Phase 2 postponed Due to the recent rise in COVID-19

Due to the recent rise in COVID-19 cases county- and statewide, Charles County Public School (CCPS) made the move to pause Phase 2 of its reopening plan that includes in-person learning for special populations of students. CCPS will continue to monitor the data and reassess; however, CCPS will not consider a move to Phase 2 until after the first of the year because of the upcoming holiday season. CCPS will continue virtual learning for all students until further notice. Student instruction continues through StudentVue and Zoom. CCPS makes changes to employee schedules

Charles County Public Schools (CCPS) has paused the move to Phase 2 of the Reopening Plan due to the increasing number of COVID-19 cases in Charles County.

The school system has made changes to employee work schedules to slow the spread of this virus. Although school buildings are safe places to work, the adjusted work schedules will help the community stop or slow the spread of the virus so that students can come back into schools and lives can get back to normal.

The school system's mission is to meet the needs of the community's children. This means that in addition to a robust instructional program, CCPS must also provide mental health support and virtual extracurricular activities for students. Family internet center open at three schools

A family internet center at Dr. Thomas L. Higdon Elementary School opened Thursday, Nov. 12 to aid students in virtual learning. Hours for the Higdon internet center are 7:30 a.m. to 4 p.m.

The Higdon location is the third Charles County Public Schools (CCPS) school to provide indoor internet. Other sites are Mt. Hope/Nanjemoy Elementary School and Henry E. Lackey High School. Family internet centers provide WiFi to students in need of the resource to complete their schoolwork. Lackey and Mt. Hope/Nanjemoy will re-open family internet centers on Tuesday, Nov. 10. Internet center hours at Lackey and Mt. Hope/Nanjemoy are 7 a.m. to 4 p.m., Monday through Friday.

Families will be able to sit together at socially distanced tables. Space is limited and must be reserved between 8:30 a.m. to 3 p.m. the day before you want to book a space by calling 301-934-7213. Families can schedule up to five consecutive days at once.

A parent, guardian, or adult who is a caregiver must accompany students 15 or younger. The adult will fill out a health screening for themselves and their children before going into the center.

Students using the centers must sign in and wear a face-covering/mask at all times. Students must log on and stay connected to their scheduled instruction.

Students should bring their laptops or learning device to the center. A limited number of desktop computers may be available. Students should not make disruptive sounds or behaviors and use headphones or earbuds.

Parents/guardians must remain with their child(ren) while at the school unless the student is 16 or older.

Parents will sign in using a picture ID and wear a face covering/mask. Other requirements include that the student arrives

and leaves on time (no earlier than 7 a.m. at Lackey and Mt. Hope/Nanjemoy, and 7:30 a.m. at Higdon, and leave no later than 4 p.m.). Please silence your cell phones. Calls may take place outside of the school. Parents also ensure that your child(ren) is not disruptive and should bring lunch, water and snacks for their child. Adults can bring their technology devices and use the CCPS BYOD WiFi. They should use headphones or earbuds while in the family internet center.

The schools have designated parking spaces for visitors to the centers.

At Lackey, the center's entrance is in the back of the gym. After driving up the school's entrance hill, pass the circle and make a right into the parking lot.

At Mt. Hope/Nanjemoy, internet center visitors should park in front of the school (in the bus lanes) and enter the center on the building's left side.

At Higdon, families should park in the parking lot adjacent to the gym/cafeteria. The internet center is located in the cafeteria and families should enter the school through the cafeteria doors.

Young Athletes At-Home Program kicks off

Charles County Public Schools (CCPS) partners with Special Olympics Maryland to provide the Young Athletes At-Home Program (YAP), introducing children ages 2 to 7 to basic sports skills like running, kicking and throwing.

The program is typically offered to children in special populations with and without intellectual disabilities who are in prekindergarten and enrolled in early intervention programs.

This year, CCPS is offering the virtual program to all young children and their families who want to improve gross motor movement and skill development. The Young Athletes At-Home Program blends sports and play with self-paced 6-week guided lesson plan that help families track a child's progress.

"The Young Athletes At-Home Program focuses on balance, hopping, jumping, tossing and catching. Each of these gross motor skills are instrumental to early childhood physical devel-



opment," Michelle Ignaszewski, adapted physical education resource teacher and a Young Athletes Program coordinator, said.

The first of two six-week, selfpaced programs is set for Jan. 18 to Feb. 22. The second session is April 12 to May 17. FNS updates meal distribution

Charles County Public Schools (CCPS) has made some changes to its meal distribution sites and serving times. The following changes went into effect on Nov. 9.

- Meal sites are open for curbside distribution Monday through Friday from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m.
- Malcolm Elementary School will continue to serve as a meal site, Monday through Friday, from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. Prior to the postponement of Phase 2 for CCPS, the meal site at Malcolm was scheduled to close after Nov. 6.
- Seven sites that served as evening pickup locations closed on Nov. 6.
- Meals will remain free to children ages 2 to 18 for the entire 2020-21 school year.
- There is no meal service, including mobile meals, on days when students are not in school. Meal sites will be closed during the Thanksgiving break of Nov. 25-27.

Mobile meal sites

Mobile meal service will continue by school bus to select neighborhoods. Grab-andgo meals are available from 11 to 11:20 a.m. at the Wakefield Community Center at 2002 Nantucket Drive in Waldorf; 11:30 to 11:50 a.m. at the Smallwood Village Shopping Center, near Safeway, at 10 King St. in Waldorf; and Arthur Middleton Elementary School at 1109 Copley Ave. in Waldorf from noon to 12:30 p.m.

Meal sites include Henry E. Lackey, La Plata, Maurice J. McDonough; North Point, St. Charles, Thomas Stone and Westlake high schools; Mattawoman, Milton M. Somers and Piccowaxen middle schools; and Billingsley, Indian Head, Malcolm, Mt. Hope/Nanjemoy, Dr. Samuel A. Mudd, J.C. Parks and J.P. Ryon elementary schools.

CHANGES

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Employees who were not initially approved for teleworking will be permitted to telework based on a 50 percent schedule. The schedule will be developed by supervisors or principals and will include Wednesday as a teleworking day.

CCPS buildings will remain open; and employees who would like to work from their classroom or offices may continue to do so. Employees who are teleworking should review the CCPS Teleworking Guidelines.

Employees whose job duties are not conducive to telework should continue to work their supervisor-approved schedule.

This group includes building service workers, food service workers, school nurses, maintenance workers, bus drivers and attendants, mailroom and switchboard employees.

The Learning Support Centers and Family Internet Centers will continue to be open to support employees and their children.

With principal approval, a teacher may elect to allow their school-aged child(ren) to access learning from the parent's classroom instead of from the Learning Support Centers.
