### Alumni Descend on Winsted for Homecoming

Hundreds of alumni/ae and friends of the school made their way back to Gilbert's hilltop campus for the weekend of Oct. 4 to reconnect, share memories and honor fellow graduates with awards for their distinguished careers and contributions to society.

Members of the Alumni Band returned on Friday, Oct. 3, to rehearse for a stirring performance the following day. At one point during the welcome program on Saturday morning in the auditorium, the Alumni Band yielded to the Gilbert School Marching Band, which ringed the auditorium and gave every-one a taste of the music program at Gilbert today.

Five graduates were honored with what has become a Gilbert tradition — the Distinguished Alumni Awards. Charles F. Gabelmann '46, Jason T. Boutin '95, Dr. Edward J. Marolda '63, Dr. Norman E. Smith Jr. '53 and Ellen Geraghty '98 all gave speeches acknowledging the accolades of Gilbert officials past and present who lauded them for their work since leaving the school.

Gabelmann, a longtime Gilbert custodian who attended the school when it was located on the current campus of Northwestern Connecticut Community College, choked with emotion when given the Gilbert Heritage Award for his distinguished contributions to the history of the school (for a complete list of the Distinguished Alumni awards, turn to page 2).

Atter the Alumni Band performance and the awards, welcome program adjourned to the cafeteria for a light lunch and conversations that brought back memories of what a special place Gilbert holds in the hearts and minds of its thousands of living graduates.



## Happening On Campus ...

### **Classics Teacher Higgins Gives Talk In Philly**

Mr. John Higgins, Latin and Greek teacher at The Gilbert School in Winsted, recently presented a talk entitled "Development of Pedagogical Support Materials for Greek Instructors in High Schools" at the annual meeting of the American Philological Association (APA) in Philadelphia on January 11. The presentation was part of a panel on "New Developments in the Pedagogy of Beginning Greek," and was the only paper to address secondary teaching.

The APA, founded in 1869 by "professors, friends, and patrons of linguistic science," is the principal learned society in North America for the study of ancient Greek and Roman languages, literatures, and civilizations. While the majority of its members are university and college Classics teachers, members also include scholars in other disciplines, primary and secondary school teachers, and interested lay people. In addition to supporting research in Latin and Greek, the association fosters programs to provide more support for improved pedagogy at all levels of teaching.

Mr. Higgins has offered Greek to Gilbert students since 2000 and has been active in assisting the growth of Greek programs in several other schools in Connecticut as chair of the Edward Phinney Fellowship committee of the Classical Association of New England.

We also still get the traditional classical high achievers, but we need help to serve new students in a new way, and so I am trying to put together a teachers' book to do that."



## Judge Everett "Skip" Madin '69: Family Man and Legal Scholar

TORRINGTON — The Hon. Everett "Skip" Madin Jr. '69, who worked his way up from factory floor to the bench of some of the state's most important courts, died Dec. 2, 2008, at his home in Torrington. He was 57.

Skip was a 1969 Gilbert graduate who remained connected with the school long after moving on, most recently when he appeared at Gilbert last May to be the guest speaker at the Connecticut Law Day Assembly, where, according to Principal Dan Hatch, he was exceptionally well received.

Before law school, Skip began his career at Hitchcock Furniture in New Hartford, where he worked is way up from the manufacturing floor to plant manager. When Skip learned the company might change hands, he and a co-worker, both in their late 30s, considered going to law school.

Skip eventually graduated in 1992 from the University of Connecticut Law School's night division (third in a class of 44) and began work as a trial attorney at a Hartford firm. He was appointed a Superior Court judge in March 2007. Most recently, Madin was the presiding judge of the Torrington juvenile court. Madin enjoyed woodworking and fixing things around the house, as well as hiking and the great outdoors.

He will be remembered, in the words of the Connecticut Law Tribune, "as a skilled lawyer and jurist who valued justice as much as God and family." Skip is survived by Linda, his wife of 32 years, along with five children and four grand-daughters.

### Kim Powell '77: Equilibrium and The Good Life in Paris



#### Kim Powell

Kim Powell '77 has struck a balance in her life that would be the envy of most people. She satisfies her creative and professional urges through photography -- phenomenal photography, in fact. And she gives back to her community through volunteer service. Indeed, not yet 50 years old, Kim has amassed a community service resume that would make an octogenarian blush. Since 1989 Powell has lived in Paris, the inter-

national art mecca, with her French husband. She was an active photographer while at Gilbert, but was also involved in just about everything she could find time for: cheerleading, the Student Council, the Latin Club. Her favorite subject was chemistry and she loved the sciences in general. One of her favorite teachers, Craig Schroeder, remains at Gilbert and now chairs the science department.

