ast October, during a visit to the East Coast from their California home, Phyllis Shaffer Wong '64 and husband Trevor stopped in Winsted for a visit to Phyllis' alma mater. Amazed to see the changes at Gilbert since her own years at the school, Phyllis was at the same time tickled by things that had remained the same. Forty-two years is a long time but she felt right back at home as she wandered the halls of her old stomping ground.

Teaching a Spanish class on the third floor was Phyllis's classmate from "back in the day," Sue Roberts Rouleau. Phyllis and Sue were able to spend a few minutes between Sue's classes catching up on old times and it was clear to anyone nearby that their memories of Gilbert are held precious and dear even to this day. The two were transported back to the 1960s through laughter and reminiscence until the bell rang and it was time to return to 2006.

Phyllis has spent much of her career traveling the country and the world speaking at conferences and ministering to those in need. Upon their return to California this past fall, Phyllis and Trevor were to begin preparations for a visit to the

"At the 25th year reunion of our class of 1964, one of my classmates quizzed me extensively, later admitting his curiosity regarding how a valedictorian had turned out. Well, here is a glimpse into my life since high school...

In my valedictory speech, I gave credit to God for my giftings and accomplishments and now, 43 years later, God through Jesus Christ His Son is still the center of my life, the Lord having brought me out of the corporate world and into a glorious marriage. My husband, Trevor, and I are now full-time ministers of the Gospel of Jesus Christ, locally in southern California where we reside and in churches and conferences nationally and internationally. Wherever we go, we teach seminars on victorious living, health, and prosperity.

For instance, we recently returned from two weeks

in the Philippines where we were guest speakers at an International Ministers' Conference in metro Manila. We got to exhibit our faith in prayer when we learned that a "Super Typhoon" (the equivalent of a category five hurricane) was expected to hit Manila within 24 hours, just as our conference was scheduled to begin. We praved, and within 12 hours, the news report was that "It was inexplicable, but a high pressure system suddenly came down from above and pushed the typhoon in a different direction." So the conference of course proceeded as planned. Praise lesus!

After the conference, throughout the remainder of our two weeks in the Philippines, we spoke to church and business leaders twice per day. God blessed us by opening many doors. We spoke on national television and on radio. We met twelve bishops, two generals, one mayor over 16 million people and one real live princess from a European country. Before we had even left to return home, we had already received praise reports back from churches of all sizes and from business people. Many

SARAH LAROSA '02: ISLAND NATION OF TONGA

The island nation of Tonga is located in the Pacific Ocean, about halfway between Australia and Tahiti-that's a long way from Sarah LaRosa's home in Winsted, Connecticut! However, Sarah's desire to immerse herself in a new culture while at the same time use her newly-acquired skills as an educator drew her to the Peace Corps, where she knew she could find an opportunity to make a difference somewhere in the world. Tonga is where she'll spend most of two years doing just that.

started thinking about joining the Peace Corps last fall during the beginning of my senior year at Colby-Sawyer College. I have always been intrigued by the idea of living in a new culture and I wanted to make use of my teaching degree as soon as possible. The idea of teaching English abroad seemed like the best opportunity to do both. I looked at many different avenues for traveling and teaching. My brother Christopher (Gilbert Class of 1999) suggested I look into the Peace Corps and as soon as I did I knew it was perfect for me.

Peace Corps provides intensive language, culture, safety and health training prior to service, and medical and technical support throughout the two years, all of which are extremely nice to have while living on the other side of the planet! Also, even though I have taken a vow of poverty for the next two years and am living on the equivalent of about US \$275.00 a month, Peace Corps provides travel and living expenses, something that most other volunteer organizations do not offer.

I began my journey with more than two months of training and was sworn in as an official Peace Corps volunteer on Thursday, January 4th. Pre-service training consisted of two different homestay experiences-2 1/2weeks in the tiny village of Ha'atafu on the main island of Nuku'alofa and almost six weeks in the even smaller village of Koulo in the Ha'apai island group. I eventually made my way to the Vava'u island group where I will live for the next two years while teaching at a local government primary school, a few miles out of the islands' administrative capital of Neiafu. I will be a resource teacher focusing on teaching English, and will also have secondary projects based in health and environmental education within the community.

The teaching methods used here are much different than at home. Teaching by rote is the most common form of teaching throughout the entire kingdom. As a resource teacher I hope to present colleagues in my school

with techniques based in experiential learning. I recently found out that in addition to teaching classes 1-6 at the local primary school, I will also serve as the new school librarian. I am very excited about this new responsibility and opportunity. The library needs a lot of work, however. Most of the books are extremely dirty and disorganized, many of the children's books are placed so high up on shelves that I cannot reach them, and it is quite apparent that there are mice as well! I am hoping to collect books and do some serious cleaning and organizing so that after my two years here I will be able to leave behind a resource that will be more easily and effectively utilized by both the teachers and the children in the community.

As you might imagine,

There is very little hustle and bustle apart from Saturday mornings at the vegetable and handicraft market. On Sundays it is against the law to work, so Tongans go to church and then feast on lu cooked on an umu (see photo), after which everyone sleeps for the rest of the day! Tongans do not worry about the future-something that is very hard to get accustomed to after living in a country where most people are constantly thinking about their future. Although the attitude of living in the moment is admirable, it does cause some environmental and health issues throughout the kingdom. People do not realize the destructive impact that throwing garbage into the ocean or on the ground (including but not limited to plastic bottles and batteries) has on their environment and their (Continued on page 4)

health. The group that I came to Tonga with, Group 72, is part of the Community Education program and is comprised of people with backgrounds in education, environment, and health. We hope to address some of these issues during time spent outside the classroom conducting secondary projects on these topics within some of the Tongan communities.



Although Tonga is a third world country, extreme poverty does not exist here. While the diet of Tongans is very poor and as a result there is a high rate of diabetes and obesity, people do have plenty to eat



thanks to great soil for growing crops. There are mostly root crops such as taro and sweet potato, as well as plenty of fruit including watermelon, pineapple and bananas. Drinking water can sometimes be an issue, however rain collectors donated by New Zealand and Australia are a major help. Most but not all homes have running water, if not in their houses at least in their yards. I am very lucky to be living on a main island in a larger village because I have running water, access to landline telephones, electricity, and a flush toilet. Some volunteers placed on outer islands, many only accessible by boat, have none of these amenities available to them.

Another aspect of Tongan living that is drastically different than that of Americans is their view of money. It is practically unheard of for Tongans to save money for their own use. At the end of the week whatever money a family has earned working at their family store or selling vegetables or woven goods at the market is all given to the church. The people here are extremely generous and share what little they do have with others, whether family, friends or complete strangers. Tongans invite you into their homes at all hours of the day and night to share their food and stories with you. There is not much personal wealth here, but the people realize

that what they do have-a roof over their heads, water to drink, and plenty of food-is more than what many people in the world have and for that they are extremely grateful. I have already learned one very important lesson during my time here in Tonga and that is to be thankful for what you have and don't worry about what you don't have!

GILBERT COMMEMORATIVE CLOCK PROJECT
