# Proving the theorem: we're good at math

## The Advanced Topics in Math course brings university to Collingwood.

The highest level of math offered at an AP school such as Collingwood is AP Calculus BC. So what happens when you have a group of exceptional students who ace this course in Grade 11? What math do they take in Grade 12?

Faced with this complex problem, Andrew Wong, Head of Math, and Brian McDonald, Director of University Guidance, wondered if there might be a way to bring university-level math to Collingwood. To explore the possibilities, they met with Manfred Trummer, Chair of Mathematics Department at Simon Fraser University. He suggested they speak with Brenda Davison, a Senior Lecturer in his department.

Brenda jumped at the chance to develop a course that would inspire and push this motivated group of students. This class was going to be interesting, exciting and fun. The course would focus on problem-solving and inquiry-based learning. Instead of narrowly focusing on linear algebra or multivariable calculus, Brenda suggested the course explore a range of 1st to 3rd-year university topics. This way, students would be introduced to a broad variety of areas that would serve to inspire their curiosities. She developed a course syllabus, using a traditional university semester class model. Our first Advanced Topics in Math cohort included Andrew Chin, Millie Huang, Casey Lake, Bruce Qin, William Xu, Shao Bo Zhang, Leon Zhou and Selina Zhou. As the school year began, Brenda's ability to manage the pace and direction of learning allowed the class to delve deeper into specific areas of interest. One of the unique aspects of this course is the introduction of the concept of proof. Not typically taught in high school, Brenda believes advanced high school students are ready to begin developing the techniques required to prove a theorem. This is a more sophisticated approach to learning and problem solving and will help accelerate a student's development as they transition to post-secondary. Students were also tasked with researching a specific area of interest, which resulted in an inspiring collection of projects. While considered a credit course, these locally-developed, board approved courses do not technically count as an AP. These courses, however, are very much taken into consideration by US universities during their admissions process. Interestingly, many top-tier US preparatory schools have moved away from AP courses because they lack sufficient rigour. More importantly, this challenging coursework helps students prepare for tough entrance exams at universities such as Oxford and Cambridge.

Not surprisingly, the Advanced Topics in Math cohort proved the above statement to be true. The group accepted offers from a wide variety of prestigious universities that include Oxford, Cal Tech, Georgia Tech, Carnegie Melon and Penn. **•**

# Talking in circles

Building empathy through group dialogue in the classroom

**MR. SORIL'S GRADE 5 CLASS** returns from their science block with a whirlwind of energy and excitement. It's time for a learning circle.

As they settle into their seats, a sudden calm comes over the room. There are a few rules for circles. Only one participant can speak at a time. No putdowns. Everyone is equal. If you don't want to speak, you don't have to. And what's said in the circle, stays in the circle.

Mr. Soril, who goes by Tim during the circle, introduces the talking piece. It's a small artifact that Tim explains has meaning to him because he acquired it while on a special vacation. He then introduces the topic that will be explored in today's circle: the subject of family. He poses a simple question, "What does family mean to you?" He then passes



the speaking piece to his left. One by one, the class speaks on the subject. Some of the comments are what you'd expect from an 11-year-old. Some comments are surprisingly insightful. Some are surprisingly personal. Most striking is the absence of commentary, snickers or disengagement. Everyone in the circle is paying attention. Everyone is being heard.

An Indigenous people's tradition, learning circles provide a format for organizing and honouring the collective wisdom of a group of individuals. Often used to empower members to make choices and take action, Mr. Soril believes that using circles in the classroom helps to build trust among peers, respect for diversity of experience and fosters both listening and speaking skills. Most importantly, it helps students develop their empathy. As one student put it, "Circles brings us together as a family, and I believe it can make Wentworth a better place." **(** 







# **MANY PRO ATHLETES TAKE DANCE CLASSES** to work on their body control.

With this in mind, a few years ago Collingwood dance teacher Cara Tench suggested to Siamak Salehi that he bring the Grade 8 boys basketball skills class to take some dance classes with her. The boys had a blast and quickly realized that dance is extremely beneficial for footwork in sports such as basketball, soccer and rugby. Several of the boys signed up for Dance 9. The next year even more boys signed up for Dance 10. By 2017, there were enough boys taking dance at Collingwood to feature a boys-only number in the annual show. Over this past year, the number of boys in dance has doubled. We hit a new high of eight boys enrolled in Dance 8/9. In the annual show, we had a record of 21 boys.

Interestingly, we now see boys recruiting other boys for dance. For example, one day Cara was sitting at lunch talking to Joey Ficocelli and Linus Hartner. Joey, one of the first wave of athlete dancers, told Linus that Cara's dance class would change





his life. Linus wasn't totally sold but agreed to take a class. Not surprisingly, Linus loved it and took two classes the following year. He even participated in the dance class trip to New York.

"It's all about recognizing the benefits of dance," says Cara. "It doesn't just supplement sports training, it also supplements their lives." While this represents a real example of Collingwood's goal of providing a Four Strand education, it isn't always easy to pull off. Athletics coaches and dance teachers routinely coordinate schedules so that kids can participate in both. For example, this past year the senior rugby team was playing in the provincial championships in Abbotsford at the same time as the annual show. With some help from Google Traffic, several kids were able to participate in both events. Not only was the dance show a great success, but Collingwood also won it's 8th BC AA rugby title.