"I was very active," Kim recalled not long after she stopped by Gilbert last fall during one of her frequent return visits to her hometown. "I really liked the school." In fact, some of Kim's fellow students, including Associate Principal Joe Dombrowski '75, now work at the school.

Kim is an accomplished photographer who studied at the Parsons School of Design, the International School of Photography in New York and at Speos, a prestigious photographic institute in Paris. Her work has been exhibited at UNESCO, the Logis Royal and Paris Photographique. Last year was an especially active one: Kim was featured in Beyond Borders, a book about extraordinary American women who are living abroad and involved in community service.

From October to January Kim's work was exhibited at the Mona Bismarck Foundation gallery in Paris. The foundation also published a collection of Kim's works, Serendipity, a copy of which Kim dropped off at Gilbert when she visited last fall. Serendipity, which Kim donated to the school's library media center, chronicles her 2007 visit to Sri Lanka. It's full of stunning photos of faces and images that permeate a country torn by civil war and the 2004 Indian Ocean earthquake that spawned a devastating tsunami that killed at least 3,000 people in that nation.

"Photography has always been a part of my life," Kim said. "It was something I could share with my family. Over time, it became a job."

Kim met her husband, then at student at the University of Hartford, in the early 1980s and followed him to Paris a few years later. The cou-

> ple has a daughter, Ava Joulin, who is a junior at Gilbert.

> Not enrolling Ava in a French secondary school was a difficult decision for the family to make. Kim said French schools typically have a 10-hour school day and offer no sports. They considered a number of boarding schools, but then it dawned on them that letting Ava attend Gilbert while staying with her grandmother in Winsted was an almost perfect option.

"I knew she would be happy at Gilbert," Kim said of Ava. "It was perfect for her."

When not working on her photography or visiting Winsted, Kim stays busy with a variety of volunteer endeavors, including: the Sisters Association (an organization of African American women in France); WICE (a non-profit association providing cultural and educational programs and services for the international community in Paris): USA Girl Scouts Overseas; the Association of American Residents Overseas; the Association of American Wives of Europeans; the American Action Committee in Paris; and the American Cathedral in Paris.

Kim was a Girl Scout from the ages of 5 to 17, an association that nurtured her service to others. During her years at Gilbert, Kim was also

involved in numerous extracurricular activities and projects for the benefit of the community.

"I was born into a family of ministers, so community service and giving back to those less fortunate is in my blood," Kim said. "My experience in Winsted has stayed with me."

### Rick Hall '75: Working (and playing) as the 'Guitar Man'

It has been said before that in searching for a career the best thing you can do is "find out what you like doing best and and get someone to pay you for doing it." If that simple maxim is indeed a recipe for fulfillment, then the story of Rick Hall '75 is a guide to success on many levels.

A lifelong musician and performer, the Winsted native works as a product manager for Kaman Music in Bloomfield, parent company of the world-famous Ovation guitar line. The job allows Rick to make a good living, keep his feet firmly planted in the music world, meet many famous people in the business and travel the world extolling the virtues of his favorite instrument.

"I'm happy to be around guitars all day," Rick said in a recent interview. "It's better than being in a place that makes waffle irons."

Rick is quick to credit Gilbert with nurturing his interest in music. When not tending to their extra-curricular endeavors, band director Ed Keeley and chorus director Will Minton taught a variety of stimulating academic courses, including music appreciation and music structure.

"We actually had to write pieces," Rick recalled. "They taught us how to structure songs for different instruments. Then the band members played your pieces. Those [teachers] were instrumental." Since in tight budgetary times -- such as those of the 1970s -- music programs "can get squeezed," Rick says he is grateful that the integrity of Gilbert's music program was never compromised and that the school continues "to foster creativity in the kids." While at Gilbert, Rick did not participate in the marching or jazz bands, but played in garage-style bands outside of school, eventually landing gigs with his friends at school and at YMCA dances.

"I was always 'the band guy'," Rick chuckled. "I got my first guitar at seven years old. By the time I got to junior high I had six or seven years under my belt."

After graduating from Gilbert in June of 1975, Rick knew he wanted to be involved with music but wasn't quite sure how. He considered going to Boston's Berklee College of Music, a highly respected jazz-oriented school.

"I wanted to be a musician and go to school for it, but what was I going to do afterwards? Teach?" he asked rhetorically.

Rick attended Northwestern Connecticut Community College but did not graduate. He remained active in music and worked odd jobs for a couple of years before landing a job at Ovation's manufacturing facility in New Hartford. He started off building guitars on an assembly line, moved on to quality control and engineering and eventually became plant manager. Since 1997, Rick has been product manager. In that capacity, he's responsible for each product line and works closely with the company's factories in Asia and its distributorships in Europe. The job requires him to travel often.

