This concept is represented by the West African Adinkra (symbol) for **knowledge** & the saying from which our name derives:


NEA ONNIM NO SUA A, OHU = "One who does not know can know from learning."

Our Mission

Nea Community Learning Center is based on an educational model that empowers youth to take ownership of their educational experience, to celebrate their diverse community, and to actively participate as members of a democratic society.

Our Community & School Information

Established in 2009, Nea Community Learning Center is one of the four public charter schools located in Alameda, California with an enrollment of 590 students in K-12 grade levels. Nea serves a diverse population of learners from the residential communities of Alameda, Oakland and beyond. Nea is accredited by the Western Association for Schools and Colleges (WASC) and certified by the California Charter Schools Association.



Our Approach

Nea's approach to education is focused on a project-based learning model that promotes active and exploratory learning and allows the learners to experience the self-discovery journey through various stages of development. All of our projects are standards-based, and include hands-on, interactive, and differentiated activities along the way so that learners attain mastery of objectives.

Our Principles

Our core values help learners develop beyond academics into engaged citizens, productive and responsible people, and active lifelong learners. At all levels we teach, emphasize, model and celebrate the Nine Nea Principles. Each month, a Nea Principle, represented by an Adinkra symbol, is embedded and interwoven throughout the program. The Nine Nea Principles are: Curiosity, Organization, Persistence, Compassion, Accountability, Problem Solving, Courage, Teamwork, and Integrity.

Grade Point Average Scale

Nea CLC calculates grade point average on a weighted 4.0 scale. Each semester counts as five credits. Our graduation standards reflect that D's and F's do not count as passing grades in high school classes.

A: 90 - 100% = 4.00 D: 60 - 70% = 0B: 80 - 90% = 3.00 F: 0 - 50% = 0C: 70 - 80% = 2.00
