Important Dates Coming Soon

Spring break

Spring break for students and teachers is March 29 - April 5. Administrative offices will be closed on Friday, March 29, and Monday, April 1. The school system will operate on a 7:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. schedule during spring break on days that administrative offices are open. Schools will reopen on Monday, April 8.

Three pay dates this month

Last day of school is June 14

The last day of the 2012-13 school year for Charles County Public Schools students is Friday, June 14. Two-hour early dismissal days are June 12, 13 and 14. The last day of school for students in the Three's Program is Tuesday, June 11. The last day for teachers is Monday, June 17.

Charles County Public Schools used the four inclement weather days built into the school calendar. Elementary school report cards will be issued to students on June 14. Report cards for middle and high school students will be mailed on June 21.

Registration for the 2013 Summer School program is at the Robert D. Stethem Educational Center on June 26-27, from 8 a.m. to 7 p.m. Classes begin for Summer School on July 2 at Westlake High School.

Additionally, schools will hold separate Summer Academy learning opportunities for students. Elementary and middle school activities are planned for the end of June and into July, and high school activities are planned for mid-July. Marchione named Counselor of the Year

William “Bill” Marchione, a school counselor at Piccowaxen Middle School, was recently selected as the Maryland Middle School Counselor of the Year by the Maryland School Counselor Association (MSCA). The award recognizes school counselors for outstanding achievement and service to students and for providing leadership in school counseling services.

Piccowaxen Principal Kenneth Schroeck nominated Marchione for his passion and dedication to student success, for implementing several positive school-based initiatives for students, and for serving as a role model and leader for students and staff members. Schroeck said Marchione’s work ethic and commitment to children are exceptional.

“I respect and admire the way he inspires students, models character and inspires passion. Mr. Marchione not only embodies the quality of the award but he inspires me to find new and better ways of reaching children,” Schroeck wrote in an award nomination letter.

Marchione began his career with Charles County Public Schools in 2007 as a

counselor at Piccowaxen. During the past six years, he has implemented several programs such as peer tutoring, peer mediation and conflict resolution, as well as coordinated quarterly counseling lessons, monthly Positive Behavioral Interventions and Supports (PBIS) lessons and anti-bullying programs.

Marchione said he is honored to be recognized for working in a profession that he loves. “I am very honored to receive this award, though I do find it hard to be in the spotlight because I know so many counselors who work just as hard, or harder than I do. I came into this career looking to make a difference in the lives of students from the start. I am extremely honored to be recognized by the MSCA as the Middle School Counselor of the Year,” Marchione said.

He will be honored by the MSCA at their annual conference on April 19.

Apply for National Board Certification

Teachers and specialists who hold a Standard Professional or Advanced Professional Certificate and have a minimum of three years of successful teaching experience in Charles County on a Maryland professional certificate are eligible to apply for National Board Certification (NBC). Applicants must submit a candidate packet, which includes a letter of interest indicating the area they wish to pursue and why they want to pursue National Board Certification, a writing prompt activity in conjunction with NBC standards; a letter of recommendation from their principal or supervisor and a current resume.

Candidates are screened to determine who will represent Charles County Public Schools (CCPS) in the 2013-14 program. The Maryland State Department of Education (MSDE) limits the number of applicants to 10, and the \$2,500 application fee is funded by MSDE and CCPS.

An information session for interested applicants is scheduled for 4:30 p.m., Tues-

day, April 9, in conference room 121 at the Jesse L. Starkey Administration Building. The writing prompt activity to be included with each candidate packet will be distributed at this meeting. Current National Board Certified teachers will be available to speak with attendees about the application process. RSVP by April 5 to Barbara Simmons at bsimmons@ccboe.com.

Teachers choosing to pursue National Board Certification must complete a demanding two-part demonstration of their knowledge and skills by developing a portfolio that reflects various aspects of their teaching background and attend an assessment center during the 2013-14 application cycle, where they will complete six intensive, timed exercises.

The F.B. Gwynn Educational Center is one of Charles County Public Schools four specialized centers, and provides special education programs and services for more than 165 students with special needs. Programs include STAY, Autism and the Infants and Toddlers, and serve children from birth to 21 years of age. "The F.B. Gwynn Center is a special center. You will hear stories today of parents and students who faced incredible obstacles to learning, but with the help of teachers and staff at the Gwynn Center, they have excelled," said guest speaker and Board of Education Chairman Roberta Wise.


Gwynn also houses a Parent Center, which offers supportive services designed to assist parents of children with disabilities in finding help and information. "The Gwynn Center is a place where parents can get information and support. For many parents of children with special needs, information is what they need most. It is here where parents often get the answers they seek through early identification of a special need and information about what to expect, how to respond and where support is available," Wise said.

The Gwynn Center opened in 1977 and renovations to the building began in January 2011 and were completed this year. Renovations were planned to provide additional instructional space for students and staff, enhanced building security and an expansion of the Parent Center and instructional program areas. Renovations added parking lot space to allow for more bus and visitor traffic. Upgrades included carpet, paint, ceiling and lighting upgrades and exterior doors and windows as well as the addition of a heating and air conditioning unit in the gymnasium. Renovation costs were approximately \$3.5 million, which is more than the \$1.9 million it cost to build the center in 1977. Federal, state and county money combined to complete the renovations, which were conducted in three phases in order to minimize the disruption to students, staff and programs.

Superintendent James E. Richmond, while welcoming guests at the ceremony, told the group he was proud the system found a way to renovate the Gwynn Center before his 17-year tenure as Superintendent ends. "I have wanted to renovate Gwynn for a long time. Nothing makes me prouder than having found a way to finance the much-needed upgrades, including safety and security enhancements and adapted instructional spaces that better meet the needs of the students, parents and staff who use this center every day. You deserve this," he said.
