# Six schools get in touch with safety radios

Administrative teams of six Charles County Public Schools (CCPS) recently received public safety radios to directly communicate with first responders if a life-threatening emergency arises at a school.

The digital portable radios — Motorola XTS 5000 models — directly connect schools with Charles County's Department of Emergency Services, prompting a faster response by first responders, said Jason Stoddard, director of CCPS safety and security. The radios were given to Indian Head, Eva Turner, Malcolm, Dr. Gustavus Brown, Mt. Hope/Nanjemoy and Dr. James Craik el-

"Each school has a unique security issue," Stoddard said. Mt. Hope/Nanjemoy and Malcolm are remote, sitting in locations that could increase response time. Eva Turner, Dr. Brown, Craik and Indian Head have open floor plans. "[The radios] are improving our ability to communicate ... to expedient notification of emergency services and get help [to schools] faster," Stoddard said.

The county's department of emergency services donated the \$5,000 radios to the six schools.

With the aid of grant money, Stoddard and his team are striving to place a public safety radio in all CCPS schools by the end of the school year. The radios are among safety enhancements that are happening in county schools as part of CCPS's See Something, Say Something initiative. Updated background checks for employees and volunteers, reconfiguration of school entryways, construction of walls in open space schools and an online reporting tool

have been implemented over the summer. Safety enhancement projects continue throughout the county.

At Malcolm, Principal Mary Finneran and Vice Principal Patricia Mooring learned how to use the public safety radio from Chris Thompson, assistant chief of the county's fire/EMS communications. With the radios, schools will be able to directly reach emergency services if a lifethreatening situation arises that demands assistance, cutting out the need to call 911.

Following the Sandy Hook Elementary School shooting in 2014, Thompson has been pushing for enhanced safety features at area schools. "I'm ecstatic this stuff is happening," he said. "These are kids and we need to care of them."

Teachers at Malcolm will soon each get a walkie-talkie to make interschool communication easier, and the public safety radio brings peace of mind, Finneran said. "It does make us feel safer," she said.

"It's a great first step," Stoddard said. "Little wins equal momentum."

# St. Charles's Conley, staff honored for support of deployed PE teacher

Capt. Mary Dempsey is a soldier in the U.S. Army Reserve who is deployed as a logistics officer in Kuwait. Prior to her March 2018 deployment, Dempsey was an integral part of the physical education department teaching staff at St. Charles High School. She describes the news of her deployment as a whirlwind of events, and credits St. Charles staff for helping her quickly transition.


"This commitment that I made did not come without sacrifices that this school had to make along with me," Dempsey said. To express gratitude to her colleagues, other school staff and principal, Rick Conley, Dempsey nominated her colleagues for the Department of Defense Patriot Award. The award, which recognizes employers for supporting staff who are enlisted in the military, was presented to Conley earlier this week during a surprise announcement.

Warren Johnson, a retired Major with the U.S. Air Force, is part of the Maryland State Committee of the Employer Support for the Guard and Reserve, the organization that selects Patriot Award recipients annually. He presented Conley with the award Sept. 25 during a surprise staff meeting. "This award is the most coveted award ... it reaches people who are supporting our military members. It is presented by all branches of the military, the seven seals, including the National Guard and the Reserves," Johnson said.

Key criteria for the award include employer support of flexible schedules, time off prior to and after deployment, family care and providing leaves of absences, if necessary. Because of Dempsey's deployment, she was not present for the award presentation. However, she provided comments to Marquelle Peavy, administrative assistant at St. Charles, to read aloud during the award presentation that reflect Dempsey's gratitude.

"I have always had a lot of military obligations to fulfill while teaching here and I am thankful for everyone's support. I wanted to figure out a way to thank this school for their support and when I heard about the Patriot Award I knew that this school deserved it for how supported I have felt. I have never felt as though my military service was an inconvenience or annoyance," she wrote.

Dempsey joined Charles County Public Schools as a physical edu-

cation teacher at North Point High School in 2014 and transferred to St. Charles at the start of the 2015-16 school year. Conley said in addition to traditional health and physical education courses, Dempsey led several lifeguard courses that require specialized training. He described her as a community-oriented person who is kind and enjoys giving back.

Peavy worked with Johnson to plan the surprise award presentation to Conley, who said the award is reflective of the entire St. Charles staff. "This is about the school. I was never nervous about how it would impact us here. We put her in touch with the right people and worked with an amazing team to support her as much as we could in her exit," Conley said to his staff. "This award is as much about all of you as it is about me ... even more so about all of you."

# Safety takes the wheel with We Care safe driving campaign at high schools
