Sustainable CT Application Debrief

- 725 of 770 points approved
 - 0 points (not 30) for two Action 3.3.1 Watershed Restoration Projects b/c the description/documentation did not adequately explain benefit to watershed and native species vegetation restoration
 - 5 points (not 15) for Action 12.2.1b Homelessness Training b/c training had to be specifically by designated staff liaison, not other social workers.
 - 20 points (not 25) for 5.4 Climate Vulnerability Assessment b/c ?? (maybe math error on my part of their part)
- Still “tip of the iceberg” (2365 points); Greenwich got 1025

Priority 1: Build Complete Streets Core Network - Prioritize Safety and Cost Over Speed and Volume

Support Active, Non-Motorized Transport with Multi-Modal Street Design

Connecticut's Complete Streets Act (CT Gen. Stat. §13-153f) requires pedestrians, cyclists, and transit users to be routinely considered in the planning, design, construction and operation of all roads. Given its silver-level certification, West Hartford should aspire to be a model for Complete Streets compliance.

A strong majority of 1,019 respondents in a 2020 survey support safe and efficient multi-modal transport in West Hartford. Let's prioritize vulnerable users, enhance multi-modal connectivity to neighboring towns and promote healthy lifestyles to help reduce the town's carbon footprint.

Short-Term Targets: Build protected N-S bike lanes from Town Center to Bishop's Corner on North Main; coordinate with City of Hartford to create protected Bike Lane on Park Rd.; and design non-motorized LaSalle Rd from Arapahoe to Farmington.

Mid-Term Target: Reconfigure LaSalle to prioritize non-motorized uses; add pedestrian crossings townwide; expand protected bike lane network (New Britain-New Park); develop 4th grade street safety program in cooperation with Bike/Walk CT; Introduce 311-type program to report infrastructure issues (speeding, sidewalks, crashes).

Three-Year Target: Design and build Core Non-Motorized Network and bring road repair into compliance with state Complete Streets Act. In all design, consider vulnerable users and ADA guidelines; Further expand bike lane network (Farmington E-W; Prospect N-S; install speed-reducing infrastructure on roads prone to accidents.

Priority 2: Invest in / Incentivize Clean and 100% Renewable Energy Programs

Description:

Actions to increase use of clean and renewable energy in municipal, commercial, and residential sectors by educating residents and businesses, and adopting targeted policies.

Short-Term Targets (draft):

Why is this priority important?

- Address climate change and air pollution
- Increase quality of life in West Hartford
- Make WH a leader and the place to be for CT residents and newcomers interested in clean and renewable energy
- *Meaningful action to follow up after climate emergency declaration*

- Heat Smart
 - Support & promote the upcoming Heat Smart campaign involving energy audits and clean heating and cooling- lead by Clean Energy Commission
 - Consider incentives for homes and businesses to improve energy efficiency
- Solar
 - Streamline permitting for rooftop solar
 - Allow ground-mounted solar
- EVs & charging infrastructure
 - Improve zoning requirements for charging infrastructure. EX: Add requirements for EV chargers at new parking lots and new larger apartment complexes like other CT towns do.
 - Encourage awareness and adoption of electric lawn care equipment
 - Consider incentives for electric car ownership
- Notification of Clean Energy Commission and future Sustainability commission for major new development to provide support for developers to make sustainable energy choices.

Priority 3: Urban Forestry and Landscapi

Aligns with Town Priorities? Y/N

Sustainable CT Category: X

The focus of this subcommittee is the preservation and growth of the native plant community of West Hartford with particular focus on the Tree Canopy.

This priority is very important. Thousands of mature trees have been lost in West Hartford over the last few years for a wide variety of reasons. Supporting and maintaining our trees has the following benefits: improved air quality, lower energy use in all seasons, carbon sequestration, noise reduction, stormwater and erosion control, wildlife support, enhanced property values, and improved aesthetics.

Goals of the Urban Forestry Initiative

Short term: (12 months)

Apply for State Grants for this year and next to fund forestry programs

Conduct a Tree Canopy Survey to establish a baseline

Continue to provide space for planting by West Hartford Tree Project

Create a section on town website for links to tree resources, videos by arborists that educate about pruning vs. removal,

Mid term: (24 months)

Examine the possibility of tree cutting restrictions or approval process before healthy mature trees can be removed

Examine the possibility of underground power lines

Urban Forestry Goals Continued

Mid term: Establish a town program that is funded by grants and town budget that provides and plants appropriate trees for residents

Begin to establish a commission that regulates the cutting of mature, healthy trees in Town

Long Term: Create a long term town strategy for replacement and preservation of mature trees and the replanting of young trees.

For West Hartford to be a town for everyone, municipal plans, goals, and actions need to address historic racism and inequality and support and promote the ability of all residents to thrive - in terms of education, health, housing, jobs (having them and creating them through small businesses), planning and decision making, etc.

Next 12 to 18 months:

- Review major policy & zoning programs, consider their impact on Black and other communities of color (BIPOC), rewrite them as needed to address equity issues.
- Support equity officer in identifying diversity and equity concerns and actions to address them.
- Support internship and employment programs for professionals who are BIPOC and programs that support BIPOC-owned business.
- Plan for/require 3 town representatives - 1 staff person, 1 elected official, and 1 community rep to attend the Winter 2022 Sustainable CT Virtual Equity Training Series - 1 date in Feb, 2 in March.
- Support additional programs at the library.

