## School system cracks the code to create partnership

Charles County Public Schools (CCPS) students are getting into computer coding, and it is not just in a computer science class. A new partnership with Code.org is helping CCPS infuse computer science and coding in math, science and computer classes for all students, from kindergarteners to high school seniors.

Superintendent Kimberly Hill announced a partnership agreement with Code.org Jan. 30 at Westlake High School during a program that began in Dianne O'Grady-Cunniff's computer science class and moved to the auditorium for a joint statement by Code.org and CCPS officials. The partnership provides training for teachers, expands computer science class offerings and upgrades curriculum.

The announcement included lessons in computer science. Four elementary school students who participated in the recent Code. org-sponsored Hour of Code taught Charles County Sheriff Rex Coffey and Charles County Commissioner Vice President Reu-

ben Collins how to write code. The students used an Angry Bird app to teach Coffey how to create the bird's moves one line of code at a time. Collins learned how to create an animated cartoon figure using coding in a program called Scratch.

Pat Yongpradit, Code.org's education director, called CCPS a model district saying the school system is a national leader in the promotion of computer science for students. "There are only a few school systems nationwide implementing computer science in such an aggressive way. Every single kid in high school will have the opportunity to take a computer science class. This shows Charles County's commitment to give all students an opportunity to learn computer science," Yongpradit said in an interview.

"Computer science helps students create, not simply use, new technologies ... Code. org is dedicated to inspiring students to learn computer science and for schools to teach it. We are dedicated to enhancing Science,

There can only be one nominee per school. Nominations are due by Feb. 27 to the office of human resources. Application information is available on the Charles County Public Schools website at http:// www.ccboe.com/jobs/emprec.php. Applications should include the candidate's educational and professional development history; professional biography; examples of community involvement; a statement on the candidate's philosophy/style of teaching; three letters of support from a principal, administrator, colleague, student or former student, parent or civic leader; and statements on education issues and trends. as well as the teaching profession. The 2014 Charles County Teacher of the Year will have opportunities to speak to students and staff during events such as New Teacher Orientation, and will also attend the state Teacher of the Year ceremony and gala.

Technology, Engineering and Mathematics (STEM) offerings and demystifying computer science and code. The partnership with Code.org will help us expose all students to computer science, a skill essential for our students' success," Hill said in an interview.

Code.org is a non-profit organization backed by companies like Google, Amazon, Dropbox, Microsoft and others, and will pay for curriculum materials and teacher training. The CCPS partnership with Code.org is a multi-year commitment that uses a master teacher model to build a professional development standard for years to come without reliance on Code. org. Teacher training begins in the spring, and students may sign up for courses in the 2014-15 school year. As part of the initiative, CCPS is piloting a new Advanced Placement course, Computer Science Principles.

"This is not just one computer science course. It is a package. This is the beginning of standardizing computer science skills within Charles County Public Schools," Hill said.

"Every student in Charles County Public Schools will be exposed to the skills that computer science has to offer. Every student will learn how to think critically, how to analyze a problem and how to come up with a solution. Instead of being intimidated by computer science, Charles County Public Schools students will learn about how much fun computer science can be," Hill said during remarks at the program.

Hill commended three teachers, Joseph Greenawalt and Janet Bondelid of North Point High School and O'Grady-Cunniff, for their work that led to the partnership.

"In Charles County Public Schools, we believe that we can be the difference in the life of a child. We believe that we can teach children that they are capable of changing the world. Our partnership with Code.org enhances our ability to impact children and their future, and we are proud to announce this partnership today," Hill said.

## Miller, Joshi receive recognition for efforts in gifted and talented education

The Maryland State Department of Education (MSDE) and the Maryland Advisory Council on Gifted and Talented Education recently honored two Charles County Public Schools educators – T. C. Martin Elementary School Principal Greg Miller and Aparna Joshi, a gifted education resource teacher at Milton M. Somers Middle School – for their efforts in gifted education. Miller received the 2013 Outstanding Educator – School Administrator award and Joshi was honored with the 2013 Teacher as Leader in Gifted and Talented Education award.

