Our students in extracurriculars have completed another Fall Sports season, and our Winter participants are preparing for their upcoming contests to begin. As mentioned above, we try to answer the question of "How can we make the content come to life for each student and get them excited to learn more?"


#### **Content/Standards**

#### Treasurer's Talk

River Valley Local Schools remains committed to keeping the Community informed about the challenges facing school Districts and the need to sustain funding in order to maintain a high-quality education for its students. The go-to state source for fiscal data is the Ohio Department of Education's District Profile Reports, also known as the "Cupp Reports."

The chart below shows the latest information available (fiscal year 2020) on the Ohio Department of Education's website as follows: FY2020 District Profile Report (comparison of River Valley Local School District to a similar district and the State average). Fiscal Year 2020 represents the 2019-2020 school year (July 1, 2019-June 30, 2020).

As you can see, River Valley had a much lower cost per pupil than both the State average and that of similar districts. River Valley continues to focus on fiscal responsibility by spending with a purpose and prioritizing resources that directly, and positively, impact our students.

The recent passage of the State's Fair Funding Model will allow River Valley to be the recipient of a slight increase in state funding that will help alleviate, but not entirely fix, the projected deficits created from the recent "funding cap." Beginning in July 2019, Ohio school districts were capped at their fiscal year 2019 state funding levels. Therefore, while Districts experienced increases in expenditures, their state funding level remained the same.

It is imperative that our District sustain all current funding sources to attempt to bridge the gap between the deficits created and the increase of funds from the new funding model.

## **Leveraging Revenue to Maximize Your Investments**

#### NO LOCAL TAX DOLLARS USED FOR THESE PROJECTS

#### 1-to-1 Devices for All Students

The district was able to use Federal Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief (ESSER) Funds to provide every student a Chromebook.

#### **Auditorium Lighting and Sound Upgrade**

The district is using federal ESSER Grant Funds to upgrade our auditorium lighting and sound systems over the next several months to make this space more usable as a classroom space and performances.

#### **Upgraded Food Service Equipment**

As a result of state and federal reimbursements, the Summer Food Program, and a Shared Services Agreement with Cardington-Lincoln Schools for Food Service Director, we have been able to upgrade and purchase new equipment for our Food Service Program.

#### **Refinishing of High School Gymnasium Floor**

We want to thank the Mathews Family of Dealerships for funding the entire project to refinish our High School Gymnasium floor! Be sure to check out this amazing new design at RVHS.

We are so pleased to see more of our students eating meals served from our cafeterias this year. 2021-22 is the second year that all meals are free for all students, which has undoubtedly played a role in the 30-40% increase in meals served each day. With that being said, I am pleased to announce that our food service staff is growing. I would like to welcome the following staff members to our team: Jackie Blevins, Bobbi Brodman, Stefanie Burris, Kacey Feliciano, Loretta Harding, & Lori Knippel. Also, congratulations to Jenny Kitts in her new role as Assistant Food Service Director. In this role, she will help support all our kitchens throughout the district. She will also help provide services outside our cafeterias to build a catering program for on-campus events and events throughout our local community.

nutrition food and supply chain is becoming more and more unstable as the industry continues to feel the effects of the pandemic. Foods we are accustomed to receiving from the USDA have been hit the hardest as those supplies are just not available at this time. One week it may be chicken products that are not available, the next week it may be pizza, and the next paper supplies. We have no idea from one week to the next what will be available. Our River Valley kitchens are balancing and adjusting, but unfortunately, our menus, at times, have been altered at the last minute as well. We will continue to do our very best to communicate menu changes as early as possible to families as we continue through the weeks and months ahead. ### **From Our Kitchen to Yours**

#### **Viking Boats**

- ✓ 2 Zucchini Medium-Large or Squash
- √ 1/2 lb. Lean Ground Turkey
- √ 1/2 tbsp Italian seasoning
- √ 1 Garlic Clove minced
- √ 1 1/2 Cup Marinara Sauce
- √ 1 Egg

- √ 1 Cup Part-skim Ricotta Cheese or low-fat cottage cheese
- √ 2 Tbsp Chopped fresh parsley plus more for garnish (optional)
- √ 1 Cup Shredded mozzarella cheese
- √ 1/2 Cup Shredded parmesan cheese or cheddar
- √ 1 Tbsp Olive Oil or vegetable oil
- √ Salt and freshly ground black pepper, to taste

#### Instructions

- 1. Preheat the oven to 400F. Slice zucchini in half on the length and scoop the inside out with a spoon.
- 2. Place them in a baking dish, cut side up, and spray with cooking spray.
- 3. Season to taste with salt and pepper, then bake for 10-12 minutes until the zucchini softens a bit.
- 4. Heat 1 tablespoon olive oil in a skillet over mediumhigh heat. Add ground turkey, Italian seasoning, garlic, and cook, stirring occasionally and breaking up the meat with a wooden spoon.
- 5. Once the meat is golden brown and cooked through, stir in the marinara sauce and simmer for 1-2 minutes more. Set aside.
- 6. Meanwhile, combine ricotta cheese, egg, parsley, mozzarella, and half of the parmesan cheese in a mixing bowl. Mix well to combine.
- 7. Stuff the zucchini boats with this cheese mixture, top with the meat sauce, and sprinkle with remaining parmesan cheese.
- 8. Cover baking dishes with foil and bake in a preheated oven for about 25-30 minutes.
- 9. Garnish with fresh chopped parsley and enjoy

#### **Substitutes:**

- Any cheese works, we used a combination of cheddar and mozzarella, and parmesan
- You can use ground beef or chicken in place of turkey
- Use your favorite spaghetti sauce in place of Italian seasoning, garlic, and marinara sauce.

#### **WORRC Habits**

For the 2021-2022 school year, we will be focusing on student WORRC habits within the classroom. WORRC stands for:



**Work Ethic:** stays on task, completes work, and does their best work all the time.



**Organization:** cleans up area, puts things where they belong, hangs up coat and book bag, keeps track of supplies and belongings.



**Responsibility:** takes ownership of actions and doesn't blame others, follows routines, is prepared for school, returns folder, presses pause, is showing self-discipline behaviors.



**Respect:** Listens to the teacher, follows directions, shows kindness, listens to others, and stays in their own personal space and minds their own business.



**Collaboration:** Gets along with others, shares ideas, and takes turns.

Teachers will be recognizing and celebrating students who are working on these habits in the classroom. Students will be recognized in weekly updates to parents and rewarded for their hard work

### **Reading Intervention**

In order to help students recover learning loss in the area of reading, Heritage Elementary was able to add a reading intervention teacher to focus on those students that may be struggling. This position was paid for through ESSER funds and no general fund money was used. Mrs. Rengert, the reading intervention teacher, has been working with students in grades 1-4 in order to improve their reading skills. We have been fortunate to have this additional support and are excited to see the students make growth in their reading.

### Viking Store




