Course Purpose and Relevance:

Students will study the history of the United States from Reconstruction (1865) to the present. Historical content focuses on major issues affecting the growth of America regarding political, economic, cultural, social, and geographical factors and their impact on American society, as well as foreign policy. Incorporated into the course will be variety of secondary source materials for enrichment as a guide to analysis and critical thinking dealing with issues related to the history of the United States

Overview of Student Outcomes:

The student can

- analyze the principles included in the Celebrate Freedom Week program
- identify traditional historical points of reference in U.S. history from 1877 to the present
- analyze understands the political, economic, and social changes in the United States from 1877 to 1898
- explain the emergence of the United States as a world power between 1898 and 1920
- evaluate the effects of reform and third-party movements in the early 20th century
- analyze understands significant events, social issues, and individuals of the 1920s
- analyze the domestic and international impact of U.S. participation in World War II
- describe the impact of significant national and international decisions and conflicts in the Cold War on the United States
- describe the impact of the American civil rights movement
- describe the impact of political, economic, and social factors in the U.S. role in the world from the 1970s through 1990
- discuss the emerging political, economic, and social issues of the United States from the 1990s into the 21st century
- explain the impact of geographic factors on major events
- analyze the causes and effects of migration and immigration on American society
- identify the relationship between population growth and modernization on the physical environment
- describe domestic and foreign issues related to U.S. economic growth from the 1870s to 1920
- identify significant economic developments between World War I and World War II
- describe the economic effects of World War II and the Cold War
- identify the economic effects of increased worldwide interdependence as the United States enters the 21st century
- explain changes over time in the role of government
- describe the changing relationships among the three branches of the federal government
- analyze the impact of constitutional issues on American society
- describe the concept of American exceptionalism
- explain efforts to expand the democratic process
- describe the importance of effective leadership in a constitutional republic
- describe the relationship between the arts and the times during which they were created

- discuss how people from various groups contribute to our national identity
- explain the impact of science, technology, and the free enterprise system on the economic development of the United States
- analyze the influence of scientific discoveries, technological innovations, and the free enterprise system on the standard of living in the United States
- apply critical-thinking skills to organize and use information acquired from a variety of valid sources, including electronic technology
- communicate in written, oral, and visual forms
- use geographic tools to collect, analyze, and interpret data
- use problem-solving and decision-making skills, working independently and with others, in a variety of settings
