





The Webb School English Continuum




The Webb School Math Continuum

Additional Course Policy

Add / Drop

-ADD: two weeks into the course

-DROP: First day of the second quarter of the course (with no notation on the transcript) / Later drop date (WP or WF on transcript)

Petition for course change

Course Selection Timeline

3rd quarter (January- early March)

Advisors are given updated Graduation Audit Sheet

Students begin to discuss course selection with advisors and parents

Course selections are due in RenWeb the Tuesday after spring break.

On occasion, some final recommendations to AP or Honors are not made until later in the 4th quarter.

Nota Bene: Personnel decisions (who is teaching what?) are made based on the enrollment in classes. It is important that students make their selections at the time outlined above.

Dual Enrollment Process

- Junior and Senior students may take up to two dual credit courses per semester, Fall and Spring (24 credit hours)
- Students may enroll in two dual credit courses over the Summer between their Junior and Senior year (6 credit hours)
- A maximum of 30 credit hours may be posted to Webb's transcript
- Current costs would be:
 - Tennessee Resident: \$50 + book/course
 - Non-Tennessee Resident, International Student, \$550 + book/course
 - Fees are billed to student accounts and Webb will remit payment to Lipscomb
- Admissions Requirements:
 - 21 ACT, 1060 SAT, 3.0 GPA (Same requirements for Tennessee Hope)

Dual Enrollment Process

- Application Process
 - Consult with College Counseling and academic advisor
 - Complete Dual Enrollment Grant (DEG) in TSAC
 - Complete application to Lipscomb University
 - College Counseling submits appropriate ACT/SAT/transcripts
 - Student attends Lipscomb DE orientation
 - APRIL 2022
- Lipscomb's dates and deadlines
- Courses will be posted to student transcript as "Course Name DE"
- The weighting of the DE course will be .5 (same as honors courses)
- Courses taught:
 - For the 2022-23 school year all courses would be Lipscomb Online courses with Webb proctor.