"I get pulled in a lot of different directions," Rick said.

The frequent jet-setting has brought Rick into contact with some of his musical idols, including the legendary guitarist Carlos Santana. Also crossing Rick's path have been Billy Joel, Elton John and Glen Campbell.

"I've gotten to meet just about all my heroes," Rick added. "It's a side of the business that's fun."

Lately, Rick has been in the limelight himself, making media appearances to promote one of Ovation's newest and most innovative products, the iDea. It's an acoustic/electric guitar with a built-in MP3 recorder. Often when composers think of a nifty tune, they forget it by the time they're able to write it down or record it. The device can also play back audio, give lessons and play jam tracks. It went on sale Nov. 1 for \$599. No one had patented the concept before Ovation did, prompting Rick to proclaim, "It's so simple really. It's a cool and interesting piece with mass appeal."

In October, Rick appeared on Better Connecticut, a news and talk show hosted by Scot Haney and Kara Sundlun and seen on WFSB (channel 3). He took questions from the hosts and played a sample tune. Rick's time at Gilbert was not only formative but also something of a family affair. His mother Janet, who works in the school's business office, became a Gilbert employee as Rick started his senior year. He and his wife Danise have three musically inclined children, one of whom is a Gilbert graduate, one a current Gilbert student and another who will attend the school in a few years.

Before our interview concluded, Rick paused to consider his life: "I'm blessed in a lot of ways. There is something about music and creativity." But all is not globetrotting and glory.

"Tonight I've got to work on a spreadsheet."

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## Distinguished Alumni Awards



The Gilbert School Distinguished Alumni Awards are given in recognition of demonstrated commitment to and application of the standards of excellence for which The Gilbert School is known. Through meritorious service, noteworthy civic and philanthropic endeavors and/or exceptional personal or professional achievement, these individuals have brought distinction to themselves, their colleagues, their communities—and thereby to The Gilbert School. We encourage the nomination of individuals who exemplify and embrace such excellence, reflecting the proud legacy and tradition of their alma mater. Based on that legacy and tradition, we are honored to recognize individuals in the following five categories:

### • The Gilbert Heritage Award

This award may be presented annually to an alumnus of The Gilbert School who, through significant personal or professional contributions or accomplishments during his/her lifetime, has distinguished him/herself within the history of the school, bringing honor and pride to all alumni and representing the traditions and the heritage of The Gilbert School. The Gilbert Heritage Award may be given posthumously.

### • Young Alumni Achievement Award

This award may be presented annually to an alumnus of The Gilbert School who graduated from Gilbert within the past twenty years. The recipient will have achieved outstanding personal or professional success in the community, in business or in entrepreneurship. Through such accomplishments, he or she serves as a role model for younger individuals.

### • Distinguished Professional Achievement Award

This award may be presented annually to an alumnus of The Gilbert School who has demonstrated outstanding achievement in his or her professional life. The recipient will have brought distinction to themselves and The Gilbert School through their participation, commitment and leadership in their chosen profession. The length and quality of career accomplishments, a commitment to professional excellence and respect among professional colleagues is noteworthy.

### • The W.L. Gilbert Award for Outstanding Community Service

This award may be presented annually to an alumnus of The Gilbert School or to a member of our greater society (not limited to alumni nor to the Winsted area). The recipient will have displayed exceptional service to the betterment of life within their own community or to humanity in general. This award is in honor of the significant humanitarian and philanthropic contributions made by William L. Gilbert, founder of The Gilbert School.

### • Outstanding Athlete Award

This award may be presented annually to an alumnus of The Gilbert School who, through participation on a competitive sports team while a student at Gilbert, exhibited outstanding character, sportsmanship and his or her own "personal best" skill level while contributing to the overall achievements of the team. The recipient's positive attitude and team approach was evident and respected not only within the competition venue but also in the classroom and greater community. The recipient must be an alumnus of a class that graduated at least ten years prior to the year of the award.

The completed nomination form, along with all supporting documentation, must be submitted to the Office of Development and Alumni Relations no later than June 1, 2009. In order to be eligible for nomination, the nominee must be a graduate or former student of The Gilbert School unless otherwise stated in the description of the award. Current members of The W.L. Gilbert School Corporation and The W.L. Gilbert Trust Corporation are not eligible while in service to these boards.

The Gilbert School Alumni Advisory Council, representing all alumni of The Gilbert School, will review the nominations and present their recommendations to the Executive Committee of The W.L. Gilbert Trust Corporation for final confirmation. The Alumni Advisory Council reserves the right to include for consideration an ongoing list of potential nominees provided by The Gilbert School Alumni Office. Nominations will be accepted from alumni and friends of The Gilbert School at large.


