a.m., Saturday, Sept. 18. The schedule is below.

- La Plata High School vs. Patuxent High School (held at La Plata)
- Henry E. Lackey High School vs. Thomas Stone High School (held at Lackey)
- Maurice J. McDonough High School vs. Calvert High School (held at Stone/homecoming)
- North Point High School vs. Westlake High School (held at North Point)

This change does not apply to the game scheduled between St. Charles High School and Leonardtown High School set for Sept. 17, 6 p.m. at Leonardtown.

In addition to school staffs and administrators, CCPS works with the Charles County Sheriff's Office to secure officers to provide support at high school football games. The officers work with school staffs during games to ensure the events are safe for all attendees. CCPS has not been able to secure adequate officer coverage for incounty games scheduled for this evening. The schedule changes may cause schools to adjust junior varsity events set for Sept. 18. These changes only affect tonight's games at this time.

CCPS adjusts schedules for upcoming indoor events

Charles County Public Schools (CCPS) is adjusting schedules for several upcoming planned indoor events.

The changes affect school open houses, high school homecoming dances, middle school dances, volunteer support in schools and planned field trips. The changes will decrease the amount of people gathering inside of school buildings.

Although students and staff are back in buildings for in-person learning, CCPS is limiting the number of outside visitors when possible to support safe learning environments. CCPS has also updated standard operating procedures (SOP) regarding COV-ID-19 testing at schools. Below are important updates for parents, students and staff.

Virtual open houses, other school events

All schools and centers will hold upcoming open houses and back-to-school nights virtually. The dates and times of the events will be as close to the original schedule as posted earlier in the school year. Principals will share updated information direct with families, including any change to their event date and time.

Similar to last school year, principals and teachers will send virtual links to parents. Parents with specific questions about the open house event planned for their child's school should contact the school directly.

Hearings planned

In Memoriam Felicia Gaither

Felicia Gaither, an instructional assistant at Maurice J. McDonough High School, passed away on Friday, Sept. 10.

Gaither's adult life was dedicated to helping others. Prior to starting with Charles County Public Schools as a substitute and later an IA, she operated a daycare and worked as a certified nursing assistant.

At McDonough, Gaith-

er was an IA for the ISR program where she worked closely with Jean Washington, an IA who coordinates substitutes for the school. Washington said she and Gaither were more than coworkers, they were close friends.

"She was a wonderful, good-hearted person," Washington said. "She would do anything she could to help where she was needed."

Gaither was flexible and dependable. If she was pulled from a task to help in a classroom, she quickly found her footing and exceeded expectations.

While she excelled at her job, it was her ability to build relationships with staff and students that made her stand out, Washington said. Students would drop by Gaither's room to say 'hi' or check in. "She loved the kids," Washington said. "And the kids loved her, too."

Carmencita Bell, a vice principal at McDonough, agreed.



Felicia Gaither "She put her family first, then the family at McDonough and her neighborhood," Bell said. "She was totally dedicated to her job and the students. There was not a student who didn't love her, even if she was a little strict with them. They always came to her."

During her time at Mc-Donough, Gaither was an assistant swim coach and was a fan of the Rams, especially

basketball. Her love for the game and players — including her sons — would sometimes get the better of her, Bell said. Gaither was told more than once to "Get off the court!" said Bell, remembering her friend's excitement at games.

Gaither was a stalwart at morning bus duty, helping Bell and alternatively joking with drivers or scolding them if needed.

"Felicia Gaither was one of a kind," Bell said. "What else do you say about a mother, friend, coworker, advocate for students and a true human being?"

"It's a great loss for the employees and students," Washington said. "There are not enough words to tell you what kind of person she was."

A memorial service is planned for 2 p.m. Sept. 18 at Israel Total Life Ministry at 64 Industrial Park Drive in Waldorf. The family asks visitors to plan accordingly as the attendance is expected to be high. Masks are required.

CCPS held in-person meet-and-greet events in August for parents and students. As a result, some COVID-19 cases were reported to the school system of sick visitors who attended those events.

School administrators have been asked to offer meetings virtually or outdoors when possible. This may include parent conferences and meetings, PTO meetings, information nights and back-to-school events, and open houses.

