Middle school students also have the opportunity each day at recess to go to our Media Center where there are a bunch of cool options! Many students settle into a comfortable chair and read quietly. We have awesome new-fangled building planks and old-school Lincoln logs. Students have been building cool ramps for marbles to race down while others design structures with colorful geometric flakes

As with everything we do, recess is personal and individual. Middle school is the time of our lives where we really begin to figure out who we are and what we are going to be about. Our job as educators of this unique age group is to expose them to as much good stuff as we can and see what sticks. Even during recess!

STEM

5th Graders have been outside this week practicing the skills they need to be a naturalist. Through observations, recording, and sharing their findings the students are developing a toolset that will lead them through their years at RMS-CES. 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



Social Studies

This week in 5th grade social studies, we began to examine each Native American region more in depth. We covered the Southwest, Plains, and the Pacific Northwest. On Wednesday, the students listened to the book, The Gift of the Sacred Dog by Paul Goble.

They rewrote a quote from the book using picture symbols on a "buffalo hide."









This week in math, students ordered and compared whole numbers and decimal numbers. They reviewed how to write a fraction as a decimal and vice versa. Students completed a virtual place value scavenger hunt where they reviewed standard form, word form, and expanded form of numbers. Later in the week, 5th graders took their Math FAST Tests and ended their weeks reviewing addition and subtraction of whole numbers. Next week, students will get textbooks and we will start our first unit on decimal addition and subtraction.

5th grade readers were busy this past week showing what they know on the FAST Reading test. They also became familiar with their genre tally sheet that is a tracker of all the different genres they will be reading in this year towards their "Magic 40." Students also chose their book nooks (quiet places) in the classroom they will read in during read to self time, where they can focus on their reading and get lost in a book.



SCIENCE


Students have been working to learn more about CER technique in science. *CER stands for claim, evidence, and reasoning.* Students had a few opportunities to practice using CER technique and ended last week examining our puzzle cubes, attempting to make a claim about what they thought was located on the bottom side of the cube. They were not allowed to touch or move the cube, but had to use the evidence provided on the other five sides to make their most reasonable claim. It was both a fun and frustrating activity! This week, we spent time starting to look at data. Students created a leaf glyph containing information about themselves and then created questions that they could answer using the data found on the glyphs. They graphed the data and used the info they collected to answer their initial questions.

Science

Wow! A huge surprise this week! White/yellow plants grew in the darkness and taller green plants in the light. It appears the light variable has a *big impact* on plant growth! More to come...








Language Arts





Language Art

Last week in LA8, we studied the Oglala Lakota culture, which also helped us gain a better perspective on how Native Americans value Nature. The 5th – 8th grade writers who contributed to the book, *Walking on Earth & Touching the Sky*, attend the Red Cloud Indian School on the Pine Ridge Indian Reservation in South Dakota and have written about their relationships with Unci Maka, Grandmother Earth. Last Friday, we headed up the hill and worked through a "Poetry in the

Forest" activity. Rotating through different stations, students read and analyzed a selection of poems from the book.


Next, they will let their inner poet shine as they write a Haiku based on their observations from the forest.

Global Studies

This week in Global Studies students reviewed and practiced basic map reading skills that they have learned in previous years. This practice will lead towards the students creating an accurate map of the school forest next week. As part of the project students will be required to show what they have learned about

basic map reading tools. On Friday, students participated in their first Friday Current Events lesson, which will be a part of curriculum throughout the year on Fridays. Students started by taking a self-assessment on their ability to identify fact versus fiction in the media.
