## Stone students get 'Every 15 Minutes' reminder

The Grim Reaper visited a Thomas Stone High School classroom every 15 minutes on Thursday, leaving behind a "living dead"

student who silently reminded classmates of the consequences of drinking or texting while driving.

The Thomas Stone Student Government Safe Driving Task Force participated in the National Every 15 Minutes program on April 12 and 13, which included a mock automobile accident, the re-

moval by the Grim Reaper of 30 preselected students from classrooms and a post-school trial of the "drunk" driver who caused the morning accident. Sponsored and coordinated by the Waldorf Volunteer Fire Department (WVFD), Every 15 Minutes is a national two-day program that encourages students to think about personal safety when driving, especially when alcohol or texting are involved. The program challenges students to recognize that their actions affect others besides themselves.

Traffic collisions are the leading cause of death among teen-age youth, said Guy

Yesse, event coordinator and Emergency Medical Services (EMS) lieutenant with the WVFD. The program goal, which is geared

toward eleventhand twelfthgrade students, is to educate teens through realistic experiences that simulate the magnitude of tragedies caused by drunk driving and texting while driving, Yesse said.

At the end of the day, students who participated in the staged accident as well as those who were

made-up as the "living dead" were taken to Camp Merrick in Nanjemoy for an overnight retreat.

Students made a presentation on Friday when they were "brought back to life." The focus of the assembly stressed that the decision to consume alcohol can affect many more people than just the one who drinks and the dangers of texting while driving. "This program has a powerful message that is designed to prevent drunk driving and texting while driving," said Thomas Stone Principal L.C. Martin. "If we save one student's life, it is worth it," Martin added.

## Transfer rule includes provisions for employees

Employees will still be able to request school transfers for their children under a new rule adopted by the Board of Education this week, but the choice of schools will be limited.

On April 10, the Board of Education agreed to Superintendent James E. Richmond's changes to Rule 5126 that tighten the

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criteria for transfers for children of employees. The biggest change for employees is that transfer approvals for their children are now restricted to the elementary, middle or high school that is zoned for the employee's work location. For example, an employee at Maurice J. McDonough High School who lives in a different school zone may receive

## Schools recognized by MSDE for testing advances

Nine Charles County public schools earned recognition in the 2011 Maryland School Performance Recognition Program, which honors schools for academic and subgroup achievement on the Maryland School Assessment (MSA) or the High School Assessment (HSA).

Four schools were honored for overall academic achievement. They are Dr. James Craik Elementary School, Milton M. Somers and Piccowaxen middle schools, and La Plata High School. Somers and Piccowaxen, as well as La Plata, were also honored for subgroup achievement.

Five schools were honored for subgroup achievement. They are Dr. Thomas L. Higdon, Malcolm, Mary H. Matula and Walter J. Mitchell elementary schools, and Westlake High School.

The program, facilitated by the Maryland State Department of Education (MSDE), honors schools for performance on the 2011 MSA or the HSA, and for improving the performance of special populations of students. Only schools that made Adequate Yearly Progress (AYP) for the 2010-11 school year were eligible for recognition.

Subgroups are special populations that include race/ethnicity, special education, limited English proficiency, and students receiving free- or reduced-price meals. The program was established by the Maryland General Assembly in 1996, and is now required by the federal No Child Left Behind Act.

## Explore the solar system and beyond through the Space Discovery Institute

Are you interested in learning about rockets, space transportation, the effect of microgravity on the human body or the future of space exploration? Sign up for the Space Discovery Institute, offered this summer through Charles County Public Schools (CCPS) partnership with the Colorado Springs-based Space Foundation.

The institute is available for Charles County Public Schools teachers and certificated staff, and will be held at Theodore G. Davis Middle School. The four, weeklong sessions focus on astronomy, biological and physical research, rocketry and space technologies in the classroom. There are 50 available spaces per session and participants can sign up for more than one session. The sessions run from 8:30 a.m. to 5 p.m., and the schedule is as follows:

- Astronomy Principles for the Classroom July 23-27: this course focuses on exciting ways to bring the universe into the classroom. Topics include motions of the heavens, astronomical research tools, stars and constellations, auroras and planets. Participants will also participate in a night of planet and stargazing with telescopes.
- Space Technologies in the Classroom: Robotics and Nanotechnology July 23-27: this course examines the use of space technologies in society. Through field trips and hands-on demonstrations, participants will receive an introduction to space transportation and design, robotics, communications, space power and space structures. Participants will explore a variety of space technologies and con-

struct their own robot, and will also learn about the field of nanotechnology.

- Rocketry Space History and Future of Space Flight July 30-Aug. 3: participants will learn about the history of rocketry and space exploration, and will build various rockets to use in the classroom with students. The course also features information on the structure and design of rocketry, Newton's Laws of Motion, as well as aero-dynamics.
- Biological and Physical Research: Long-Term Space Travel July 30 Aug. 3: this course covers the effects of microgravity on the human body and other dangers that space exploration presents for humans. Participants will learn about immunology, brain research, cardiovascular and skeletal impacts and will have the opportunity to experience the effects of disorientation during space flight.

The free sessions are open to CCPS teachers across all subjects and grade levels. Participants also have the option of completing sessions for professional development or graduate credit. All courses will be taught by Space Foundation staff and include a light breakfast and lunch.

## Applications sought from teachers interested in National Board Certification

Teachers and specialists who hold a Standard Professional or Advanced Professional Certificate and have a minimum of three years of successful teaching experience are eligible to apply for National Board Certification. Applicants must submit a candidate packet, which includes a letter of interest, a one-page essay indicating why they want to pursue national certification and how it will enhance their teaching competencies and effectiveness, a letter of recommendation from their principal or supervisor and a current resume. Candidates are screened by a review committee to determine who will represent Charles County Public Schools (CCPS) in the 2012-13 fee incentive program. The Maryland State Department of Education (MSDE) limits the number of applicants for the school system to 10 candidates, and the \$2,500 application fee is funded by MSDE and CCPS.

Teachers choosing to pursue National Board Certification must complete a demanding two-part demonstration of their knowledge and skills by developing a portfolio that reflects various aspects of their teaching background and attend an assessment center during the 2012-13 application cycle, where they will complete six intensive, timed exercises. There are 25 certification areas and educators who earn National Board Certification earn six approved professional development credits, an annual \$1,000 stipend from MSDE and \$2,500 from the school system.

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a transfer approval for their child to attend McDonough, General Smallwood Middle School or James Craik, which are zoned for McDonough.

The Charles County Public Schools (CCPS) Department of Student Services will determine all transfer requests, and employees are required to fill out a school change form for the transfer.

The rule applies to all full-time employees; however, if the employee lives outside of Charles County, the county tuition will be waived, but the employee is responsible for paying any costs above the established regular education county student rate.

Students receiving transfers must provide their own transportation to and from school and may not participate in athletics for one year. Athletic participation dates are determined by the transfer date.

Students granted school transfers prior to the 2012-13 school year are allowed to remain in their current school until they are no longer enrolled in the specific school, unless the Superintendent rescinds the transfer. Reasons for rescinding a transfer could include
