#### **Become a Youth Cabinet member!**

After half term, The Hastings Academy will be holding their Youth Cabinet Elections. The Hastings Youth Cabinet is a group of 11-18 year olds who are the elected and representative voice for children and young people in East Sussex. Youth Cabinet members play a role in campaigning on issues that young people have voted as a concern to them, responding to local issues and consultations. East Sussex Youth Cabinet is non-political.

Any student at The Hastings Academy can apply as long as they have an interest in changing their community for the better and can commit to two years as a representative. They will have plenty of training and support from trained youth workers. They will be required to attend meetings, sometimes online or sometimes in Eastbourne, but members will have all out-of-pocket expenses covered, with both public transport and refreshments reimbursed. They will also receive recognition for their achievements and earn references for CV's, college and university applications.

Emergency Talks are being held over the energy crisis – prices of gas and electric are set to soar over the winter.

England managed to beat Andorra 5-0 in the World Cup Qualifiers – an especially dramatic game as part of the stadium caught fire the morning of the match.

This week marks the 955<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Battle of Hastings. To commemorate the occasion, hundreds of volunteers playing Saxons and Normans clashed at the weekend in a re-enactment of the battle.

### Year 10 Trip to the De La Warr Pavilion

The Art department took a group of Year 10 Art and sculpture students to the De La Warr Pavilion in Bexhill to look at the exhibition "Cursebreakers" by artist Alexi Marshall which depicts a range of mythological and pagan tales relating to Hastings and its inhabitants. Students also created a range of studies of the promenade and beach, using a variety of drawing media, which are now on display outside the Art department.



### Year 11 Core Mock Exams

Our year 11 students have focused this week on sitting mock exams in English, Maths and Science. Well done to all our Year 11 students on the preparation, focus and positive attitude throughout this week. Don't forget the period 6 Revision sessions.

### Year 7 Science trip

This week, Mr Rose and the Science Department led three trips for the Year 7 students. This fabulous trip allowed our students to see waves and apply their knowledge to real life situations. The students looked at wave speed against the harbour arm in real time, they also looked at the rock cycle and saw how this was taking place at Rock-A-Nore and observed the layers of rock. Students observed the range of biodiversity on the East Hill and Firehills. They made informed use of the pooters and quadrats to explore the range of organisms across the area and measured how changes in biodiversity occurred across the space. Students enjoyed a wonderful walk in the fine weather from the East Hill to North Seat through Fairlight to observe the local biodiversity and take in the natural local environment.

#### LFD tests over half term

The DfE have stated that staff, students and pupils should continue to test twice-weekly over half-term and preferably take an LFD test the night before they return to their setting after the break. As always we wish you a safe holiday.
