Nancy Graves Beveridge, MD 1980 ~ Pediatrician, Children's Clinic of Nashville

Dr. Beveridge recently celebrated 30 years in practice at the Children's Clinic of Nashville. After graduating from Harpeth Hall in 1980, she attended the University of North Carolina and majored in history. She took her dad's advice to heart: find the most interesting and popular professor on campus and take every course he or she teaches. Thus, began a lifetime of visiting battlefields all over the United States and France, thanks to her dad's pre-science and the chair of the history department's expertise in military history. From there she attended Wake Forest for medical school and received her degree from Dean Richard Janeway, the father of Harpeth Hall Director of Advancement Susan Moll! A residency followed at Vanderbilt and then a job at the Children's Clinic of Nashville. Along the way, she married the love of her life and together, they have raised four beautiful children. Now, she is "Shugie" to four precious grandchildren.

Dr. Beveridge has witnessed many changes in the practice of medicine over her career including advances in the treatment of cystic fibrosis, diabetes, and childhood leukemia, such that children with these illnesses are now living long and full lives. The advent of the internet and access to information has changed the way students and residents are trained, and now, a doctor's role is less to provide information (Google can do that) but more to put that information into context for families in a more individualized way. Finally, Dr. Beveridge has witnessed the development of many vaccines that now prevent children from dying or being harmed by serious bacteria and viruses, which were real and threatening during her residency.

While she has no plans for retirement, practicing her last years in the midst of the most impactful contagion our world has ever seen has presented the opportunity to adapt to new demands and challenges. Dr. Beveridge attributes any ability to do this to the firm foundation that Harpeth Hall provided to think critically, to lead confidently, and to live honorably. She has served her alma mater well in numerous capacities, including as the Board of Trustees Chair from 2008-12 and from 2013-14 and as an Honorary Trustee.

PANELISTS

Lisa Morrissey LaVange 1971 ~ Professor and Chair, Department of Biostatistics, Gillings School of Global Public Health at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill

Lisa LaVange, Ph.D. is a professor and chair of the Department of Biostatistics in the Gillings School of Global Public Health at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill. UNC Biostatistics is the 4th ranked biostatistics department in the United States, was founded in 1949, and leads the nation in doctoral students graduating each year. In addition to guiding over 40 faculty and 200 students in biostatistics, she conducts research in clinical trial design and directs operations for large multi-center clinical trials in a variety of indications, including respiratory disease, cardiovascular disease, infectious disease, and chronic pain.

From 2011 to 2017, Dr. LaVange was director of the Office of Biostatistics in the United States Food and Drug Administration (FDA) Center for Drug Evaluation and Research (CDER). There, she oversaw 215 statisticians and other staff members involved in the development and application of statistical methodology for drug regulation. She was a leader in developing and assessing the effectiveness and appropriateness of innovative statistical methods intended to accelerate the process from drug discovery to clinical trials to FDA approval and patients' benefit, with a particular focus on rare diseases.

In early 2020, Dr. LaVange was tapped to participate in the NIH initiative, Accelerating Covid-19 Therapeutic Interventions and Vaccines (ACTIV), where she leads a working group to design and implement master protocols to investigate therapeutics to combat Covid-19 in both outpatient and inpatient populations. To date, this public-private partnership has launched six master protocols, each investigating multiple anti-virals, immune modulators, and supportive care agents. Results from these studies are influencing the standard of care of persons infected with Covid-19.

Lisa is an elected fellow of the American Statistical Association (ASA) and was the 2018 ASA President. She also serves on the board of directors of Simulations Plus, a software company specializing in pharmacological modeling.

In recognition of her career achievements, Lisa was named Harpeth Hall's Distinguished Alumna in 2010. She credits Harpeth Hall and its incredible faculty with generating an early interest in the mathematical sciences and a desire to pursue graduate studies. Exposure to female teachers at Harpeth Hall who held advanced degrees opened a whole new world of career possibilities that served as a powerful motivator, as she pursued her undergraduate and master's degrees in mathematics and her doctoral degree in biostatistics. She is proud to be a Harpeth Hall alumna and shares stories of her experiences there whenever she is given the opportunity!

Tammy Wolcott 1981 ~ CEO, LBMC W Squared, LLC in Brentwood, TN

Tammy Wolcott graduated from the Harpeth Hall School in 1981, attended the University of North Carolina—Chapel Hill and received her Bachelor of Science in accounting from the University of Tennessee.

She co-founded W Squared in 2005, which became part of the LBMC Family of Companies through acquisition in 2017. She currently serves as president and chief executive officer of LBMC W Squared, which leverages scalable finance and accounting systems, people, and processes typically in place for large companies in a fractional outsourced model for small to medium-sized businesses. LBMC and W Squared have been recognized with multiple awards, including the Chamber of Commerce Future 50, Nashville Entrepreneur of the Year Finalist, Best in Business Finalist, and Inc. magazine's fastest growing private companies.

Prior to founding W Squared, Tammy served as vice president, corporate controller and treasurer of CHD Meridian Healthcare (predecessor to the

Take Care division of Walgreens). During her six years with the company, she was responsible for the corporate finance function, management of required reporting for senior lenders, oversight of centralized payroll, management of the company's cash and investment strategies, and the integration of internal processes to provide improved cash flow and efficient use of personnel.

Before joining CHD Meridian Healthcare, Tammy served as national director of human resources and as assistant controller with Surgical Care Affiliates, Inc. and was instrumental in growing the company from three to 60 surgery centers during her nine-year tenure. She played a key role in standardizing the accounting process and training for business managers, developing a consolidated cash management program, and creating a national benefits program.

Tammy has served on the boards of the Nashville Healthcare Council, the Board of Visitors for the Lipscomb University College of Business, The Harpeth Hall School, and has been a presenter/panelist at business and start-up company forums with the Nashville Entrepreneur Center, Smart Business Dealmakers, the Social Enterprise Alliance, Baker Donelson, Vanderbilt University Owen Graduate School of Management, and Lipscomb University College of Business.