CCPS tightens COVID-19 testing procedures at schools

CCPS has updated its protocols for the testing of sick students and staff by a school nurse. Students with a known exposure who want to test out of quarantine after seven days with a negative COVID-19 test must now visit their doctor, use an outside vendor or test through the Charles County Department of Health. The health department offers free testing three times a week. Families may also elect to quarantine their child for 10 days and return to school without testing. Staff who are exposed outside of school will no longer be allowed to receive a COVID-19 test at school to end a quarantine early. Staff should visit their doctor, use an outside vendor or test through the health department on day seven, or wait until day 10 to return to work without a test.

Rapid tests will only be administered by nurses at their discretion for students or staff who display severe COVID-19 symptoms. Any student or staff member who pre-screens as potentially positive for COVID-19 will be offered a PCR test. Staff and students may not return to school or school activities until the results of the test are known. Additionally, individuals who refuse the PCR test after pre-screening as potentially positive will be presumed COVID-19 positive and excluded from school and school activities for ten days. CCPS also updated the COVID-19 prescreening questionnaire.

High school homecoming dances, middle school dances canceled

All CCPS high school homecoming dances are canceled until further notice from CCPS. Homecoming games scheduled and set in the CCPS Handbook/Calendar are planned to still take place. Homecoming games are scheduled at outdoor athletic venues.

While there is no mask requirement for adults or students in outdoor settings, CCPS highly encourages outdoor mask use for unvaccinated adults/students attending athletic outdoor events.

Field trips restricted to in-county, regional areas

CCPS is limiting in-person field trips for students to regional locations that include Charles County and southern Prince George's County.

This does not apply to the high school athletics program – most regular season events are scheduled in Southern Maryland and these students are required to undergo weekly CO-VID-19 screening if they are not vaccinated.

CCPS has standard operating procedures in place that require COVID-19 symptomatic students to be picked up from school within one hour of parent notification.

Field trip permission forms will require parents to consent to being available to pick up their child during a field trip if they become symptomatic. Limiting field trip travel will also assist staff in the contact tracing process, if needed.

Limited volunteer program participation

Schools will support a limited number of volunteers to aid with field trips. Volunteers will have to go through a background check, and consent to completing the CCPS prescreening health questionnaire before coming into contact with students or staff. Principals will designate a coordinator at each school to oversee the volunteer process. Community members interested in limited volunteer opportunities should contact their child's school for specific details.

Instruction for sick, quarantined students

Schools have instructional plans for students who are out of school, either from CO-VID-19 or another illness, or have been asked by CCPS to quarantine. All instructional plans for schools are posted on individual school websites.

Sick individuals should stay home

Limiting the number of people who enter a school building — particularly those who are not inside of CCPS schools daily such as students, staff and teachers — will aid staff who conduct COVID-19 contact tracing.

Staff in the CCPS Office of School Safety and Security oversees contact tracing for every positive case of COVID-19 reported to the CCPS Office of School Administration and the Office of Human Resources. School staff assist with contact tracing, as well.

The safety of schools is a community effort among staff, teachers and parents. CCPS asks parents to complete the COVID-19 prescreening questionnaire daily before sending their child on the bus or to school.

The questionnaire is posted <u>here on the</u> <u>CCPS website</u>. Staff are also asked to assess their health before coming to work.

Parents with a sick child should keep their children home, and not send their child to school or on the bus.

CCPS also asks for children to be kept home if they have been exposed to a COV-ID-19 positive person in the last seven days (and are not vaccinated), live with someone who is COVID-19 positive (and are not vaccinated), are in quarantine due to another exposure or waiting for a COVID-19 test result. Staff are also asked to follow the same guidelines.

Transportation moves to hire permanent, substitute bus drivers

Charles County Public Schools (CCPS) provides bus transportation to more than 24,000 students in Charles County and is still working through bus issues as a result of driver shortages and later than usual student enrollments.

Transportation staff is working through help desk tickets submitted by parents. Tickets continue to range from bus stop requests and stop changes, to complaints about delayed bus arrivals.

Daily, transportation staff who oversee and address help tickets are being pulled to cover bus routes for students. This is causing a significant delay in ticket response. CCPS continues to work with its 26 bus contractors to ensure routes are covered by drivers, and to cover routes of any drivers not able to report for the day. CCPS does not have adequate substitute bus drivers. This contributes to



inconsistent arrival times, and could lead to service interruptions in the future.
