Student transfer rule changes affect employees

The Board of Education on Jan. 14 approved changes to the student transfer rule that affect Charles County Public Schools (CCPS) employees. Superintendent's Rule 5126 provides guidelines that govern when and how students are allowed to attend a school other than the one to which they are assigned, and establishes criteria for student transfer approvals.

CCPS students are assigned to their zoned schools based on their domicile, meaning their sole, permanent residence. Approved changes that affect employees include:

• A student who is domiciled in Charles County and whose parent/guardian is a full-time CCPS employee eligible for benefits may request a transfer to the elementary, middle or high school zone for that parent/guardian's current work location.

- When an employee has a child that attends the elementary, middle or high school zone for their work location changes to another work location, they may request that their child complete the school year at the school in which they are currently enrolled.
- A student who has a domicile outside of Charles County and whose parent/guardian is a full-time CCPS employee eligible for benefits may request to enroll in the CCPS elementary, middle or high school zoned for their parent/guardian's current work location.
- The county portion of tuition for a student who has a domicile outside of Charles County and whose parent/guardian was a full-time CCPS employee before Jan. 1, 2013, will be waived.
- One half of the county tuition for a student who has a domicile outside of Charles

TSA plans are available for staff

Nominate an outstanding parent

The Maryland State Department of Education (MSDE) recently announced the Maryland Parent Involvement Matters Award (PIMA) program for 2014. The annual award recognizes parents and guardians whose contributions have led to improvements in Maryland public schools.

Nominees must be a parent/legal guardian of a child in a Maryland public school, and a consistent advocate of public education. Nominees must have also demonstrated involvement in one of the five following areas within the last 24 months: communicating; volunteering; learning; decision making; and/or community collaboration.

Nominations must include three letters of recommendation, a two-page narrative essay describing the nominee's contribution to public education and completed nomination forms. Five finalists will be selected and the state winner will be announced at a ceremony scheduled for later this spring.

Incomplete applications will not be considered and submissions will not be accepted online or by e-mail. Board of Education re-elects Wise and Cook

The Board of Education of Charles County re-elected Roberta Wise as chairman and Maura Cook as vice chairman at its Jan. 14 meeting. The Board elects a chairman and vice chairman each January and officers serve a one-year term.

Board members voted unanimously to re-elect Wise to the chairmanship position that she has held for the past four years.

In accepting the nomination, Wise thanked the Board for their continued support and said she looks forward to continuing her role as chairman.

Wise is currently serving in her second term on the Board and also

The Board also unanimously voted to re-elect Cook as vice chairman. This is her fourth year serving as vice chairman. She is a co-founder of the Women's Exercise Research Center of the George Washington University and a past presenter at the American College of Sports Medicine's annual conference. She is active with the Maryland Association of Boards of Education. Mrs. Cook has a bachelor's degree in science and nursing from St. Mary's College, Notre Dame, Indiana, and a Master's degree in education and human development from George Washington University.

County and whose parent/guardian was a full-time employee hired to begin work on or after Jan. 1, 2013, will be waived. The parent/guardian who falls under this guideline will be required to pay half of the county tuition for their child to attend a CCPS elementary, middle or high school zoned for their work location.

CCPS employees are eligible for benefits if they are hired for a permanent/contractual position for at least 20 hours per week. The school system's Department of Student Services determines all transfer requests. Transfer requests must meet certain criteria, and schools must have adequate space, including in the particular grade and instructional programs. Adequate space in a school is determined by state-rated capacity. Additional conditions of approved transfer requests include:

- Students who transfer to a new high school on or before the first day of school are not eligible for athletics for the entire school year.
- Students who transfer to a new high school after the first day of school are not eligible for athletics for one full calendar year, which is determined from the date the student initially enrolls in the new school.
- Students receiving transfers must provide their own transportation to and from school. The school system does not provide transportation for students with approved transfer requests.
- Approval for all transfers is reviewed annually.

Somers teachers join ranks of National Board Certified Teachers

Two Charles County Public Schools (CCPS) middle school teachers – Monica Derencin and Erin Gartland – recently joined the ranks of accomplished teachers nationwide who achieved national certification from the National Board for Professional Teaching Standards (NB-PTS).

Both teachers completed a yearlong performance-based assessment series to become National Board Certified Teachers, according

to a Dec. 18 release by the NBPTS. They join 37 other Charles County Public Schools teachers who hold current national certification status.

Derencin is a language arts teacher at Milton M. Somers Middle School and earned her certificate in the area of English language arts/adolescence and young adulthood. She has been teaching language arts at Somers for the past nine years and works with eighth-grade students. Derencin has a bachelor's degree in English literature from the University of Maryland, Baltimore County and a master's degree in curricu-

lum and instruction from McDaniel College.

Gartland is a science teacher at Somers and earned her certification in the area of science/early adolescence. She has been teaching at Somers for the past eight school years and teaches eighth grade physical science. Gartland has a bachelor's degree in secondary education — biology/group science from Western Michigan University, and a master's degree in education/instructional technology from Walden University.

