

Course Name: Economics School Year: 2021-2022

Course Purpose and Relevance:

This required one-semester course focuses on the basic principles concerning production, consumption, and distribution of goods and services in the United States. Students will examine the rights and responsibilities of consumers and businesses in a free enterprise system. The interaction of supply, demand, and price will be analyzed. Students will also study the role of financial institutions in a market economy, the relationship of the United States economic system to other economies in the world, types of business ownership and market structures, the United States' government's policy on taxing and spending, the Federal Reserve, international trade, and the role of labor in the United States economic system.

Overview of Student Outcomes:

The student can

- describe the concepts of scarcity and opportunity costs
- interpret the interaction of supply, demand, and price
- analyze the reasons for international trade and its importance to the United States and the global economy
- compare the issues of free trade and the effects of trade barriers
- describe free enterprise, socialist, and communist economic systems
- explain the basic characteristics and benefits of a free enterprise system
- identify the right to own, use, and dispose of private property
- explain the circular-flow model of the economy
- describe types of market structures
- interpret key economic measurements
- analyze key components of economic growth
- describe the role of money in an economy
- explain the role of the Federal Reserve System in establishing monetary policy
- evaluate the role that the government plays in the U.S. free enterprise system
- analyze the economic impact of fiscal policy decisions at the local, state, and national levels
- explain types of business ownership
- examine the role of financial markets/institutions in saving, borrowing, and capital formation
- demonstrate the role of individuals in financial markets
- apply critical-thinking skills to analyze the costs and benefits of personal financial decisions
- assess how to provide for basic needs while living within a budget
- research the various methods available to pay for college and other postsecondary education and training
- apply critical-thinking skills to organize and use information acquired from a variety of valid sources, including electronic technology
- communicate in written, oral, and visual forms
- use problem-solving and decision-making skills, working independently and with others, in a variety of settings
