### Board of Education elects chairman, vice chairman

The Board of Education of Charles County elected Roberta Wise as chairman and Maura Cook as vice chairman at its Jan. 11 meeting. The Board elects a chairman and vice chairman each January. Officers serve one-year terms.

Board members unanimously re-elected Wise to the chairmanship position that she has held for the past year. A second-term Board member, Wise also served as vice chairman of the Board for three years after

first being elected in 2006. She is a retired Charles County Public Schools teacher with 34 years of experience. A former Charles County Public Schools Teacher of the Year, she also

received the *Washington Post* Agnes Meyer award for outstanding teachers in 1991. For most of her career, she served as a mathematics teacher at Henry E. Lackey High School.

She was a coordinator of the Educational Partnership Team and a math resource teacher before retiring in 1999.

Cook is new to the position of vice chairman and replaces longtime member Donald

Wade, who is entering his fourth term as a Board member. She works as a nurse case manager planning and coordinating health services for patients as well as writing, developing and present-

ing briefings on medical topics to insurance companies and risk managers. She is a parent volunteer and a former award-winning Destination Imagination coach and parent-teacher association officer. She is also the co-founder of the Women's Exercise Research Center of the George Washington University and a past presenter at the American College of Sports Medicine's annual conference.

### CCPS seeking Teacher of the Year nominations

Charles County Public Schools is seeking nominations for the school system's Maryland Teacher of the Year candidate. The nominated teacher must be a classroom, resource or media teacher who spends the majority of his or her time teaching and has a minimum of five years teaching experience. The selected candidate will also be named the 2011 Charles County Teacher of the Year.

There can only be one nominee per school. Nominations are due by March 31 to the office of human resources. Application information is located on the Charles County Public Schools Web site at this direct link: http://www2.ccboe.com/TOY.cfm.

Applications should include the candidate's educational and professional development history; professional biography; examples of community involvement; a statement on the candidate's philosophy/style of teaching; at least three letters of support from a principal, administrator, colleague, student or

former student, parent or civic leader; and statements on education issues and trends, as well as the teaching profession. For additional application information, visit the school system Web site.

There is a two-tiered process for the selection of the candidate for the Maryland Teacher of the Year. The first step is at the county level where applications are received, semi-finalists are selected and interviewed by a panel of school system staff, and one candidate is selected to represent the Teacher of the Year for Charles County. Each Maryland county and Baltimore City selects one teacher and sends their completed application to the Maryland State Department of Education (MSDE). The applications are then scored and tallied, interviews are conducted, and the Maryland Teacher of the Year is selected by MSDE.

### System implements confidential reporting processes

County Public recently developed confidential reporting procedures for employees to use to report suspected financial fraud, illegal activities, waste and abuse. Employees can report information by calling 301-302-8305 to leave a confidential voicemail or by e-mail to Board of Education Chairman Roberta S. Wise at rswise@ccboe.com. Information or complaints will be forwarded to the appropriate staff for investigation. Employees can also submit complaints in writing to their supervisor, the Assistant Superintendent of Human Resources, Keith Hettel, or Superintendent of Schools James E. Richmond.

The Board of Education encourages employees to report any actions which may violate the law, regulations, policies, rules or procedures. Board policy no. 4820, located on Board Docs at http://www.boarddocs.com/mabe/ccpsmd/Board.nsf., states that the school system cannot retaliate against any employee for filing a report in good faith.

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The procedures were developed to better protect the school system's assets and financial integrity. The types of information that should be reported include theft of system property or money; misuse of system assets; conflicts of interest; or waste/abuse of system resources.

Fraudulent acts are considered to be deliberate and intentional acts to obtain unauthorized or unlawful gain of money, property or an advantage to which the recipient would normally not have. Illegal activity is any violation of laws/regulations and violations of contract provisions or grant agreements. Waste is the excessive expenditure or allocation of resources above and beyond what is needed. Abuse is behavior that is deficient or improper when compared with reasonable business practice behavior.

### Ethics regulations apply to all Charles County Public Schools employees

The Charles County Board of Education Ethics Regulations apply to all CCPS employees. Any violations of the regulations by employees may result in discipline up to and including dismissal.

Complaints alleging violations may be filed with the Board of Education's Ethics Panel, a five-member panel consisting of individuals from the Charles County community. The panel reviews complaints and issues recommendations concerning violations to the Board of Education. In addition, questions concerning the applicability of the regulations to a particular situation may be addressed to the panel, which will issue a non-binding advisory opinion

concerning the matter.

Under the regulations, employees may not:

- Participate on behalf of the school system in any matter which would, to their knowledge, create a "conflict of interest," defined as a situation in which a person's impartiality or independence of judgment may be impaired, or any action which could have a direct financial impact, as distinguished from the public generally, on either:
- (1) themselves or their spouse, parent, brother, sister, or child; or
- (2) a business entity in which they have ownership; or hold an interest of at least either \$5,000 or 3 percent; or hold employment.
- Be employed by a business entity that has or is negotiating a contract of more than \$2,500 with the school system, unless:
- (1) the employment is disclosed to a direct supervisor;
- (2) the employee does not participate in any matter which could reasonably be expected to result in a conflict of interest, as defined above:
- (3) the employee reports the employment to the Ethics Panel; and
- (4) the Ethics Panel issues an advisory opinion concluding that the employment

does not create a conflict of interest or the appearance of a conflict of interest.

- Hold any outside employment relationship that would impair or would appear to impair their impartiality or independence of judgment.
- Represent any party, for a contingent fee, before the school system.
- Within one year following termination of the school system service, act as a compensated representative of another in connection with any specific matter in which he or she participated substantially as an employee.
- Solicit any gift from any student, employee, or other person who is under the authority of the school system or any person or business entity who has or is negotiating a contract or doing or seeking to do business with the school system.
- Accept gifts or series of gifts of greater than \$50 in value from any student, employee, or other person who is under the authority of the school system or any person or business entity who has or is negotiating a contract or doing or seeking to do business with the school system, except that the following gifts may be accepted:

- (1) ceremonial gifts or awards which have insignificant monetary value;
- (2) meals and beverages, provided they are consumed in the presence of the donor;
- (3) reasonable expenses for food, travel, or lodging at a conference, meeting, or other event at which the recipient is speaking or presenting;
- (4) tickets or free admission to events generally provided to the individual in his or her official capacity;
- (5) gifts received from the recipient's parent, spouse, sibling, or child; and
- (6) as determined by the Ethics Panel, any other gift which was not intended to create, did not create, and did not appear to create a conflict of interest.
- Knowingly use the prestige of their offices for their own benefit or that of another.
- Knowingly use confidential information acquired in their official school system position for their own benefit or that of another.
- Knowingly fail to report any violation of the Ethics Regulations to the Board of Education of Charles County Ethics Panel.

#### Ethics panel members

There are five members on the Board of Education ethics panel. The Board panel was appointed in 2010 and serves a four-year term. Members are volunteers and are appointed by the Board. The current term ends June 30, 2014.