Priority 7: Food Waste Prevention and Composting

What is this priority? "Reduce or eliminate food waste and increase food scraps recovery." - from Sustainable CT website.

In the US, 40% of all food produced is never eaten. About 33% of MSW is organic. West Hartford can address this in the following ways. Heighten education around food in public schools and general public; education around food rescue programs in West Hartford; improving and encouraging backyard compost practices while developing municipal curbside compost service

Why is this Important?

- Provides food to those in need
- Reduces waste of resources and funds
- Reduce food that is sent to trash/compost
- Helps address CT's very real Waste Crisis
- Normalizes sustainability practices

Short Term Targets

12 months:

- Reduce organics in both yard waste / landfill and trash curbside collection services by encouraging backyard composting
- Increase food rescue through heightened awareness of organizations like [Food Rescue](#)
- Letter to all town residents highlighting the impending waste crisis and other vital information

24 months:

- food rescue (share tables) and food scrap composting in all public schools
- Increased education through fliers, listserv, social media, etc.
- Harvest lower carbon energy from organics

72 months

Priority 8: Address Gap in Healthy Food Options

Aligns with Town Priorities? Y/N

West Hartford needs a more sustainable food system, centered around three main areas:

- Farmers Markets
- Community Gardens
- Public Schools

Why is this priority important?

Easy access to nutritious, organic, locally-produced food remains limited in West Hartford

Short-Term Targets:

12-month

- Transform vacant municipal lots into edible and productive community gardens in the east side and center of the Town.
- Improve signage and web presence for the Farmers Markets that already exist
- Establish a Share Table (place to leave leftover, unopened food in all WH public school cafeterias)

24 month

- Form a Food Policy Council or commission
- Conduct a Community Food Assessment to collect data on where we're at
- Expand number of farmers markets, and hours/days of operation
- Re-establish school gardens and education curriculum (i.e. Kim Hughes' group Roots 2 Rise)

72 month

- Establish a community orchard in conjunction with community vegetable gardens
- Try to replicate the recent farm-to-school successes in Hartford Public Schools
- Re-examine and reform funding structure for food in public schools, so the funding doesn't come from sales of junk food

Priority 9: Climate Resolution and Climate Planning

We would like the town to pass a climate emergency resolution and start to adopt the provisions therein that would incorporate climate mitigation and adaptation into town planning.

Why is this priority important?

Climate change is the existential crisis of the 21st century. All that we currently have and all other progress that we hope to make on other issues require a stable climate.

Many models of infrastructure planning are based on a stable weather regime. As global temperatures

Short-Term Targets:

- Pass a climate change resolution by the end of the year (2021)
- The Climate Change Commission, town staff, and other key stakeholders, will perform a greenhouse gas inventory and create a climate action plan for the Town of West Hartford to achieve net-zero emissions in waste, energy, transportation, and the built-environment by 2050. Both the inventory and plan shall be completed by December 2023.
- The Town of West Hartford joins Hartford, New Haven, New Britain, Bridgeport, Middletown, Bloomfield, Stamford, Mansfield, and the 22 towns and cities of the Southeastern Connecticut Council of Governments in declaring an on-going climate emergency that threatens the existence of our civilization and the natural world, and urges for the state of Connecticut to declare a Climate Emergency requiring immediate action; and
- The Town of West Hartford will henceforth evaluate every town policy/action through the lens of environmental

Priority 10: Attract Businesses in Circular Economy

What is this priority?

Encourage businesses to consider locating in a town that values the principles of the circular economy, namely eliminating and designing out waste, creating opportunities to keep current feedstocks going for as long as possible before ending up in landfill or avoiding landfills all together

Why is this priority important?

We have an inefficient system that sends too many valuable resources to landfills and is far too reliant on virgin materials that are not infinitely available. There are limits to what supply chains can provide and there are limits to what the current economic system is designed to optimize. Conceptually a circular economy requires a rethink of our approach to take-make-waste. Instead it thrives on cycles which are optimized over time to encourage the mimicking of natural cycles as much as possible.

Short-Term Targets:

- Sharing sheds
- Launch a pilot program for companies whose waste can be used as a feedstock for another local business within CT. Match these businesses and reward them
- Create a tax incentive program for local businesses that are part of a circular economy
- Evaluate the Circular city plans from other towns and cities like the 450 in this directory

- Identify potential opportunities for West Hartford

Mid/Long Term Targets:

- Tool Library for residents - Allow residents to donate/rent tools for around the house. (Electric Lawn equipment, Bikes, ect.) Could also act like a buy nothing for the town residents drop items that others can pick up. Benefits - cut down on waste/consumption and promote the electric/environmentally friendly options. Will bring down the cost of homeowners face and individuals as they could rent a tool they don't often need as a way to save money.
- Utilizing existing business outreach such as the Chamber of Commerce to educate business on the benefits of sustainability and promote easy swaps the business could make. Promote these businesses that make the switch as a town eco recognized business which outlines changes they made or what they are doing for the town/environment

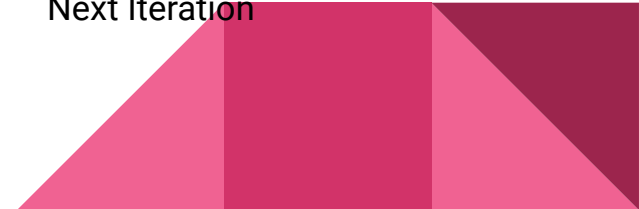
