Come and See

Come and see. Believe it or not this simple phrase was one of the first tools of invitation and evangelism. In the Gospel of John, Jesus uses this simple phrase to invite Andrew to come and find out more about who he is and where he stands. Philip uses a similar phrase to answer and encourage Nathaniel, when Philip tells him about Jesus. Nathaniel was a difficult sell, who doubtfully questioned about the messiah and whether or not anything good can come from Nazareth. "Come and see," answered Philip.

Philip's entire pitch on evangelism looked like this:

"I've met the messiah. He's Joe's son, from Nazareth."

"From Nazareth? Yeah right, bruh!"

"Come check him out. You'll see for yourself."

And then Jesus did the rest.

Most of us struggle with how to invite or encourage people to join us for church. And talking about our own relationship with Jesus probably proves to be harder still. It is difficult because it feels like we are sharing something too personal and possibly way too intimate. How do I broach the subject? How can I invite someone to participate in something I can't even explain? What if they ask me about the service or communion? What will I say?

Evangelism isn't really meant to be about preaching on a street corner or carrying pamphlets from the church. Rather, sharing and proclaiming the gospel is meant to be easy, "come and see." You don't have to be overly eloquent or a biblical scholar. All you really need are three things:

- Jesus—know and believe he is the Lord
- 2. Care—the desire, willingness and love to help someone you know or love
- 3. Trust—the Holy Spirit will work through you.

Evangelism is meant to be personal and simple. It is meant to be a way to show people a door to God and then let God do the rest.

Who is Jesus to you? Come and see.

What's the service like? Come and see.

Will I be welcomed? Come and see for yourself.

You get the picture.

Our Christian lives all began with someone showing us the way to Jesus. The personal relationship we form after that depends on our own commitment and involvement in our church and our faith. We've all had a lengthy season of restriction and fear, and I thought you could use some encouragement. Maybe you've become too comfortable sleeping in on Sundays. Maybe, you've focused your attention elsewhere, or you've just gotten out of the habit. Consider yourself nudged.

Do you know Jesus? Come and see...We're open for you.









Changes around St. James

June is shaping up to be a month of transition for many of the faces on our parish staff.

The biggest shift is that our longtime music director, choirmaster and organist Helen Van Abbema Rodgers has reduced her hours from full time to a much more part time role as our Organist. "COVID has given me a time to reflect on my future at St. James," she writes. Her passion is playing the organ, and this shift will give her more time to focus on practicing and playing while also giving her more time on the tennis courts, at the beach and traveling. Helen has been a valued and beloved member of the Staff of St. James since October 15, 1992, nearly 29 years. We have been so very blessed! She plans to begin handing over the reins as "Music Director" to Mary Katherine Kilgore, over the course of the next several months. With these two phenomenal women leading our music, I can only imagine the programs becoming richer still.

Anne McEniry, who is our current Director of Christian Formation, will make a transition to work with the school as Director of Admissions. Anne began her tenure here in January 2017 and quickly became a valued member of the staff. During the long months of the pandemic, Anne's giftedness was put to use helping with our school ministry, teaching Godly Play, filling in as a substitute teacher and assisting with student enrollment and admissions. She felt a call to return to her roots of teaching and school admissions and since early May she has been diligently working on making this transition, passing the torch to Ellen Huckabay, who will become our new Director of Christian Formation. Ellen has been

working with Anne on Children and Family Ministry programs, and we look forward to bright futures in both areas of ministry here at St. James.

Probably last but certainly not least, we will say a fond farewell to our Administrative & Communications Assistant, Elizabeth Phelps. She will be moving away to South Carolina later this month. If you've called the offices over the last few years, there's a good chance hers was the friendly voice you heard on the other end of the line, or the friendly face that met you when you came into the office. She was quick to call and check on people or serve as one of our editors on our many publications. We will miss Elizabeth on Sundays and around the office during the week, but we wish her all the best as she heads out for greener pastures to our north. We are currently searching for someone to take over this position, and will keep you posted as we complete our search.

You might also be interested to know that because our livestream was such a lifesaver during the pandemic, we've decided to keep the cameras rolling into the future, for those Sundays when you aren't quite up to putting on your Sunday best. We're hoping to begin training volunteers to man the cameras and the sound as the staff begins to fall back into their primary roles on Sunday mornings. While that seems like it might be a lot, it really isn't everything. If you have not been by the church offices or upstairs over Green Hall, you might take a moment to check it out. Over the course

of the last 18-20 months, we have been busy working on some projects that have been in the works for a few years. Just before the pandemic began, we converted some of our primary lobby and reception area into three new office spaces and a large storage area for our formation materials. We never really had an opportunity to show them off, but we've certainly enjoyed the additional room. Over Green Hall, the allocated classroom areas have been remodeled into three large classrooms, with two new bathrooms and a hallway extending between Wilson and Green Hall. We've also replaced the old chair lift on the east-end of the building so that the second-floor classrooms will work for everyone without regard to ability. Hopefully these changes give us room to do more formation and education as we bring our church back to life after our lengthy pause. Come and See~

St. James lost a good friend on May 5, 2021, our organ builder Darwin Klug.

I met Darwin in 1994 when St. James moved our historic Hook and Hastings organ to the chapel. Larry Trupiano of Brooklyn, NY agreed to do this move and hired Darwin Klug of Maitland, FL who had a special affinity for the craftmanship of tracker pipe organs.

In 1997 Larry and Darwin took on the project of moving and rebuilding the large 1968 Schlicker Organ from Lincoln Nebraska. Darwin Klug has





been our organ builder and tuner ever since. As representative of the German organ company Heissler in America, Darwin had special knowledge of the slider chests unique to our organ. While he tuned, I held keys. I will never forget him pausing, squinting his eyes and tilting his head when I would make a mistake on my end. His biannual trips to tune, maintain, and refine this large instrument were enhanced with a fair share of LA Gumbo, his favorite.

Darwin, who signed his emails "Darwind," made these enormous and challenging tasks fun. He came up with a solution to every problem and calmed down many a tricky international performer on the St. James Concert Series.

Last summer, Darwin drove 7 hours to make an emergency repair on the Schlicker and drove back the same day to get back to wife Angela and son Brian during the challenges of COVID. Soon after he discovered he had cancer.

We are so thankful for the time we had with Darwin.
