# Eligible staff to receive extra pay Feb. 20

The Board of Education on Feb. 10 approved a one-time payment of \$1,000 to all full-time, permanent Charles County Public Schools employees. Eligible employees will receive the payment Friday, an action supported by the two employee representative groups — the Education Association of Charles County (EACC) and the American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees (AFSCME).

"In fiscal year 2015, the school system was not able to provide employees with a step or scale increase or a cost of living

adjustment (COLA). The Board agreed with the EACC and AFSCME last year to keep 2015 negotiations open and revisit the budget in January to determine if any employee compensation was possible. The \$1,000 payment closes negotiations for the 2014-15 school year," Superintendent Kimberly Hill said

Employees who are not full time but work a specific number of contracted hours will receive a prorated portion of the \$1,000 payment. Cost of providing the payment is \$3.4 million for 3,400 employees. Funding

## Zaccarelli selected for Football Coach Hall of Fame

Dominic Zaccarelli, longtime athletic director at Westlake High School, is known not only for his passion for sports and athletics programs, but for his ability to connect with children and push them toward academic success after high school. He works tirelessly to help his student athletes pursue their academic and athletic goals by ensuring opportunities to meet with collegiate scouts, and has helped his student's access scholarships.

During his 31-year coaching career with Charles County Public Schools, Zaccarelli has received recognition for his contributions to athletics, and more importantly, to the high school football program. For his efforts in athletics and supporting the football program, Zaccarelli was selected as an inductee for the Maryland High School Football Coaches Hall of Fame. He is one of only two honorees selected for the Hall of Fame this year. The Maryland High School Football Coaches Association coordinates the awards program annually.

Zaccarelli said he is honored to be chosen for the recognition. "It is very humbling to join a group of only 85 coaches which include inductees Dr. John Cox and Coach Larry Johnson. Being the third Charles County coach to be inducted is a tremendous honor," Zaccarelli said. Joe Russo is the president

of the Maryland High School Football Coaches Association and said Zaccarelli was chosen for his coaching career history.

He will be honored Feb. 22 and a plaque featuring his name will hang in Byrd Stadium at the University of Maryland College Park. He was the head football coach at Westlake from 1993 to 2011, where he helped secure a state championship title in 2008. In 2001, he was named the Athletic Director of the Year for District IV, which includes Charles, Calvert and St. Mary's counties, and earned the title of Southern Maryland Athletic Conference (SMAC) Coach of the Year seven times.

# Sokoloski, Taylor recently honored for efforts in gifted education

The Maryland State Department of Education (MSDE) and the Maryland Advisory Council on Gifted and Talented Education recently honored two Charles County Public Schools (CCPS) teachers – Jeffrey Sokoloski, a language arts teacher at General Smallwood Middle School, and Ann Taylor, a learning resource teacher at Benjamin Stoddert Middle School, for their efforts in gifted education.

Both teachers earned the 2015 Teacher as Leader in Gifted and Talented Education awards. The Maryland State Advisory Council on Gifted and Talented Education annually honors educators, students

and community organizations for their contributions in developing the talents of Maryland students from all populations in gifted education.

Sokoloski has been teaching at Smallwood since 2011 and was nominated for the award by Irene Brewster, the learning resource teacher at Smallwood. He was nominated for demonstrating leadership in gifted education and for encouraging his students to achieve academic and personal success. Sokoloski primarily works with sixth- and eighthgrade students and teaches the gifted reading and language arts curriculum. He is also

the eighth-grade team leader and is in the process of completing his master's degree in English literature.

In her nomination letter, Brewster said Sokoloski is a valuable gifted education resource for students and his peers. "He has presented several core strategies to staff members during professional development meetings and 'drop ins' to other language arts classes to enhance and support instructional rigor. As the eighth-grade team leader, Mr. Sokoloski provides policy and procedure information specific to Smallwood to all new eighth grade staff members as well as help and guidance with student behavior and classroom management," Brewster wrote in her letter.

For the past two school years, Sokoloski has helped with curriculum writing for enrichment classes and the gifted reading and language arts courses of study. He also attends professional development opportunities and presents at countywide trainings. To further expand his knowledge of gifted education and language arts practices, Sokoloski

recently attended the National Council of Teachers of English (NCTE) conference.

