# Information for schools and colleges on asymptomatic COVID-19 testing

Thank you for continuing to encourage staff, students and pupils to test twice-weekly at home. This is a key part of reducing transmission of COVID-19 in secondary schools and colleges and reducing case rates across settings.

To help pupils understand the importance of testing and to encourage greater uptake, we recommend you think about the best ways of engaging your students in regular testing. We have provided a <u>toolkit</u> to support you in encouraging pupils and students to test regularly. The toolkit provides strategies, best practice case studies and online resources to help increase participation levels. This includes sending GOV.UK automatic text reminders to test, working with student groups to encourage testing and incentivising testing through reward schemes.

We recommend that you use the start of this term as an opportunity to re-emphasise the importance of testing.

Students who find it especially challenging to test using lateral flow devices (LFDs) should be treated sensitively and signposted to <u>additional support</u> available to help students test.

### **Class Charts**

You will be aware that we use Class Charts (<a href="https://www.classcharts.com/">https://www.classcharts.com/</a>) at the Academy to inform parents and students of homework, rewards and detentions. ### **Detention Process Update**

Students at the Academy are given every opportunity to meet our expectations and are recognised when they do this. Should a student not meet our expectations they will be issued with a detention. We have, this year, updated our detention process to foster independence and responsibly in the students. Students have a choice of what they do, should they make the right choice, they will complete their detention in less time.

The updated process for detentions in term 2 is shown below. Please note that Choice 2 (after school detention) has increased to 4pm. Students also have the opportunity to clear their detention by completing Detention Clearance Tasks at home on the second day.


## **Spotlight on... English**



#### Year 7:



letters on display!




#### Year 8:


#### Year 9:


#### Year 10:

## **Message from Lily Williams – Deputy House Captain of Firehills**

In Firehills this week, we have been learning about global warming in our assembly. This assembly was presented by Ms Williams, who taught us about the drastic effects and changes our planet is facing and what we can do to help our environment.

We were told how 90% of plastic ever produced is still on this earth, which means it's either in landfill or our oceans, therefore polluting our planet. Did you know that certain species are in danger of extinction due to climate change, for example the polar bear, giant panda and green sea turtle?

Not only were we taught facts about climate change, and the disastrous events it's doing to our planet, but we were also told how to help stop climate change, by doing simple tasks like recycling whenever is possible and cutting out any un-sustainable palm oil from our diets, since it is the little actions that can make a big difference. ## **Climate Change Assembly**

This week, Ms Williams held an assembly focused on climate change. Below are some of the slides from her presentation:

Climate is the average weather in a place over many years. Climate change is a shift in those average conditions.

The rapid climate change we are now seeing is caused by humans using oil, gas and coal for their homes, factories and transport.

When these fossil fuels burn, they releases greenhouse gases - mostly carbon dioxide (CO2). These gases trap the Sun's heat and cause the planet's temperature to rise.

The world is now about 1.2C warmer than it was in the 19th Century – and the amount of CO2 in the atmosphere has risen by 50%.

Temperature rises must slow down if we want to avoid the worst consequences of climate change, scientists say. They say global warming needs to be kept to 1.5c by 2100.

World leaders are currently meeting in Glasgow to agree on how we can introduce measures around the world to prevent our planet heating up even further.



In the east of Sussex, Rye, Newhaven, parts of Seaford and Eastbourne, Pevensey and more could be submerged by 2050, Climate Central estimates.

#### What we can do



Think carefully and buy wisely – eg buy peanut butter with sustainable palm oil to discourage further deforestation



**Avoid buying plastic** and re-use plastic whenever you can eg bottles for drinking water



Avoid air travel and car journeys to cut down on pollution


**TEEP Training — INSET Day**TEEP stands for Teacher Effectiveness Enhancement Program. It is a clear teaching formula that we introduced to our teaching staff over five years ago. It has enabled consistency and creativity with our teachers. We have sustained and built on the TEEP model and now have 8 level 3 trained staff who are a support mechanism to the

rest of our teaching staff.



#### **DT Work**

Year 7's, DT, have been working on a Strings & Nails project. The project involved designing their piece and making it. The project saw them working on their design and research skills, tool handling and working to a brief. The making of their work involved learning how to use a pin hammer to accurately hammer in pin nails to a piece of wood then use coloured string to wrap around the nails to produce their designs.
