Dear Parents and Carers

Welcome to our final newsletter of the first half of the Autumn term.

I do hope that this term has been a successful one, for you. it certainly has been for our academy, no more so than being able to be united as one community and to rejoin as pastoral houses, curriculum communities, where children have rekindled friendships, focused on their learning having found their time during the various lockdowns, had made them keener to learn and already they have presented as having grown and developed in their maturity and approach to their learning.

It was such a pleasure to be within their company.

Their commentary was shared with the staffing body, during the INSET, today and will be further scrutinised in order for the academy to do its level best to respond to their requests, in a way that enables the students, staff and academy to continue to work within its capacity, whilst improving the daily experience of our students.

You as parents and carers and we, as staff, are not always going to be there to protect them, pull them back or call to them to do the right thing. Please speak with you child and assure yourself that your child is not one of the few that choose to make some very life-changing decisions, the danger to themselves of which they are not paying heed.

Information for schools on COVID-19 vaccinations for 12 to 15 year olds

As you know our academy is supporting the rollout of the COVID-19 vaccination programme for 12 to 15 year olds in schools and our confirmed date is Tuesday, 9th November, 2021. So far, 15% of 12 to 15 year olds have now been vaccinated. Vaccinating children should help to reduce the need for children to have time off school and reduce the risk of spreading COVID-19 within schools.

We are to work closely with our School Age Immunisation Service (SAIS) teams on the in-school COVID-19 vaccinations for 12 to 15 year olds. Offering vaccines in schools is important for ensuring all children can get a vaccine if they and their parents choose to do so.

You will have heard that NHS England will soon be opening an additional offer for 12 to 15 year olds to get their COVID-19 vaccine out of school, such as through vaccination centres. This offer will run in parallel to the in-school vaccination programme. Parents and carers of children aged 12 to 15 will receive a letter from the NHS with more information on the vaccination programme shortly, including information about how to book an appointment out of school, if this option is preferred.

Not all children will be able to attend an out of school site, and so in continuing to support the inschool programme, we are helping to ensure all children and young people have an equal opportunity to be vaccinated.



What's happening in lessons?


Year 7:

This term, our Year 7's have had an introduction to UK and European Geography. They have learnt about the UK's position in the world, its different types of settlement and what kinds of weather we have over the year. Within this, they've been working very hard on their map skills and graph skills. It's really lovely to see how the students have settled into THA life, and are doing excellently in their lessons.



Year 8:

Students in Year 8 have been learning about the geography of Africa this term, focussing their attentions on Kenya. They too have been working on their map skills, using these to explain Kenya's location and looking at its human and physical features. We have also been learning about the Maasai tribe and their way of life, along with how the people are struggling with the development of the world around them. Students have been immersed in Kenyan culture, and we can't wait to see what they create for their end of term presentations!



Year 9:

During this term, Year 9 students have begun learning about tectonic and weather hazards in Asia. They have learnt about the structure of the Earth and its processes, and how these cause earthquakes and volcanoes to form. We've looked at case studies in Bangladesh and Japan where students have compared the effects of storms that have hit these countries and they have been coming up with ways to prepare for these natural disasters in the future.

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
Year 10:

Our new GCSE students have started the term really positively. Their first unit is Tectonic Hazards, so like the Year 9s, they have thrown themselves into the processes that create tectonic hazards such as volcanoes, earthquakes and tsunamis. They have analysed the causes, effects and responses to case studies of Chile and Nepal and created some fantastic work around mitigation, prediction and protection from hazards. We've explored career options too from seismologists to tour guides!

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Year 11:

They have learnt about the processes that shape our coasts, the issues these cause and the management techniques employed to tackle them. They have been working really hard and are putting in a lot of effort to prepare themselves for their exams next year. We are currently running revision sessions after school on a Thursday in F10. We are having a good turnout currently but always have room for more!



Visit from Author, Thomas Taylor

The Hastings Academy became 'The Eerie on Sea Academy' on Wednesday, as author Thomas Taylor came to visit Year 7 as part of the Hastings Storytelling Festival! Based on a spooky version of Hastings, Thomas has just released the third book in his Eerie-on-Sea series, and told our students about his inspirations for the stories. The students got to examine pieces of sea glass, as well as fossilised dinosaur droppings! Especially impressively, Thomas demonstrated some uranium that had washed up on the beach, and how it glowed in the dark.

After the demonstration, Year 7 got to ask Thomas a series of questions about his inspirations, his favourite books and his plans for the future of the series. He was even kind enough to sign some copies of the first book in the series, 'Mallamander' for the library.




Intro to Dance

Dance Club




I am delighted to say that Dance club is up and running within the Hastings Academy. The club is open to all year groups and will run on a Thursday from 3pm till 4pm.




Year 8 - Thriller

Year 9 - Black Lives Matter



To coincide with Black History Month, students have been working on learning, developing and creating a piece of choreography inspired by the BLM movement. We actively encouraged students to think about the messages and political ideas behind the work of choreographers such as 'Diversity' and how through Dance a political message can be delivered.

They have all worked incredibly hard. Firstly, learning and replicating set sequences taught, with each individual group then working independently to adapt & changed their choreography using key skills within dance such as mirroring, contact work and formations. The term was rounded off with a performance of their work for their assessment.

Year 10 – A Linha Curva



What a cracking start the year 10's have made to the GCSE Dance course. Students have been developing their performance skills by studying one of our professional pieces from the written exam. A Linha Curva is a contemporary performance piece; inspired by Brazilian carnival culture, with flecks of details referenced to Brazilian music and samba rhythms and actions.

The dancers have worked really hard over the past few weeks, to learn and replicate a 4.30min long performance within a very new style to all of them and ready for their assessment in our final week.

Year 11 - Exam Set Phrase

It's been a tough start for the year 11's working towards their first moderated NEA performance exam, where students have been working tirelessly to perfect their solo performances (Shift). The dancers are assessed on their performance skills under exam conditions, such as extension, flexibility, facial expression & dynamic skills leading to 15% of their final exam.



But only a small rest for the physical demands of the subject; as we swiftly move onto learning a duet inspired by 'Shadows' by Christopher Bruce, once this is completed this makes up another 15% of their final practical exam.

Youth Cabinet Elections

After half term, The Hastings Academy will be holding their Youth Cabinet Elections. The Hastings Youth Cabinet is a group of 11-18 year olds who are the elected and representative voice for children and young people in East Sussex. Youth Cabinet members play a role in campaigning on issues that young people have voted as a concern to them, responding to local issues and consultations. East Sussex Youth Cabinet is non-political.

Any student at The Hastings Academy can apply as long as they have an interest in changing their community for the better and can commit to two years as a representative. They will have plenty of training and support from trained youth workers. They will be required to attend meetings, sometimes online or sometimes in Eastbourne, but members will have all out-of-pocket expenses covered, with both public transport and refreshments reimbursed. They will also receive recognition for their achievements and earn references for CV's, college and university applications.