The Maryland State Advisory Council on Gifted and Talented Education annually honors educators, students and community organizations for their contributions in developing the talents of Maryland students from all populations in gifted education. Miller is one of six Maryland school administrators recognized this year, and Joshi is one of 20 Maryland teachers honored with a Teacher as Leader award.

Miller has been the principal at Martin since 2011. He was nominated for the award by Kathy Stapleson, a gifted education resource teacher at Martin, for his efforts in expanding the gifted program. In 2013, the school received an Excellence in Gifted and Talented Education (EGATE) award, which honors elementary, middle and high schools that offer gifted and talented programs that model excellence and focus on improving levels of student achievement. Stapleson said Miller was instrumental in Martin's selection for the award.

"He shows leadership in expanding and improving the gifted program and services in our school. His support of the gifted committee, passion for the EGATE award and his willingness to allocate time and materials to the gifted program make him eligible for this prestigious award," Stapleson wrote in a nomination letter. Miller also works with Stapleson to present gifted information to parents at school events and encourages teachers to seek additional training opportunities to enhance their knowledge of gifted education practices. Last school year, Miller coordinated a schoolwide event to celebrate Martin's selection as an EGATE award recipient and recognized students and staff for their accomplishments in gifted education. As an administrator, Miller also participates in gifted identification screening meetings, dedicates time during staff meetings to discuss gifted services and monitors the delivery of instruction with students identified for gifted services.

Joshi has been the gifted education resource teacher at Somers for the past three school years. She was nominated for the award by Mary

Seremet, a gifted education resource teacher for Charles County Public Schools. Seremet works with gifted education teachers at the middle-school level and said Joshi is an exemplary leader. "In her role as the gifted resource teacher, Joshi has distinguished herself as an enthusiastic educator with a passionate commitment to student development and success. She is masterful in developing and adapting curriculum in order to meet both the cognitive and affective needs of gifted learners," Seremet wrote in a nomination letter.

As the gifted education teacher at Somers, Joshi collaborates with teachers of identified students to implement instructional practices for high student achievement. She encourages her students to explore their passions and coordinates several extended-learning opportunities, from advanced book clubs and robotics-team events to essay contests. Joshi also leads systemwide workshops and has helped write curriculum for gifted language arts, earth science and Algebra I.

She is a national certified teacher, holds the Maryland gifted and talented education specialist certification, and holds a certificate in space studies. Joshi was also recognized for her efforts in utilizing technology in the classroom and was named a teacher liaison as part of Charles County Public Schools partnership with the Space Foundation.

# Somers honored for excellence with gifted and talented education award

The Maryland State Advisory Council for Gifted and Talented Education and the Maryland State Department of Education (MSDE) recently named Milton M. Somers Middle School as one of nine Maryland schools selected for a 2013 Excellence in Gifted and Talented Education (EGATE) school award. The recognition program honors elementary, middle and high schools that offer gifted and talented programs that model excellence and focus on improving levels of student achievement.

The awards program was launched in 2010 by MSDE and the State Advisory Council on Gifted and Talented Education. To be considered for the program, schools submit a comprehensive application that includes documentation that demonstrates their program is aligned with criteria outlined in the Maryland Criteria for Excellence: Gifted and Talented Program Guidelines. All public elementary, middle and high schools in Maryland are eligible to apply.

Criteria are focused on each of the four Maryland EGATE objectives and corresponding criteria, which include: student identification; curriculum and instruction, including a focus on content, instructional strategies, products and the learning environment; professional qualified teachers and professional development; and program management and evaluation.

Somers is Charles County's fourth school to receive the award recognition and will be honored at a state reception Feb. 27. As an EGATE recipient, Somers will also receive a Governor's citation, EGATE school banner and plaque. Additionally, Somers will serve as a model EGATE school and must reapply every five years in order to maintain their EGATE status.

Other Charles County EGATE schools are Dr. James Craik, T.C. Martin and William B. Wade elementary schools.
