From Student to Supervisor: Emma S. Ballamy, A Legacy in Nursing By Kendall Williams, History Major (Class of 2023), Summer


Undergraduate Research Fellowship (SURF)

This summer, I had the opportunity to participate in the Summer Undergraduate Research Fellowship here at Misericordia University. The program gave myself and other students the opportunity to conduct research over the summer and create projects that we will be presenting this October. I worked with Maureen Cech, our Archivist and Special Collections Librarian, as my mentor for my project. We decided to focus on a collection from Wilkes-Barre General Hospital School of Nursing, which along with collections from other nursing schools, is part of the Center for Nursing History of Northeastern Pennsylvania. The collection is the largest collection in the Center and contains materials like photographs, correspondence, uniforms, programs, memory and year books, and so much more. The collection is currently being processed, meaning that not all materials have been described and arranged in a way that makes them fully accessible to researchers. My goals for the summer were to learn about arranging and describing and processing archival materials in this collection and to curate both a physical and digital exhibit using the materials from the collection to tell a meaningful story about Wilkes-Barre General Hospital School of Nursing.

I looked through materials in the collection to

better understand nursing history in the area, as well as to find a subject for my exhibit. Eventually, I decided to focus on an administrator who had spent over 40 years of her life at Wilkes-Barre General Hospital School of Nursing, Emma S. Ballamy. She began as a student at the school and held the positions of teacher, Operating Room Supervisor, Assistant Head of Nursing, and Head of Nursing. I felt her story fit a larger narrative of the importance of women's education and their place in leadership roles, and how it worked to change opportunities for women in the future. My experience with SURF taught me many new things and introduced me to working with the archives. As I continue my work with this project, I will look deeper into the implications of women in nursing and how their work in the past leaves an effect on nursing and women's education today. SURF was a wonderful educational experience and it gave me the ability to learn about useful research and educational tools for the future.


