At their regularly scheduled meeting, the school board will review the option that the task force recommended and give feedback for consideration. The intent would be for the school board to give administration direction to take the proposed adjustment out for parent and community feedback. This could include online surveys, world cafés or other engagement tools to provide multiple ways for community members to give feedback. The internal working group will review the feedback and make adjustments as necessary to reflect the themes that may emerge. A final draft attendance area adjustment proposal will be created for school board consideration.	At their regularly scheduled meeting, the school board will review the final proposed boundary adjustments and will be asked to approve the option for implementation in the fall of 2022. Attendance Area Task Force Charge



The charge of the Attendance Area Task Force (AATF) is to advise the school board by developing and recommending an attendance area plan based on data, which will be implemented in the 2022-2023 school year. The task force will review District 112 demographic data, growth projections, facility plans, transportation and safety considerations and other relevant information, create an attendance area plan to align with guidelines/criteria including but not limited to the movement of students impacted by the closure of East Union Elementary, present recommendations to school board by November 10, 2021, and implement new attendance areas for the 2022-2023 school year.



Guiding Principles



- Provide sustainable attendance areas for the next three to five years unless there is significant change in enrollment versus current projections.
- Consider future growth to include: enrollment projections from demographers, city plans/plots, birth rates, etc.
- Ensure East Union students are moved as cohort/community groups so students are not isolated.
- Maintain grade configuration K-5, 6-8 and 9-12.
- Move as few students as possible.
- Have students attend school as close as possible to their home.



Guiding Principles



- Maintain concept of "feeder schools" between elementary and middle schools and that each middle school serve students that attend both high schools.
- Strive to minimize division of communities in attendance areas.
- Consider proximity, neighborhoods, bus ride times, and traffic patterns for best efficiency in transportation.
- Boundary changes should maintain similar demographic makeup at schools at the elementary and secondary levels.
- Seek community input prior to making a recommendation to the school board.
- Adhere to State and Federal laws and guidelines.



Norms



- Make attendance a priority and come prepared
- Use Guiding Principles and data as basis for discussion and decision making
- Remain open. See the "big picture" and be aware of how decisions affect all families and schools
- Stay curious, remain attentive
- Know there is more than one solution. Our job is to work toward best solution/recommendation based on Guiding Principles
- Acknowledge and respect all members equally as a member of the task force



Norms



- Participate in discussion and encourage others to participate
- Be aware of your own "air time"
- Listen to and value/respect each other's ideas and opinions. All views should be heard and considered fairly
- Work to reach consensus
- Support decision/recommendation publicly and privately once consensus is reached
- Limit use of technology (i.e. cell phone) that can disrupt/district the process
- Respect the confidentiality of member discussions and share information with stakeholders as agreed upon

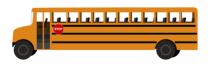

No students yet, but development has been or is in the process of being approved by the city



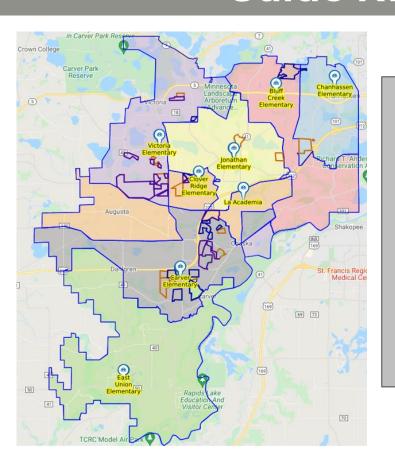

- New growth in Victoria stays in current boundary
- New growth in Carver stays in current boundary



Final Recommendation with Group Consensus





Key Features:

- Least expensive transportation option
 - \$280,000 to move 4 buses at East Union from 3rd tier to
 1st tier (\$490,000 for most expensive option)
- Least movement of current and future students
 - 108 current East Union students will be affected
 - 17 current AIM students at Carver Elementary will be affected
 - 85 current Pre K student at Victoria Elementary will be affected
- East Union would move from Pioneer Ridge to Chaska Middle
 School West and would stay at Chaska HS.
- Current walk areas maintained (Carver Elementary)