Taylor is in her first year as a learning resource teacher at Stoddert, and previously worked as a gifted education resource teacher at the

middle-school level for nine years. She was nominated for the award by Maryann Bourassa, content specialist for gifted education for CCPS. As a learning resource teacher, Taylor coordinates all aspects of gifted education at Stoddert and all of the county and state testing for students. She also collaborates with classroom teachers of gifted students to ensure their needs are met. Bourassa said Taylor is actively involved in the success of her students and is a leader at her school, and among her peers across the county and state.

"Beyond the school day, Ms. Taylor volunteers her time to support her students in enrichment activities like chess, It's Academic and various academic competitions. She is a leader among her colleagues. Her expertise, professional manner, and willingness to share her experiences and understanding make her a valuable member of our staff," Bourassa wrote in her nomination letter.

Taylor is a member of the instructional leadership team at Stoddert and provides several professional development meetings and presentations to staff on instructional models that support gifted learners. She has also helped write gifted education reading and language arts curriculum for middle-school students and worked to infuse Common Core State Standards into state social studies curriculum. Additionally, she is active with countywide Destination Imagination and History Fair activities.

Both Sokoloski and Taylor will be honored Feb. 25 at the Celebrating Gifted and Talented Education in Maryland reception and awards ceremony. Additionally, three Charles County Public Schools students selected for gifted and talented achievement awards will be honored during the ceremony. 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sources include lapsed salary savings from retirements, unfilled positions and hiring lags.

Additionally, the Board agreed to provide CCPS bus contractors with funds to pay each full-time, permanent bus driver and attendant with a \$500 payment. The cost of the payment is \$175,000 and will be funded by savings generated over several months due to lower fuel prices. CCPS currently works with 27 independent contractors to provide school bus services for students. Full-time, permanent bus drivers and attendants are generally those who are assigned to a specific

bus contract. The Board has also asked each contractor to provide a matching one-time payment amount to their eligible employees, if possible. Funding for the payment will be provided to bus contractors in March, who will distribute the payment to their drivers and attendants.

"The Board understands the impact the economy has taken on our employees over the past several years. We hope this one-time payment shows our commitment to supporting our employees. The Board continues to seek competitive compensation in its fiscal year 2016 budget request," Board Chairman Virginia McGraw said.

## Graduation rates increase at all county high schools

Charles County Public Schools (CCPS) graduation rate hit 91.4 percent in 2014, its highest rate since 2010, according to data recently released by the Maryland State Department of Education. As student graduation rates increase, the CCPS dropout rate continues to decline.

The CCPS four-year cohort graduation rate jumped from 89.8 percent in 2013 and has improved more than five points since 2010. Additionally, CCPS students also improved across all subgroups. The CCPS average exceeds the state graduation rate of 86.39 by five points.

"I can't tell you how proud we are of the accomplishments of our students," Superintendent Kimberly Hill told high school principals. She credited principals, teachers and staff for helping students stay in school and graduate with their class. "None of this would have been possible without your hard work and your commitment to being the difference," Hill said.

Four of six high schools posted graduation rates greater than 90 percent. Henry E. Lackey High School's rate jumped from 87.25 in 2013 to 90.57 in 2014. La Plata High School posted a 2014 rate of 92.82, down from 94.64, and North Point High School's graduation rate remained the highest in the county at 95.94 percent, despite a slight decrease. Westlake High School improved its graduation rate to 91, up from 88.3 percent in 2013. Maurice J. McDonough High School increased its graduation rate from 88.75 to 89.07 in 2014, and Thomas Stone High School increased by nearly 7-points, raising its rate from 80.65 in 2013 to 87.36 in 2014.

Gradation rates for students of all races/ethnicity were above 90 percent. Four-year cohort graduation rates by race/ethnicity are:

- Asian: greater than 95 percent;
- African American: 90.06 percent;
- Hispanic/Latino: greater than 95 percent;
- White: 91.94 percent; and
- Two or more races: greater than 95 percent.

While gaps in graduation rates between some student groups remain, the numbers improved across the board in 2014:

The graduation rate for students receiving free or reduced-price meals (FARMS) increased more than three percentage points, from 79.06 percent to 82.2 percent.

The graduation rate for special education students improved more than 10 percentage points, rising to 75.16 in 2014 from 64 percent in 2013.

The CCPS four-year cohort dropout rate has declined from 6.13 percent in 2013 to 4.97 percent in 2014.