We'd like to think that Collingwood's dance program played a role in this victory.





# It takes more than just marks to get into the toughest universities

**THIS FALL,** Bruce Qin will be attending the Georgia Institute of Technology.

As you may know, Georgia Tech is one of the top engineering schools in the US. How did Bruce get into this incredible school? For starters, he earned an A in all of his Gr. 12 classes, including some of the toughest courses that Collingwood has to offer – Organic Chemistry, AP Physics 1, AP Calculus, AB, AP Physics 2, AP Microeconomics and AP Macroeconomics. His only non-A (it was a B) came in the university level Advanced Topics In Mathematics (see cover story, "Proving the theorem: we're good at math.")

So were these great grades enough to earn Bruce a spot at Georgia Tech? Probably not, according to the Collingwood's Director of University Guidance, Brian McDonald. "Everyone applying to the top universities in the US has amazing grades," Brian explains. "It's not simply enough to be strong in academics. You need to prove to these universities that you'll be involved in more than academics."

For Bruce, that interest outside of the classroom was always rugby. Bruce started rugby in Grade 7 and played throughout high school. He toured Australia for three weeks in Grade 11 and was a key player on Collingwood's BC AA Championship team this past spring. Despite taking one of the heaviest course loads in Collingwood history, Bruce still found time for rugby five days a week. "I decided to stick with rugby because I didn't want to give up something I loved doing," says Bruce. "In the end, I was able to manage my time and fit in my academic work after practices. I think the teamwork I experienced in rugby is different from that in a classroom. Being able to train together to become better and compete together is unlike working in a group project. I think this experience of being on a team will help me in the future."



In all likelihood, this involvement in the rugby program also helped Bruce earn his spot at Georgia Tech. Brian McDonald points out that, "Sports are one of the best ways to show schools that you are the type of student who is going to get involved. If you handled Grade 12 and still found time to play high school sports, then it is a sign to universities that when you come, you'll be able to handle the academics and make the institution better by being there."

Do you need great marks to get into the university of your choice? Of course, you do. But the mistake some students make is to think that they should concentrate on nothing but academics. As University Guidance's Michelle Embury explains, "You don't have to be exceptional at everything. But you need to demonstrate that you're committed to more than just the classroom. This could be an ongoing commitment throughout high school to drama or the band or sports, but if you want to enhance your chances of getting into a great university, then you need to get involved."

That's what Bruce did. Now he's off to Georgia Tech, one of the leading research universities in the United States.

# THE MORVEN COMMUNITY GARDEN

WITH SOME INSPIRATION and guidance from leaders in the Wentworth garden, we are so excited about the first year of <u>our Morven Community</u> Garden.

It started last fall with prepping the existing garden space behind the Yassin Gym and expanding to the area behind the McCord Gym. With the help of PE classes and faculty and staff on a cold wintery Dec Pro D service day, we stripped weeds, overturned existing dirt and loaded over 18 cubic yards of sea soil and organic matter into the garden space. We were also lucky to have support from Standard Lumber in North Vancouver, who donated the garden edging on one of the beds.

In the early spring, classes planted seeds indoors as seed starts. By April, we were planting seedlings in the garden during our Gr. 8 and 9 service days and the Grade 9 EX-week. With care and attention from many students, faculty and staff, we have seen our beloved plants grow into produce. This produce supplied the cafeteria with greens daily all spring. Any item including garden produce is identified with a label, so our students know they are eating food from the Morven garden. Every Wednesday, the faculty and staff are also reaping the benefits with Salad Wednesdays. Garden greens are delivered to the staff lounge for a salad lunch.

Over the summer, some dedicated faculty and staff are harvesting produce and preserving it through freezing or canning so it can be returned to the cafeteria for stews and soups in this fall. This September, we will be participating in our building community theme, and having a community picnic in the garden with all of our mentor classes and plan to host a farmers market. So next time you are at the Morven campus, please take a walk and share our beautiful garden space. **⑤**

# Providing a model for giving with your kids

Each year during the Tartan Fund campaign, we encourage our parents to involve their kids when making their family's donations to Collingwood School. By allowing children to watch as parents write the cheque, research shows we are developing philanthropists. One study found that parents who model donor behaviours have a greater than 80% chance of raising a child who turns out to be an adult donor. Not only does parental involvement account for much of the factor of whether people give, but it also helps predict how generously they give. It's the same with volunteering. The same study found that 49% of kids who saw their parents volunteering become volunteers as adults, compared to 20% among those who rarely or never saw this behaviour modelled. This is a meaningful way that we support service learning, which is one of our Four Strands.

Keep an eye out for the launch of the 2018-19 Tartan Fund campaign in early November. Our annual fundraising campaign that supports Infinite Opportunities for Collingwood students. As in year's past, our goal is 100% participation from our community. Please give generously on Giving Tuesday, November 27.