National Board Certified Teachers must complete a rigorous review of their skills and work, which includes teacher portfolios, student work samples, videotapes, and thorough analysis of the candidates' classroom teaching and student learning. Teachers also complete a series of written exercises that probe the depth of their subject-matter knowledge and their understanding of how to teach that material to students.

These teachers join more than 4,000 teachers nationwide who were certified in 2013. Certifi-

cation is valid for 10 years, after which a teacher may seek renewal. Maryland has 2,575 teachers who are nationally certified and is one of the top 10 states with the highest participation in the certification process.

By achieving National Board Certification, Charles County teachers are eligible for a \$4,500 stipend added to their annual salary as long as they maintain their National Board Certification status.

Only teachers with a standard or advanced professional certificate who have a minimum of three years successful teaching experience are eligible to apply for National Board Certification. Information about the application process is available on the NBPTS website at www. nbpts.org.

Nanjemoy Creek's Emhoff honored with national presidential award for science

Timothy Emhoff, a Charles County Public Schools (CCPS) environmental education resource teacher, was recently named one of 102 national winners of the Presidential Award for Excellence in Mathematics and Science Teaching (PAEMST) by the National Science Foundation. The award is the highest recognition that a kindergarten through grade 12 mathematics or science teacher can receive in the United States.

Emhoff was nominated for the award by Monique Wilson, director of the science center at St. Charles High School and former coordinator of science, technology, engineering and mathematics (STEM) education for CCPS. He was chosen as an award winner from selected mathematics and science teachers from all 50 states and the District of Columbia, and is the science recipient from Maryland. The competition alternates each year between kindergarten through sixth-grade teachers and seventh- through twelfth-grade teachers. National winners are chosen by a panel of distinguished scientists and mathematicians.

As a national recipient, Emhoff receives a \$10,000 grant and said he is honored to receive such a prestigious award. "The award is validation that I am on the right path in terms of my approach to education. I am thankful for my supervisors, colleagues, students and family for their support that has helped me along this path in becoming an effective facilitator," he said.

Emhoff was named an environmental education resource teacher in 2013 and oversees the Nanjemoy Creek Environmental Education Center for CCPS. He previously taught science at Indian Head Elementary School for 13 years, where he used handson activities and inquiry-based labs to connect students with real-world scenarios. Emhoff also coordinated after school sessions for students in need of assistance, and served as a coach for the Mathematics, Engineering and Science Achievement (MESA) and LEGO teams at Indian Head.

In addition to his involvement with the Indian Head community, Emhoff helped design the elementary portion of the Naval Surface War-

fare Center's STEM program Go Places! With Math and Science, and served as a STEM master teacher for the Maryland State Department of Education's (MSDE) Educator Effectiveness Academies. Additionally, he has also helped to facilitate environmental institutes through a partnership with the Alice Ferguson Foundation.

Principals, parents, students or community members can submit nominations for the award and nominations can be submitted for more than one teacher. Teachers can also nominate themselves. Once all nominations are received, nominated teachers are notified and must continue the application process to be considered for an award.

Three schools change start and end times for next year

Charles County Public Schools is changing starting and ending times for three schools and establishing hours for St. Charles High School, which opens in August. The changes will accommodate additional bus routes created with the opening of St. Charles.

The opening times for Berry Elementary School and Theodore G. Davis Middle School are being slightly adjusted for the 2014-15 school year. The hours for Mattawoman Middle School are being shifted to a later schedule for the coming school year, with the school opening nearly an hour later than currently scheduled.

The following are the time changes and are effective August 2014.

- Berry times change to 9:30 a.m. to 4 p.m., which is a 10-minute change.
- Davis new times will be 8:50 a.m. to 3:20 p.m., which is a 10-minute change.
- Mattawoman new hours are 8:25 a.m. to 2:55 p.m. This is a 55-minute change.
- Hours for St. Charles High School are 7:25 a.m. to 2:15 p.m.

The school system plans to implement a fourtier route structure with the selected schools. Buses for Berry, Mattawoman and Davis will first service routes for Westlake High School, followed by routes for Mattawoman and Davis and then Berry.

Proposed government and health textbooks on display

New textbooks proposed by Charles County Public Schools for next school year are available for review at the Jesse L. Starkey Administration Building in La Plata, and several county schools.

One new series of textbooks is proposed for use at the middle school level as part of the health curriculum. The text, Glencoe/McGraw-Hill's *Teen Health*, is a series of eight texts that supplement the Maryland health curriculum. The books are on display at the Starkey Building, and Theodore G. Davis and Benjamin Stoddert middle schools.

Another text, *United States Government – Principles and Practices*, is published by Houghton Mifflin Harcourt and is proposed as an alternative and potential replacement for the current ninth-grade government text. The proposed government text is on display at Maurice J. McDonough, North Point and Westlake high schools.

The Board of Education is reviewing the books and will take action on the books at the March 11 meeting.
